Chairs Keith-Agaran and Tokuda and Members of the Committees:

The Department of the Attorney General (the "Department") appreciates the amendments by the Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs to change the final reporting deadline for the working group report from the regular session of 2018 to the regular session of 2019, and to provide for an interim report for the regular session of 2018. But the Department continues to have concerns about the lack of resources and funding to conduct the requested effort.

This resolution requests that the Attorney General establish a working group to study the capabilities, staffing levels, case loads, and task completion times of forensic laboratories in the State, as well as accreditation requirements and other specific issues related to the operation of the forensic laboratories and the forensic testing conducted by those laboratories. The working group consists of at least seventeen members, including at least six from counties outside of Honolulu.

To carry out this endeavor, the Department anticipates that funds will be needed to cover the costs for airfare and ground transportation for representatives from the other counties to attend all of the working group meetings, as well as the costs for a working group coordinator who will facilitate the meetings, coordinate the collection, Testimony of the Department of the Attorney General Twenty-Ninth Legislature, 2017 Page 2 of 2

analysis, and compilation of data, conduct or coordinate necessary research efforts, and prepare the report from the working group.
