In consideration of SENATE BILL 700 RELATING TO ANIMAL CRUELTY

Senate Bill 700 proposes to add a new definition of indigenous birds under Section 711-1100, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), and amends Section 711-1108.5, HRS, so that the offense of cruelty to animals in the first degree includes indigenous birds. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure with amendments.**

The Department defines indigenous wildlife, including indigenous birds under Chapter 13-124, Hawaii Administrative Rules, as 'any species or subspecies of animal, including migratory forms, occurring or living naturally in Hawaii without having been brought to Hawaii by humans and listed in, but not limited to, the exhibit entitled "Exhibit 1, Chapter 13-124, Indigenous Wildlife of Hawaii, 11/1/14" and as updated, which is located at the end of this chapter and incorporated by reference.' The Department recommends using this definition as it pertains to indigenous birds to afford protections under the animal cruelty laws for all indigenous birds in Hawaii.

Comments: The Humane Society of the United States supports legislation to allow felony animal cruelty charges to be filed against individuals who torture, mutilate, or poison any animal. In addition to the inclusion of indigenous birds as proposed in SB700, we request that all animals, as defined by the cruelty statute, be afforded protection from felony-level animal cruelty. Under the current statute, it is a felony to intentionally or knowingly torture, mutilate or poison "pet" or "equine" animals but it is not unlawful to commit such heinous acts against other animals. All animals, regardless of whether they are our companions or free-roaming, should be protected from extreme acts of cruelty. Abuse of animals has been consistently linked with other violent criminal behaviors. In fact, the FBI is now tracking crimes against animals alongside felony crimes like arson and murder because such acts are a strong early predictor of human violence. Studies have shown that up to 67 percent of violent offenders have committed acts of animal cruelty compared to nonviolent offenders. In one NJ study, 88 percent of families with physical child abuse also had histories of animal abuse and research shows that 43 percent of school shooters have histories of abusing animals. Protecting animals from purposeful violence protects humans. This simple, commonsense update to our animal cruelty statute will protect all animals from intentional cruelty and make our communities safer.

The Hawaiian Humane Society would like to testify in support of SB700, which intends to protect indigenous birds not covered under the federal Endangered Species Act or Ch. 195D of Hawaii Revised Statues by adding them to the law prohibiting cruelty to animals in the first degree.

The Hawaiian Humane Society's mission is to promote the human animal bond and the humane treatment of all animals. We have a proud history of standing up for protections for wildlife, as well as companion animals.

Cruelty is unacceptable when directed at any creature, human or animal. A significant body of research reveals overlap between people who abuse animals, of any kind, and those who abuse human beings.

While the Society does not distinguish between endemic, indigenous or introduced species in calling for the humane treatment of all animals, SB700 means to fill a loophole that denies birds like the Laysan albatross the same legal protections afforded threatened or endangered birds. Ideally we would like to see animal cruelty laws extended to protect all birds, but we support the intent of SB700.

Comments: Hawaii is home to less than 1% of the nation's land mass, and yet has the highest percentage of endemic species (species found nowhere else) of any state in the country, and one of the highest rates anywhere in the world. Despite our small size, more than a third of bird species listed as endangered under the federal endangered species act (ESA) nationwide are found in Hawaii and more than half of bird extinctions in the US have been in Hawaii. More than a quarter of Hawaii's bird species are listed under the ESA which provides them with federal protection. However, the remaining 75% of our indigenous bird species aren't listed under the ESA, but are no less important to the health of our ecosystems. These species are not afforded the same protections as those listed under the ESA, and our current state regulations do not take into account the importance of these endemic and indigenous species. This leaves them vulnerable as the penalties for harming non-listed native species that are not listed under the ESA are relatively minor. The penalties need to increase to reflect the ecological and cultural importance of all native wildlife. The horrific killing and mutilation of more than a dozen Laysan Albatrosses at Kaena Point Natural Area Reserve in 2015 highlights the precarious position our native, but non-listed birds face. While the defendant in that case has been charged with 15 counts animal cruelty, the current law means that these crimes are merely misdemeanors. As a wildlife biologist who has dedicated their career to conserving Hawaii's bird species, and the very albatross that were killed in that incident in particular, I strongly urge you to consider this bill and amend the Hawaii Revised Statutes to include indigenous birds in the offense of cruelty to animals in the first degree.

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It is important that we strengthen our role as stewards of the islands and ensure the wellbeing and thriving growth of all species on this Earth. Individuals who disregard the health and life of other species do not deserve to live in a free and welcoming society. Birds like any other native species on our island must be protected and those who commit atrocious acts towards wildlife must be punished. Humans cannot survive without nature, we have to live side by side with it and respect it.
