Chair Tokuda and members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill No. 855 SD 1. The purpose of this bill is to require that an application to register to vote shall constitute a request for an absentee ballot unless the applicant indicates they do not wish to be a permanent absentee voter.

The Office of Elections believes this bill will make voting more convenient by ensuring that every applicant will be mailed a ballot, unless they opt out and would prefer to vote in person.

TESTIMONY / SUPPORT with COMMENTS Corie Tanida, Executive Director, Common Cause Hawaii

Dear Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Dela Cruz, and members of the committee:

Common Cause Hawaii supports SB855 SD1 with comments. This bill provides that a submission of a voter registration application constitutes as a request for permanent absentee voter status unless the applicant declines.

We support this provision of this bill, but ask that you <u>reinsert the original contents (Section 11-A) of SB855</u>, which would establish Automatic Voter Registration in Hawaii. Section 11-A specifies that applications for civil identification cards or driver's licenses would not be processed until the applicant declined to register to vote or completed the registration affidavit. It also authorizes the electronic transfer of voter registration information from the counties and Department of Transportation, to election officials and the statewide voter registration system.

In Committee Report 513, it was noted that the contents of SB206 was very similar to Section 11-A of SB855, which is why the section was removed from SB855 SD1. While there are similarities, we note some of the key differences which highlights why SB855 is preferable and why Section 11-A should be reinserted.

- SB855 specifically states which information is to be transferred from DMVs to the Office of Elections. This
 will help alleviate privacy concerns, as not all of an applicant's information is needed in order to register to
 vote.
- SB855 requires applicant information to be electronically sent to the Office of Elections on a "real time" basis rather than the DOT just making the information accessible to the Office of Elections.
- SB855 specifically states that only the information of applicants who are United States citizens will be transferred to the Office of Elections, SB206 does not.

Automatic Voter Registration (AVR) is a critical step toward modernizing our elections system. With AVR:

- Elections will be more secure. The electronic transfer of data in real time will lead to fewer typos, duplicates, and lost forms, thus our voter rolls will be more accurate and the chances of voter fraud will be reduced.
- The state will save money. States that have upgraded their systems estimate it costs approximately 30 times less to process an electronic application than a paper application.¹

Automatic Voter Registration works. Oregon was the first state to implement this system in 2016. Over 270,000 were registered via Automatic Voter Registration, of those 42.73% (or 97,184) voted in the 2016 General Election, which helped Oregon set a new state record for number of votes cast.²

TESTIMONY Janet Mason, Legislative Co-Chair, League of Women Voters of Hawaii

Chair Tokuda, Vice-Chair Dela Cruz and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports SB 855, SD1 which provides that all applicants who are eligible to vote and apply for a driver's license will be automatically registered to vote (if not already registered to vote) unless the applicant affirmatively declines to register to vote.

This is excellent, much-needed legislation, if Hawaii is to make significant progress in improving its voter turnout. We will not be able to make inroads with voter turnout until we boost the number of persons registered to vote as a percent of those eligible to vote. One recent estimate is that about 36% of those eligible haven't registered.¹ Of course the League acknowledges motivating registered voters to vote also remains a challenge, and we are committed to working on this effort as well.

We are pleased that the actual affidavit for voter registration would be included as a part of these applications. This should satisfy provisions of the National Voter Registration Act that require an "opt out" clause. Likewise, we support automatically registering an application for registration as a permanent absentee voter.

The bill makes clear that information from County departments of motor vehicles should be transmitted electronically to the clerk of the county on a real-time basis and permits the counties to electronically share the voter registration data with the statewide voter registration system, so applications to vote can be processed in a timely way.

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The bill requires that for voter registration purposes data transmitted to the county clerk would include the digitized signature of the person who wishes to register. The bill also makes clear that databases operated by the counties or department of transportation should be electronically accessible to the statewide voter registration system. Though not the express purpose of this measure we fully expect these steps will also support quality voter registration data.

To us making data processing changes to correspond with this his bill are straightforward, so we respectfully request that the bill take effect upon its approval. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony.
