### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LANDSCAPE WORKFORCE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many pesticides are
- 2 hazardous to human health, causing negative reproductive and
- 3 developmental effects, cancer, kidney and liver damage, and
- 4 endocrine disruption. However, many of the harmful effects of
- 5 pesticides can be avoided through proper pesticide application,
- 6 handling, and storage.
- 7 The legislature further finds that individuals who apply
- 8 pesticides as part of their occupations are particularly
- 9 susceptible to the harmful effects of pesticides due to their
- 10 frequent exposure. Many of these individuals lack proper
- 11 training on the use of pesticides, fail to take proper safety
- 12 precautions, and unnecessarily expose themselves to these
- 13 chemicals.
- 14 The purpose of this Act is to protect landscape workers who
- 15 regularly apply general use pesticides by requiring them to
- 16 participate in a certification program for the proper use of
- 17 those pesticides.



1	SECTION 2. Section 149A-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding two new definitions to be appropriately
3	inserted and to read as follows:
4	"Certified general use pesticide applicator" means any
5	individual who is certified under section 149A-33(6) as
6	authorized to use or supervise the use of any general use
7	pesticide.
8	"Landscape workforce member" means any person who performs
9	work in the landscape industry for a fee, including gardeners,
10	groundskeepers, greenskeepers, and landscapers."
11	SECTION 3. Section 149A-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
13	"(b) It shall be unlawful [to]:
14	(1) [Detach, To detach, alter, deface, or destroy, in
15	whole or in part, any label or alter any labeling of a
16	pesticide unless it is approved by the department to
17	correct an improper label or labeling under section
18	24(c), FIFRA;
19	(2) [Add] To add any substance to, or take any substance
20	from, a pesticide in a manner that may defeat the
21	purpose of this chapter;

•	(3)	[USE] 101 a person s own advantage of reveal
2		any information relative to formulas of products
3		acquired in the administration of this chapter, to
4		persons other than to the chairperson or proper
5		officials or employees of the State or the federal
6		government; to the courts of this State or the federal
7		government in response to a subpoena; to physicians;
8		or, in emergencies, to pharmacists and other qualified
9		persons for use in the preparation of antidotes;
10	(4)	For any pesticide dealer, wholesaler, or retailer to
11		expose or to offer for sale or to solicit or receive
12		orders for the sale of restricted use pesticides
13		unless the dealer, wholesaler, or retailer has applied
14		for and has obtained a license from the department;
15	(5)	For any pesticide dealer, wholesaler, or retailer to
16		expose or to offer for sale or to solicit or receive
17		orders for the sale of restricted use pesticides to
18		any person other than a certified pesticide
19		applicator;
20	(6)	For any pesticide dealer, wholesaler, or retailer to
21		make any verbal or written claim or representation

1		relating to any pesticide product that is inconsistent
2		with the specific pesticide product label; [or]
3	(7)	For any pesticide dealer to expose to, offer for sale
4		to, or solicit or receive orders for the sale of
5		restricted use pesticides to any pest control operator
6		or to an employee of the pest control operator acting
7		on the pest control operator's behalf without
8		satisfactory proof that the pest control operator
9		holds, or has held within the previous one hundred
10		twenty days, a pest control license and, when
11		applicable, without satisfactory proof that the
12		employee is employed by the pest control operator $[\cdot]$ :
13		<u>or</u>
14	(8)	For any landscape workforce member to apply any
15		general use pesticide in the course of business unless
16		the landscape workforce member is a certified general
17		use pesticide applicator."
18	SECT	ION 4. Section 149A-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended t	o read as follows:

1	"§14	9A-33 Rules. The department shall have the authority
2	to carry	out and effectuate the purpose of this chapter by
3	rules, in	cluding but not limited to the following:
4	(1)	To establish fees, procedures, conditions, and
5		standards to certify persons for the use of restricted
6		use pesticides under section 4 of FIFRA;
7	(2)	To establish limitations and conditions for the
8		application of pesticides by aircraft, power rigs,
9		mist blowers, and other equipment;
10	(3)	To establish, as necessary, specific standards and
11		guidelines which specify those conditions which
12		constitute unreasonable adverse effects on the
13		environment;
14	(4)	To establish, as necessary, record keeping
15		requirements for pesticide use by applicators; [and]
16	(5)	To establish, as necessary, procedures for the
17		issuance of guidelines to specify those conditions
18		that constitute use of a pesticide in a manner
19		inconsistent with its label[-]; and
20	(6)	To establish fees, procedures, conditions, and
21		standards to certify landscape workforce members as

I	general use pesticide applicators; provided that the
2	certification process shall occur on an annual basis
3	and include a requirement that a landscape workforce
4	member participate in at least one general use
5	pesticide training workshop or educational program
6	prior to initial certification as a certified general
7	use pesticide applicator."
8	SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
9	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
10	begun before its effective date.
11	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.
