A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FILIPINO VETERANS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. For four long years in some of the bloodiest
 and deadliest battles of World War II, nearly one hundred
 thousand soldiers of the Philippine Commonwealth Army responded
 to President Roosevelt's call to arms, fighting alongside and
 serving as an integral part of the United States Armed Forces.

6 After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Filipinos 7 residing in the United States and the Territory of Hawaii also responded to President Roosevelt's call to arms. Despite being 8 9 initially rejected because they were not United States citizens, they remained undaunted and volunteered for the draft after 10 11 enactment of the Selective Training and Service Amendments Act, 12 which allowed Filipinos in the United States to enlist in the 13 United States Armed Forces, and enactment of the Second War 14 Powers Act, which authorized naturalization for Filipinos who served in the United States Armed Forces. As a result, more 15 16 than seven thousand Filipinos and Filipino Americans fought in



the 1st and 2nd Filipino Regiments of the United States Army in
 World War II.

3 During this period of time, the Allied forces experienced,4 among other tragedies:

5 (1) The fall of the Bataan Peninsula, wherein over
6 seventy-eight thousand members of the United States
7 Armed Forces were captured and nearly seven hundred
8 United States service members and from six thousand to
9 ten thousand Filipinos perished in the Bataan Death
10 March; and

11 (2) The fall of Corregidor, wherein eight hundred United
12 States and Filipino service members were killed and
13 eleven thousand were captured and distributed to
14 prisoner of war camps.

Persevering against all odds, guerrilla armies comprising
Filipino soldiers were vital in turning the tide to end the war.
They fought in bloody combat against foreign aggression and
assisted in intelligence missions and mop-up operations. They
were integral to the freeing of prisoners of war, including from
the Cabanatuan death camp and the Santo Tomas prisoner of war
camp. An estimated fifty-seven thousand Filipino soldiers died



in this courageous effort to reclaim the Philippines, fight
 fascism, and protect the free world.

3 The legislature finds that a Filipino Veterans Legacy 4 Exhibit would preserve, perpetuate, and share the legacy of the 5 Filipino veterans, including those from the Philippines, United 6 States, and Territory of Hawaii, who served loyally alongside 7 the Allied forces in World War II. Such an exhibit would 8 recognize and honor their uncommon commitment, valor, and 9 sacrifice, and develop a deeper understanding of their unique 10 place in American and global history.

11 The legislature further finds that there is broad support 12 in Hawaii for the recognition of veterans in general and 13 Filipino veterans of World War II in particular. There is also 14 national support, as evidenced by President Obama signing into 15 law a measure that awards those Filipino veterans the 16 Congressional Gold Medal.

17 The purpose of this Act is to make a one-time appropriation 18 of moneys for the planning, design, and establishment of a 19 Filipino Veterans Legacy Exhibit as a permanent exhibit at the 20 Honolulu International Airport; provided that volunteers shall 21 maintain the Filipino Veterans Legacy Exhibit.



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1 SECTION 2. The office of veterans' services, with the 2 assistance of the department of transportation and the 3 department of defense, shall plan, design, and establish a Filipino Veterans Legacy Exhibit as a permanent exhibit at the 4 5 Honolulu International Airport; provided that volunteers shall 6 maintain the Filipino Veterans Legacy Exhibit. The purpose of 7 the Filipino Veterans Legacy Exhibit shall be to preserve, perpetuate, and share the legacy of the Filipino veterans, 8 9 including those from the Philippines, United States, and Territory of Hawaii, who served loyally alongside the Allied 10 11 forces in World War II.

SECTION 3. The office of veterans' services shall report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2018 on the status of the establishment of a Filipino Veterans Legacy Exhibit.

16 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 for the 19 plans, design, and establishment of a Filipino Veterans Legacy 20 Exhibit in accordance with this Act.



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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of
 veterans' services for the purpose of this Act.

3 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
