A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELEVATOR MECHANICS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Elevators are one of the safest modes of 2 transportation. There are an estimated eighteen billion
- 3 elevator trips taken per year in the United States. With the
- 4 continued vertical growth of urban Honolulu; including some
- 5 condominium developments that exceed forty floors, it is
- 6 important for Hawaii to ensure that state laws governing repair
- 7 and maintenance of elevators remain current. The elevator
- 8 mechanics' statute, chapter 448H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, has
- 9 not been updated in more than ten years.
- 10 Like many other sectors, the elevator industry is
- 11 undergoing rapid technological advancements which require
- 12 elevator mechanics to expand their knowledge and skills through
- 13 training and education to ensure that licensing standards and
- 14 core competencies are met. With the advancements in the
- 15 industry, it is necessary for mechanics to demonstrate core
- 16 competencies when installing, repairing, and maintaining all
- 17 elevators, escalators, and other vertical transportation.

1	The purpose of this Act is to strengthen regulatory
2	oversight of the licensed profession of elevator mechanics by
3	amending the permissible scope of work, apprenticeship and
4	licensing requirements, and remote interaction requirements.
5	SECTION 2. Chapter 448H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by adding five new sections to be appropriately
7	designated and to read as follows:
8	"§448H-A Examination. Every applicant shall be examined
9	and shall pass an examination to be eligible for licensure.
10	Every applicant shall:
1	(1) Pass the examination with not less than seventy per
12	cent correct; and
13	(2) Not be allowed to review any of the applicant's failed
14	examinations.
15	§448H-B License renewals; continuing education. (a)
16	Licenses shall expire on June 30 of each even-numbered year.
17	Licensees seeking renewal shall pay all applicable fees and
18	complete the continuing education requirements pursuant to
19	subsection (b).
20	(b) Prior to each license renewal, all licensed elevator

mechanics shall complete:

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1	(1)	An educational course, approved by the board, of no
2		less than eight hours related to the elevator
3		industry; or
4	(2)	A qualified elevator inspector continuing education
5		course of no less than eight hours offered by an
6		American National Standards Institute accredited
7		certifying organization.
8	<u>(c)</u>	An elevator mechanic initially licensed within one
9	year pric	or to the applicable renewal date shall not be required
10	to comple	te the eight hours of continuing education to renew the
11	elevator	mechanic's license.
12	<u>(d)</u>	The board may conduct random audits to determine
13	complianc	e with the continuing education requirement. The board
14	shall pro	ovide written notice of an audit to a licensee randomly
15	selected	for audit. Within sixty days of notification, the
16	licensee	shall provide the board documentation verifying
17	complianc	ce with the continuing education requirement established
18	by this s	section.
19	<u>§448</u>	Exemptions. Licensure as an elevator mechanic
20	shall not	be required for:

1	<u>(1)</u>	Dismantling or removing a conveyance; provided that
2		the conveyance will not be reused and the building or
3		structure, as defined by its foundation outline, is
4		totally secure from public and unauthorized access and
5		the entire building is completely demolished down to
6		and including the foundation; and
7	(2)	Employees of a contractor duly licensed under chapter
8		444 who enters into the contract to install, repair,
9		or remove the platform lift or stairway lift within a
10		private residence not accessible to the general public
11		or to other occupants in the building.
12	<u>§448</u>	H-D Elevator mechanics scope of work. All
13	construct	ion, reconstruction, alteration including flooring and
14	all eleva	tor cab work, maintenance, repair, troubleshooting,
15	mechanica	l, or electrical work or adjustments, which includes
16	but is no	t limited to updating software, changing parameters,
17	resetting	faults, and operation of all systems and functions,
18	shall be	performed by a licensed elevator mechanic. Work on
19	adjustmen	t of the structure or facility of which the conveyance
20	may be pa	rt or to which the conveyance may be attached,
21	including	any construction, reconstruction, alteration including

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- 1 flooring and all elevator cab work with the exclusion of
- 2 cleaning and painting, necessary for proper completion of the
- 3 work on the conveyance shall be performed by a licensed elevator
- 4 mechanic.
- 5 §448H-E Remote interaction. Remote interaction of a
- 6 conveyance shall not be permitted without the express permission
- 7 of a licensed elevator mechanic who shall be physically present
- 8 at the conveyance; provided that this requirement shall not
- 9 preclude remote interaction with the conveyance from within the
- 10 building or complex in which the conveyance is located if the
- 11 interaction is for the sole purpose of securing, locking, or
- 12 providing private use of the conveyance."
- 13 SECTION 3. Section 448H-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended as follows:
- 1. By adding two new definitions to be appropriately
- 16 inserted and to read:
- 17 ""Conveyance" means any elevator, dumbwaiter, stage lift,
- 18 mechanized parking garage elevator, escalator, moving walk or
- 19 ramp, or lift.

1 "Remote interaction" means an action to manipulate or 2 interact with the controls of a conveyance remotely, or from 3 within the building or complex." 4 2. By amending the definitions of "apprentice elevator 5 mechanic" and "elevator mechanic" to read: 6 ""Apprentice elevator mechanic" means any person who is 7 [in] enrolled in a registered apprenticeship program under an 8 apprenticeship agreement registered with the department of labor 9 and industrial relations, a state apprenticeship counsel, or the 10 Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training of the federal Department 11 of Labor and is actively training to acquire the skill to become 12 an elevator mechanic, and who is required to work for [at least 13 four years] no less than four and one half years full time or 14 its equivalent, but not less than nine thousand hours under the 15 direct supervision of an elevator mechanic duly licensed under 16 section 448H-6. **17** "Elevator mechanic" means any person who engages in the **18** construction, reconstruction, alteration, maintenance, repair, 19 troubleshooting, mechanical, or electrical work or adjustments, 20 which includes but is not limited to updating software, changing 21 parameters, resetting faults, and the operation of all systems

and functions, of any [elevator, dumbwaiter, stage lift, 1 2 mechanized parking garage elevator, escalator, moving walk or 3 ramp, lift] conveyance including any construction, 4 reconstruction, alteration, or adjustment of the structure or 5 facility of which the same may be a part or to which the same 6 may be attached, necessary for proper completion of the work on 7 the [elevator, dumbwaiter, stage lift, mechanized parking garage 8 elevator, escalator, moving walk or ramp, or lift.] conveyance." 9 SECTION 4. Section 448H-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 10 amended to read as follows: 11 "§448H-5 Powers and duties of the board. In addition to 12 any other powers and duties authorized by law, the board shall: **13** (1) Adopt rules in accordance with chapter 91 to carry out 14 the purposes of this chapter; 15 (2) Develop, apply, review and upgrade appropriate **16** techniques, including examinations and investigations **17** for determining whether a person meets the 18 requirements of this chapter and standards to insure 19 that elevator mechanics will be persons qualified to 20 serve as such;

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1	(3)	Prescribe, at a minimum, that a nationally recognized
2		examination, augmented with locally developed
3		material, be used in testing for licensure[, the
4		passing grade for the examination to be not less than
5		<pre>seventy per cent];</pre>
6	(4)	Issue licenses to persons determined, after
7		application of those techniques, to have met the
8		required qualifications and revoke or suspend
9		licenses[-] previously issued by the board, pursuant
10		to hearings held in accordance with chapter 91, in any
11		case where the individual holding any license is
12		determined substantially to have failed to conform to
13		the required qualifications, this chapter, or the
14		rules of the board;
15	(5)	Establish and carry out procedures designed to insure
16		that persons licensed as elevator mechanics will,
17		during any period they serve as such, comply with the
18		requirements of this chapter, the rules of the board,
19		and chapter 397 and rules adopted thereunder;

(6) Receive, investigate, and take appropriate action with

respect to, any charge or complaint filed with the

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1		board to the effect that any individual licensed as an
2		elevator mechanic has failed to comply with the
3		requirements of this chapter regarding any complaint
4		regarding job performance by mechanics, the rules of
5		the board, or chapter 397 and the rules adopted
6		thereunder;
7	[-(7)-	Register apprentice elevator mechanics;
8	(8)]	(7) Maintain a record of its proceedings;
9	[(9)]	(8) Assist and advise the department of labor and
10		industrial relations in the adoption of rules relating
11		to the conditions of work for elevator mechanics
12		including requirements related to equipment or
13		facilities essential for the safe installation,
14		repair, maintenance, or alteration of any [elevator,
15		dumbwaiter, escalator, moving walk or ramp, and lift;]
16		conveyance; and
17	[(10)]	(9) Notify the department of labor and industrial
18		relations of any fact or situation that, in the
19		opinion of the board, constitutes a violation of
20		chapter 397 or of any rule adopted thereunder."

1	SECT.	ION 5. Section 448H-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to	o read as follows:
3	"§44	8H-6 Qualifications for license. No person shall be
4	licensed	as an elevator mechanic unless the person has
5	satisfact	orily passed the examination administered by the board
6	and [sati	sfactorily completed at least four years of training
7	under the	supervision of a licensed elevator mechanic.] has met
8	the follo	wing minimum qualifications:
9	(1)	The applicant has obtained a certificate of completion
10		from an apprenticeship program registered with the
11		department of labor and industrial relations, a state
12		apprenticeship counsel, or the Bureau of
13		Apprenticeship and Training of the federal Department
14		of Labor and has successfully passed the elevator
15		mechanic's examination of a nationally-recognized
16		training program as approved by the board with
17		standards similar to but not less than those set forth
18		by the National Elevator Industry Educational Program;
19		and
20	(2)	The applicant has satisfactorily completed no less
21		than four and one-half years full time work or its

1		equivalent, but not less than nine thousand hours,
2		under the direct supervision of an elevator mechanic
3		duly licensed under section 448H-6. The board shall,
4		by rule, establish the terms for the verification of
5		time in the industry."
6	SECT	ION 6. Section 448H-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended to	o read as follows:
8	"§448	3H-7 Temporary permit. The board may issue a
9	temporary	permit to [any] the following:
10	(1)	Any person who has qualified as an elevator mechanic
11		in another state with standards substantially equal to
12		those of this chapter and who possesses skills or
13		training not available in the State[+ provided that
14		the board shall not register any such person as an
15		apprentice elevator mechanic]. The board shall, by
16		rules and regulations, establish the terms of the
17		temporary permit[-]; and
18	(2)	An elevator mechanic apprentice who has a minimum of
19		three years full time work experience, but not less
20		than six thousand hours, under the direct supervision
21		of an elevator mechanic duly licensed under section

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1	448H-6, if there is a shortage of elevator mechanics
2	in the State. The board shall, by rule, establish the
3	terms for the determination of a shortage of elevator
4	mechanics, the verification of time in the industry,
5	and the terms of the apprentice's temporary permit."
6	SECTION 7. Section 448H-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended to read as follows:
8	"§448H-8 Fees. Application, examination, license,
9	temporary permit, and biennial renewal fees shall be as provided
10	in rules adopted by the director of commerce and consumer
11	affairs pursuant to chapter 91. A fee is required for each
12	reexamination. Application fees are not refundable.
13	[Licenses shall expire on June 30 of each even-numbered
14	year.]"
15	SECTION 8. In codifying the new sections added by section
16	2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
17	appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
18	the new sections in this Act.
19	SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
21	SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
