In consideration of SENATE BILL 797 RELATING TO OFFENSES AGAINST PROPERTY RIGHTS

Senate Bill 797 proposes to create the offense of criminal property damage to a public restroom if a person intentionally or knowingly damages a toilet, urinal, bathroom stall, mirror, or sink so as to render it unusable, or sets fire to a trash receptacle and defines public restroom and establishes penalties. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure with comments.

The Department agrees that criminal property damage is a problem and has concerns as to the time and cost to replace toilets, the affect to public health and safety if the restroom is closed for a period of time, as well as enforcement in relation to vandalism to restroom facilities in public parks.

The Department's expense to repair a single toilet is approximately \$500 per incident. On some of the neighbor islands, replacement parts are not readily available which would keep the restroom closed for extended periods of time, hence the concern with public health and safety. The Department appreciates that the bill proposes to address the concerns of vandalism, but would defer to law enforcement or the prosecutors as to the ability to enforce or prosecute a person who commits the offense intentionally or knowingly.

The Department's Division of State Parks does have administrative rules in place to cover criminal property damage (Section 13-146-32, Hawaii Administrative Rules).
