Dear Chair Johanson and Committee Members:

The Hawaii State Ethics Commission ("Commission") hereby submits comments on S.B. 631, SD1, which seeks to amend Hawaii's gift reporting law, HRS § 84-11.5.

Currently, under Hawaii's gift reporting law, a gift given to the State – such as a piece of artwork given by a foreign dignitary – does not have to be reported by the individual who accepts the gift on the State's behalf. Instead, that item belongs to the State and remains with the State after the official's departure from office. As such, this proposed amendment to HRS § 84-11.5 appears to be unnecessary. Nevertheless, insofar as the measure does not weaken Hawaii's ethics laws, the Commission does not oppose its passage.

Thank you for considering the Commission's testimony on S.B. 631, SD1.

Chair Johanson, Vice-Chair Holt, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii supports SB 631, SD1 which exempts tangible and nonperishable gifts received by an elected or appointed official on behalf of the State from gift reporting requirements under the ethics code. As an alternative, the measure requires that the gift be publicly recorded as property of the State and remain with the official's state agency or be transferred to the State Archives or State Foundation on Culture and the Arts at the end of the official's term.

This alternative approach makes sense, because it would reinforce the fact that the gift was intended for the State (not the official), as well as providing a method for documenting where the gift is located after the end of the official's term. Conceivably some of these gifts (such as artwork) have monetary value and should be under the State's active management.
