HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

DECLARING HAWAII TO BE A HO'OKIPA (WELCOMING) STATE.

1 WHEREAS, the State motto "[u]a mau ke ea 'o ka `āina i ka pono, "which means, "[t]he life of the land is perpetuated in 2 3 righteousness," reminds us that our deepest community values compel us to welcome the visitor and care for the wanderer in 4 5 our midst; and 6 7 WHEREAS, the traditional Hawaiian value of ho'okipa, or open-hearted hospitality, calls us to welcome the visitor and 8 the stranger alike, and to unselfishly extend to others the best 9 that we have to give; and 10 11 WHEREAS, Hawaii is justifiably proud of its diverse 12 immigrant heritage, which has woven the many people of this 13 State into a rich tapestry of races, ancestral groups, 14 religions, cultures, and languages from all over the world; and 15 16 WHEREAS, Hawaii's unique spirit of inclusiveness allows its 17 diverse people to live in relative harmony because of our 18 19 respect and aloha for each other and our commitment to peace and justice; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, our state and county governments cultivate a culture of inclusion when they ensure that all people in our 23 communities receive equal protection under the law and 24 respectful treatment, without regard to their race, national 25 origin, ancestry, or citizenship status; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Hawaii's inclusionary and peaceful culture is now 28 threatened by inflammatory rhetoric and harsh federal policies 29 that vilify immigrants, divide communities and families, and 30

create fear and suspicion among different racial, ethnic, and 1 2 ancestral groups; and 3 WHEREAS, the executive branch of the federal government has 4 5 recently revived a program under section 287(q) of the Immigration and Nationality Act that allows a state or local law 6 enforcement entity to enter into a partnership with the 7 8 Immigration Control and Enforcement (ICE) division of the 9 Department of Homeland Security in order to receive delegated 10 authority for immigration enforcement within their jurisdictions; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, the enforcement of federal immigration laws is a function that is reserved to the federal government, and the 14 15 costs of which should be borne by the federal government; and 16 WHEREAS, the people of Hawaii already shoulder the costs of 17 18 providing health care, housing, education, and other social 19 services to migrants from various Pacific Island communities, 20 who were forced to leave their ancestral homelands because of 21 the devastating effects of some actions of the United States, such as the above-ground testing of nuclear weapons and the 22 23 building of large military installations that displaced islanders from the ancestral lands; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, it would be an injustice to Hawaii's residents for the State, or any of its political subdivisions, to expend 27 scarce state resources enforcing federal immigration policies 28 29 instead of providing for housing, education, transportation, medical care, and other basic human needs here in Hawaii; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, the involvement of state law enforcement officers in federal deportation programs and activities would alienate 33 34 members of our many communities and undermine the relationships between the State's law enforcement agencies and local 35 36 communities; and 37 38 WHEREAS, many other state and city governments across the 39 country have acted to protect their residents who are 40 undocumented immigrants by preventing local law enforcement agents from asking people about their immigration status or from 41

serving as federal agents to perform the duties reserved to
federal agents, and by ensuring that all residents have access
to state and county services, regardless of immigration status;
now, therefore,

6 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 7 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 8 of 2017, requests that the State of Hawaii and its political 9 subdivisions recognize that immigration is a federal function 10 and that local law enforcement agencies should decline to work 11 with federal immigration agencies; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State and its political 13 14 subdivisions are requested to not expend state or county funds by entering into any agreements under section 287(q) of the 15 Immigration and Nationality Act or any similar agreement with 16 the United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), or 17 18 by engaging in any other law enforcement activities that 19 collaborate with ICE or any other federal law enforcement agency in connection with the deportation of undocumented immigrants 20 who have not been convicted of committing a violent crime; and 21 22

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor is requested to appoint a Ho'okipa Commission to ensure a safe, secure, and welcoming community for everyone, including immigrants of every status, to promote respectful relations and collaboration between community members and agencies providing public safety services; and

30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 31 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; the Mayors 32 of the City and County of Honolulu and the Counties of Kauai, 33 Maui, and Hawaii; the Chairs of the respective county councils; 34 and the Chiefs of Police of the City and County of Honolulu and 35 the Counties of Kauai, Maui, and Hawaii; and the Chief Justice 36 of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

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
