

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Homelessness is an issue affecting numerous 2 individuals throughout the country. To promote coordinated and 3 systemic strategies to address the issues facing homeless 4 individuals, the federal Department of Housing and Urban 5 Development requires state and local grant agencies and 6 organizations to establish continuums of care, which are 7 regional or local planning bodies that coordinate housing, 8 services, and funding for homeless families and individuals. 9 Nationwide, continuums of care and their member agencies receive 10 significant federal funding, which is often critical to maintain 11 necessary services. To remain eligible for federal funding, the 12 United States Department of Housing and Urban Development 13 requires continuums of care to conduct an annual point-in-time 14 count of homeless individuals who are in both sheltered and 15 unsheltered environments on a single, given night. The point-16 in-time count, which is essentially a nationwide census of 17 homeless individuals, is important because it aids the federal

- 2 amount of federal funds given to each state's continuum of care
- 3 agencies.
- 4 Point-in-time surveys are labor intensive and require large
- 5 numbers of canvassers to make direct contact with individuals
- 6 from a population that is inherently mobile and who may be
- 7 present in locations that are hard to find and hard to access.
- 8 The point-in-time count is conducted once a year, over the
- 9 course of one week, and currently relies on canvassing by
- 10 service providers who agree to donate their time outside of and
- 11 in addition to their regular duties and community volunteers.
- 12 Difficulty in recruiting adequate numbers of volunteers has made
- 13 it difficult to obtain accurate information on homelessness in
- 14 the State, which jeopardizes Hawaii's receipt of federal funds.
- 15 The legislature finds that offering a stipend to volunteers
- 16 who assist with the point-in-time count will help ensure that
- 17 the count is conducted appropriately to produce accurate results
- 18 as required for continued eligibility for federal funding.
- 19 SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 21 and to read as follows:

1 "§346- Point-in-time counts; volunteers; stipend. (a) 2 Any continuum of care that conducts a point-in-time count as a 3 condition of receiving federal homeless assistance from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development shall 4 5 offer a stipend of \$ to each volunteer who assists with 6 the conduct of the point-in-time count. 7 (b) For the purposes of this section: "Continuum of care" means the regional or local planning 8 body that coordinates housing, services, and funding for 9 10 homeless families and individuals. 11 "Point-in-time counts" means the annual count of sheltered and unsheltered homeless individuals and families conducted by a 12 continuum of care as a condition of eligibility for continued 13 funding from the United States Department of Housing and Urban 14 15 Development." 16 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 17 SECTION 4. 18 RODUCED HB HMS 2017-1561

Description:
