A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO A YOUTH COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that increasing youth
- 2 participation in the public policymaking process is a vital
- 3 state interest. Hawaii has the lowest youth voter participation
- 4 rate in the United States. In 2008, Hawaii had the lowest voter
- 5 participation rate among eighteen to twenty-nine year olds in
- 6 the country, at thirty-one per cent, compared to fifty-seven per
- 7 cent voter participation among those thirty years of age and
- 8 older.
- 9 The legislature further finds that youth aged sixteen and
- 10 seventeen may legally work, pay taxes, marry, and drive.
- 11 However, they are denied a formal role in the political process
- 12 because they are prohibited from voting. Although youth under
- 13 the age of eighteen may not vote, they deserve access and input
- 14 through other means to the policymaking process.
- Many of the most persistent issues facing the State, such
- 16 as affordable housing, jobs, and education, primarily affect
- 17 youth. Youth are the ones who need a place to live, depend on

- 1 good employment to support themselves and their families, and
- 2 seek quality education for their children, if applicable. Yet
- 3 after many decades, these issues remain among the most difficult
- 4 to address.
- 5 The legislature further finds that a youth commission would
- 6 enable a greater role for young people in the policymaking
- 7 process. Furthermore, the legislature and governor would
- 8 benefit from additional formal input from youth on the effect of
- 9 legislation on young people in the State.
- 10 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 11 (1) Establish a youth commission within the office of
- 12 youth services to advise the governor and legislature
- on the effects of legislative policies, needs,
- 14 assessments, priorities, programs, and budgets
- concerning the youth of the State; and
- 16 (2) Appropriate funds for the hiring of one staff position
- 17 to administer the youth commission and other
- administration costs.
- 19 SECTION 2. Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 21 and to read as follows:

1	" <u>§35</u>	2D- Youth commission. (a) There is established
2	within th	e office of youth services, for administrative purposes
3	only, a y	outh commission to advise the governor and legislature
4	on the ef	fects of legislative policies, needs, assessments,
5	prioritie	s, programs, and budgets concerning the youth of the
6	State.	
7	(b)	The commission shall:
8	(1)	Respond to requests for comment and recommendation on
9		matters referred to it by the governor or legislature;
10	(2)	Conduct research and community outreach regarding the
11		needs of the youth of Hawaii, including but not
12		limited to increasing youth participation in
13		government and public policy;
14	(3)	Make recommendations addressing the concerns and needs
15		of the youth of Hawaii; and
16	(4)	Report to the governor and legislature the activities,
17		goals, and accomplishments of the commission by July 1
18		of each calendar year beginning on July 1, 2019.
19	(c)	The youth commission shall consist of fifteen members
20	between t	he ages of fourteen and twenty-four and shall not be
21	subject t	o section 26-34. Of the members:

1	<u>(1)</u>	Five members shall be appointed by the governor;
2		provided that the governor shall ensure that each
3		county is represented by at least one appointee;
4		provided further that the governor shall ensure that
5		at least one member is a previous recipient of youth
6		services;
7	(2)	Five members shall be appointed by the president of
8		the senate; and
9	(3)	Five members shall be appointed by the speaker of the
10		house of representatives;
11	provided	that the president of the senate and the speaker of the
12	house of	representatives shall appoint members representing the
13	diversity	of the State.
14	<u>(d)</u>	Each member shall be appointed for a term of two
15	years; pr	ovided that the initial terms of the appointed members
16	shall be	staggered as follows:
17	(1)	Six members, two each appointed by the governor, the
18		president of the senate, and the speaker of the house
19		of representatives, to serve three-year terms;

1	(2)	Six members, two each appointed by the governor, the	
2		president of the senate, and the speaker of the house	
3		of representatives, to serve two-year terms; and	
4	(3)	Three members, one each appointed by the governor, the	
5		president of the senate, and the speaker of the house	
6		of representatives, to serve one-year terms.	
7	<u>(e)</u>	The youth commission shall annually elect a	
8	chairpers	on.	
9	(f)	Eight members of the youth commission shall constitute	
10	a quorum	to do business. Any action taken by the commission	
11	shall be	validated by a simple majority of the quorum.	
12	(g)	The youth commission members may invite other	
13	individua	els to participate in commission activities as	
14	temporary	, nonvoting members.	
15	(h)	If the governor, president of the senate, or speaker	
16	of the ho	ouse of representatives fails to appoint a member to the	
17	youth commission for any reason within six months after a		
18	vacancy c	occurs, the commission by a majority vote may appoint a	
19	person who satisfies the requirements of this section to the		
20	commissic	on to fill the vacancy."	

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- 1 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for
- 4 the hiring of one staff position to administer the youth
- 5 commission and other associated administrative costs.
- 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 7 youth services for the purposes of this Act.
- 8 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 9 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.
