### Re: SB 466 - Relating to the per-pupil funding system for public charter schools Conference Room 229 – Hawaii State Capitol – Feb. 13, 2017, 2:45 P.M.

On behalf of the Hawaii Public Charter School Network (HPCSN), we respectfully submit our support for <u>HB 466</u> (OHA Administrative & Legislative Package), relating to the per-pupil funding system for public charter schools. This bill requires the Legislative Reference Bureau to conduct a two-year study on the non-facility general fund per-pupil funding system for public charter schools, to determine whether the system fulfills its statutory purpose of equalizing operational funding among the State's public schools.

This intent for this bill is to inform that public charter schools receive an equitable share of public education funds within the state.

Comments: Aloha Senate Education Chair Kidani and committee members, I stand in STRONG SUPPORT of SB 466 RELATING TO THE PER-PUPIL FUNDING SYSTEM FOR PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS. Requires the Legislative Reference Bureau to conduct a study on the non-facility general fund per-pupil funding system for public charter schools, to determine whether the system fulfills its statutory purpose of equalizing operational funding among the State's public schools. It seems that while the Legislature allowed for Public Charter Schools in Hawaii, it failed to consider all the inherent and unknown expenses for the schools to thrive and succeed. PCS existence was one thing, but the Legislature subsequently imposed additional restrictions, limitations and conditions while withholding basic resources afforded to department schools. Every parent should be afforded the opportunity to choose the best public educational setting (DOE, PCS, Alternative schools) that will fulfill their child's holistic educational needs; with its respective, fair and equitable, funding. We're only asking for justice, since we no longer believe that the DOE provides what our children need. For many years, PCS supporters, PCS employees (admin, faculty & staff), parents and students have presented themselves and/or their testimony requesting "parity" in student funding to the Legislature.
