Organization Background

Kahua Pa'a Mua, Inc. a Non Profit 501 (c)(3), organized April 2010. Since 2012, for the past 5 years, KPM has had numerous grant funded projects from Private foundations, County of Hawaii Research & Development, State of Hawaii Dept of Labor subawarded through the University of Hawaii West Oahu and UH Hilo.

Our Mission Statement: "To enhance communities through economic development, conservation/preservation, social and educational programs for youth and adults."

KPM has worked in partnership with The FFA on a State initiative to promote Agriculture in Youth and a strategic planning workshop for FFA on Hawaii Island. We have done Agriculture Internships for University Students, High School students, and adults interested in Agriculture to promote and secure our future of sustainable agriculture.

KPM has promoted Korean Natural Farming methodologies for over 5 years with various Workshops throughout the State. KPM has current grant funding for STEM : Understanding Microbial Importance in Soils in partnership with MIT, Dr. Kocar, Cho Global NF Institute & UofH CHTAR. Procedures in extraction of soil samples from Hoea Farm in IMO inputs and DNA testing of microbal contents of the IMO#4 done at MIT with shotgun Metagenomics sequencing. We currently also have a Mentorship program in areas of Natural Farming Inputs, Animal Husbandry, NF Crop production and Construction funded by Hauoli Mau Loa Foundation and Hawaii Community Foundation.

David Fuertes and his wife, Carol Fuertes – each with 30 yrs of agriculture, economic development, and youth mentorship related community service in North Kohala- initiated the formation of the non profit Kahua Pa'a Mua, Inc. for the benefit of the community. They recently piloted the Ho'okahua Ai Program translated "to build a foundation of nutrition, sustenance, communication, and sharing" – with 18 enthusiastic and dedicated Kohala youth.

Thoughout Mr. Fuertes' long career in Agriculture education, he has mentored many of the Leaders in our community who has chosen to give back to their community. The Principal of Kohala High School, at least 5 teachers in the Dept of Education & 3 Ag teachers in this State, 4 police officers, Business owner ATV Outfitters, Kohala Nursery Operations manager, Flumin Da Ditch (eco-tourism) Operations manager, Surety Kohala Mgr, Administrator of Hospital, etc. The second generation of farmers are these student's children and Mr. Fuertes even instills his infectious desire to work the land in the next generation. The successful lives of these former students are a testament to how "Mentorship" is a valuable tool to build productive civic minded members of our communities. Along with KPM staff, they look forward to supporting the youth of Kohala and the entire island home and state doing so via experiential education in sustainable food production methods.

Project: Hoea Natural Farming Learning Lab GIA State Legislature 2018-2019 Kahua Pa'a Mua, Inc. non profit

Kahua Pa'a Mua can be translated as "building a firm foundation". This statement illuminates each of our organization's goals, but especially the first: to build the capacity of our families. As families are the bedrock of our community, we can directly influence the well being of our communities by increasing their self-determination. Secondly, we aim to develop partnerships with a broad range of entities to meet our ultimate vision of food self-sufficiency. Production and consumption of locally-grown food has a number of benefits, including decreased dependence on imported goods, thriving local businesses, and improved population health. Third, we strive to provide meaningful education for youth and adults, passing on their knowledge of our Kupuna. Without community buy-in, willingness to learn, and contribution to this vision, we cannot continue to forge a path for the preservation of our communities.

Goals and Objectives

1- Goal: Develop and Maintain the Hoea Natural Farming Learning facilities for continuing education of those interested in Agriculture as a career. 2 PT laborers @ 15 hrs = 30hrs/wk on 5 acs crops/animals and additional 49 ac pasture. To hire (2) PT farm laborers for continual maintenance of crops and animals used at the Natural Farming Learning Lab. Animals require daily feed, water and occasional care with breeding, birthing, and raising. Crops require daily weed maintenance, irrigation, land prep, planting, & harvesting. Rotation of crops are key to keeping the farm in operation. Important to provide hands on training of those interested in Agriculture in best practices of farming and becoming sustainable in production crops and animals (cattle, pigs, chickens, & goats) when the farm is currently operational.

2- Goal: Provide education of innovative farming methods (NF) and to encourage the younger generation to continue family Agriculture operations. 10-20 students with ongoing projects (UHH interns & Ho'okahua Ai program) To encourage more young adults to take over family farms and train them in NF as a more efficient alternative to conventional farming. A 2007 Agriculture Census report on Hawaii's aging farmers population is 58.6 years old. We personally have had family farms go fallow (65+ acres in Waimea and Ahualoa) since retirement of family members who are unable and unwilling to continue crop and animal farming. There is no one younger to continue, price of supplies triple in costs including escalation of shipping and transportation. Natural Farming methods use 30% less water, inputs (fertilizers) are made on site without any shipping costs, and the Hoea farm will allow them "hands on" training.

3- Goal: Create education and hands on opportunities for the community to become selfreliant on food for themselves. Open to community for farm tours & workshop To encourage the communities to become self-sustaining in food production for their families especially in times of natural disasters and isolation as an island state. The immediate challenge to Hawaii's agriculture is a lack of knowledgeable workforce, and a critical need for expertise in the various agriculture opportunities available. KPM believes if we empower people with skills to feed themselves, they will survive. . .

Public purpose & target population

This Hoea Natural Farming Learning Lab will be available for education and training to the general public, youth and adults as an ongoing facility established for anyone interested in agriculture. Programs are currently supporting Palili 'O Kohala Cooperative of 6 families, a Mentorship program of 6 PT staff and 15-20 students with support from Hauoli Mau Loa Foundation, Grant from DLIR/UHH internships in STEM grants (50 persons in multiple partnerships). The Farm is visited at least 2-3 times monthly for a number of educational projects.

Pre-contact Hawai'i Island supported over 100,000 Hawaiians via systems of ahupua'a however Western influences have since disrupted Hawaiian resource management, affecting their health, wealth, education and cultural vitality. Lack of lands to farm, increasing land values for luxury homes, gated communities and fenced in with limited access to foraging practices for food, these are the realities of our island life today. Natural disaster, tidal waves, king tides, erosion, hurricanes, drought has been challenges to the farms with loss of production. Farms are struggling to feed our island population and people are not capable to produce their own table food, mostly for lack of knowledge, lost forage practices, and lack of education – KPM want to provide our communities with "hands on" training in food production, crops & animals. With every person who learns, we have enabled that person to provide to family and friends. Our target population is Youth and Adults throughout the State in our various communities with education on Agriculture opportunities. Empowering anyone with interest to feed themselves.

Geographic coverage

According to The Star Advertiser 11/19/17 "Farming our land", despite a state goal for good sustainability, myriad hurdles block the path to progress. Governor Ige's plan is to double Hawai'i food production by 2020. One of the challenges is lack of knowledgeable workforce and those with expertise to teach them. We need to grow a new generation of agriculturalists. The movement is to provide support for programs throughout the state that bring agriculture education into the schools, increasing interest and business entrepreneurism in the agriculture industry. Agriculture is a broad spectrum of opportunities not only crops and food but all the support industries of export in value added products and eco-tourism ventures, floriculture, Aquaculture, Equipment maintenance, irrigation support, electricians, plumbers, carpenters, etc.

This farm is located on 5 acres of which 1 acre in crops, 1 acre in fruit trees, ¹/₂ acre in pig and chicken building and a 40 x 60ft Quonset hut for class work. Cattle are on an expanded 49 acres in Kokoiki North Kohala. This farm is a Learning Lab providing hands on experiences to show the relevance of agriculture opportunities in everyday life.

We have hosted groups from New Zealand, South Korea, MIT – Mass Institute of Technology, Univ. of Hawaii, Catholic Charities, and Natural Farming workshops from throughout the State of Hawaii.

HACBED will also assess whether the project is delivering on the objectives by goal area and activity type. Each project output will be tracked and documented for total number of participants, number of hours/days of training classes and/or workshops held, and number of participants entering into job placement or start up business. Evaluations will assess outcomes and community impact and the extent to which participants have been able to utilize the new knowledge and skills they have gained through the project.

A successful project will give community members opportunities to gain passion for Agriculture technology by hands on workshops. Workshops in crop production, animal husbandry and STEM methods of Natural Farming inputs.

In regards to agriculture training and hands on experience by participants, this will be measured primarily by tracking the number of hours or workshops provided, program time for current participants Ho 'okahua Ai, additional participants in STEM project grants and internships and any more educational opportunities to access Hoea NF Learning Lab. For the broader community, numbers will be tracked for farm tours, presentations, Hoikes for existing program, and its impact on training. We will monitor number of training hours to evaluate hours required to prepare for extended opportunities in Agriculture. KPM will list any participants who actually continue in an agriculture related field or start an Ag business. The hours will be tracked through activity logs and workshop schedules. Again, HACBED will work closely with KPM staff and administrators to ensure that the data is accurate and is being collected on a regular basis.

2. Facilities

The projects are primarily held at the Natural Farming Learning Lab at Hoea Farms, North Kohala. The farm is located within the Ahupua'a of Hawi in the historic Kohala moku of Hawai'i Island, the fabled birthplace of King Kamehameha I. This place inspires stewardship of aina and perpetuation of Hawaiian culture in the context of a community known for agriculture abundance.

The easily accessible Learning Lab, located just outside of Hawi Town, consists of approximately 5 acres of fertile land, with 3 acres in cultivation of kalo, ti leaves, fruit trees and other vegetable crops. There is a 1,000 square ft. building containing a piggery and chicken pen, ideal for instruction in animal husbandry and construction. There is also a Quonset hut facility used as an education mentoring and learning space for haumana and mentors.

Additionally, David and Carol Fuertes have since 2016 established a new business called Kohala Meats & Deli which is still working on opening (waiting on County Planning permits), It will be a meat processing facility and retail outlet for student's projects of animals & crops. KPM recently established 5 swine pens at 4 mentee's residents to start them in raising hogs for sale to the Kohala Meats & Deli. One student has started filipino vegetables and kalo for sale at the local supermarkets. The KMD will partner with mentees in the program to provide a market for the crops and animals they raise, an experiential entrepreneurial opportunity aimed at community self-sufficiency and provision of healthy, affordable, local food.
