RELATING TO THE KING KAMEHAMEHA CELEBRATION COMMISSION

Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 601, S.D. 1: amends the membership, mission, and purpose of the King Kamehameha Celebration Commission; authorizes the Chairperson to appoint an advisory committee for historical and archival matters; authorizes the Commission to appoint an Executive Director; and creates the King Kamehameha Celebration Commission Special Fund to be administered by the Department of Accounting and General Services. Moneys can be deposited into the special fund from 1) appropriations by the Legislature to the special fund; and 2) gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and private persons, and subject to legislative appropriation, the special fund moneys can be expended solely for the purpose of paying expenses arising out of the annual King Kamehameha day celebration events. The measure shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

The Department of Budget and Finance, as a matter of general policy, does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the

purpose, scope of work and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. In regards to S.B. No. 601, S.D. 1, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed special fund would be self-sustaining.

RELATING TO THE KING KAMEHAMEHA CELEBRATION COMMISSION.

Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Dela Cruz, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide written comments on S.B. 601, S.D. 1. The Department of Accounting and General Services opposes the measure for the following reasons:

- 1. This bill creates a special fund to collect gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and private persons, which is in direct conflict with Section 8-5(f), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). That section requires all donations and moneys received from all sources shall be deposited in the Commission's trust account.
- 2. As specified in Section 8-5(f), HRS, one of the purposes of the Commission's trust account is to ensure that all "donations accepted from private sources shall be expended in the manner prescribed by the contributor." The special fund in this measure does not specify that donations are to be expended in the manner

- prescribed by the contributor, and there is no mechanism identified to ensure that this will occur if such a request is made by a contributor.
- 3. In Section 8-5(d), HRS, the arts program specialist and the part time clerk typist are paid from fees, public contributions, and private donations. In the measure, both the special fund and the trust fund derive revenue from these sources, and it is unclear which fund these positions are paid from. Without a specific source of funding for these positions, the positions cannot be filled as the adequacy of funding for them cannot be confirmed.
- 4. The measure creates an executive director position; however, there is no funding source specified, and as discussed above, the position cannot be filled as the adequacy of funding for this position cannot be confirmed without an identified source.
- 5. The proposed fund does not appear to meet the requirement of Section 37-52.3, HRS, that the special fund demonstrates the capacity to be financially self-sustaining.

The Hawaiian Affairs Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i urges your committee to pass SB 601, SD1 Relating to the King Kamehameha Celebration Commission, that would amend the membership, mission, and purpose of the King Kamehameha Celebration Commission; authorize the chairperson to appoint an advisory committee for historical and archival matters; authorize the Commission to appoint an Executive Director; create the King Kamehameha celebration special fund; and make an appropriation.

We know that you are aware of the significance of the King Kamehameha Celebration having passed a similar bill in the legislature last year. Had it not been for a technical flaw, the Governor would have also signed it into law. Thankfully, due to the dedicated, committed members of the Commission and the several hundred volunteers, the Celebration was held last year.

We know that you are challenged by the numerous requests for appropriations and deciding which to fund given the limited funds that the State has to operate. We suggest that funding for the King Kamehameha Celebration Commission is an economic investment since the Celebration is a tourist attraction, and more importantly is an impetus to the "practice" of the Hawaiian culture by all who participate in it...from students learning about the history of Kamehameha, to the protocol for picking greenery in our forests for leis and other decorations used in the parade.

Aside from appropriations, the KKCC Commissioners recognize that to have a vibrant celebration we need more members with a business sense. No doubt, we are strong on Native Hawaiian culture and protocol, critical to the celebration. But,

we also need staff and commissioners strong on business, marketing, philanthropy and public relations; and we need an executive director to be responsible for all fiscal and administrative matters, including securing public contributions and private foundation grants and donations.

The King Kamehameha Celebration holds promise to be a premier event given the right resources. Unlike the other 49 states, Hawai'i is the only one that honors monarchs who ruled these islands.

SB 601 SD1 will help us to be that premier event. Please pass it.

SB601 at page 3, lines 14-19, currently proposes to amend HRS §8-5(a) as follows:

[one member from each of the following islands: Kaua'i, Maui, Moloka'i, and Hawai'i. Each of these members shall be a resident of the respective island that the member represents.] four at-large members representing the city and county of Honolulu and the counties of Kaua'i, Maui and Kalawao, and Hawai'i.

The original reason for merging the Maui and Moloka'i seats was based on a vacant Moloka'i seat for at least a decade. A "Maui County" seat would encompass both islands, and include Lāna'i. I do not support this proposed merger.

Requested amendments, approved by HWW and IAA on February 9:

- (1) At page 2, line 12, amend the number of KKCC members from thirteen (13) to fifteen (15).
- (2) At page 3, lines 14-16, keep the Moloka'i seat as is. A former Commissioner (Lu Ann Faborito), who previously held the Commission seat for the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, is moving to Moloka'i, and has already been appointed by Governor Ige and sworn in to fill this seat, subject to Senate confirmation.
- (3) Creating a seat specifically for the City & County of Honolulu/Oʻahu is unnecessary as nine (ten with the addition of the Daughters of Hawaiʻi) of the Commissioners are based on Oʻahu. It would be redundant. Communities on Oʻahu (Kapahulu, Papakōlea and Waimānalo) are well represented and have been so since KKCC's 1939 establishment.
- (4) At page 3, lines 14-19, instead of a seat for Oʻahu, we require a seat for the island of Lānaʻi. This will mean representation for all the major Hawaiian Islands, truly representing the entire state. Accordingly, provide for one representative from each of the following islands (not counties): Kauaʻi, Molokaʻi, Maui, Lānaʻi, and Hawaiʻi.
