A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

The legislature finds that naturopathic 1 SECTION 1. physicians provide skilled and quality care to patients 2 throughout the State. Naturopathic physicians also work to 3 promote integrated health care, such as the use and application 4 of hormone therapy. Although naturopathic physicians in Hawaii 5 6 have limited prescriptive authority, they are unable to prescribe controlled substances. For instance, testosterone is 7 an example of a controlled substance that is consistent with the 8 9 practice of naturopathic medicine but is omitted from the drug formulary from which naturopathic physicians may prescribe in 10 11 Hawaii.

12 The legislature further finds that naturopathic physicians 13 are known for their expertise in bio-identical hormone 14 replacement therapy, including the use of estrogens, 15 progesterone, and testosterone. The legislature also finds that 16 licensed naturopathic physicians in Hawaii should have 17 prescriptive authority for testosterone, as it is a controlled



substance that is consistent with the practice of naturopathic 1 medicine. The legislature notes that the prescription of 2 certain other controlled substances, such as narcotic drugs, are 3 not considered consistent with naturopathic practice and should 4 not be included in the naturopathic formulary. The legislature 5 6 also notes that controlled substances have been included in the prescriptive authority for naturopathic physicians in other 7 states, such as Arizona, California, Oregon, and Washington. 8 9 The purpose of this Act is to authorize a naturopathic physician to prescribe testosterone consistent with naturopathic 10 11 medical practice. 12 SECTION 2. Chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 14 and to read as follows: 15 "§455- Testosterone; authorization. Subject to any 16 requirements imposed by the department of public safety and the 17 federal Drug Enforcement Administration, a naturopathic physician may register with the department of public safety 18 pursuant to section 329-33 and may obtain a current federal Drug 19 Enforcement Administration registration to prescribe and 20 21 administer testosterone."



SECTION 3. Section 329-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1 amended by amending the definition of "practitioner" to read as 2 3 follows: ""Practitioner" means: 4 5 A physician, dentist, veterinarian, scientific (1) investigator, or other person licensed and registered 6 under section 329-32 to distribute, dispense, or 7 conduct research with respect to a controlled 8 substance in the course of professional practice or 9 research in this State; 10 (2) An advanced practice registered nurse with 11 prescriptive authority licensed and registered under 12 section 329-32 to prescribe and administer controlled 13 substances in the course of professional practice in 14 this State; [and] 15 A pharmacy, hospital, or other institution licensed, 16 (3) registered, or otherwise permitted to distribute, 17 dispense, conduct research with respect to or to 18 19 administer a controlled substance in the course of professional practice or research in this State [-]; 20 21 and



1	(4) A naturopathic physician licensed pursuant to chapter		
2	455 who is licensed and registered to prescribe and		
3	administer testosterone in the course of professional		
4	practice in this State."		
5	SECTION 4. Chapter 455-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
6	amended as follows:		
7	1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted		
8	and to read:		
9	""Testosterone" means the schedule III drug identified in		
10	section 329-18(g)(24)."		
11	2. By amending the definition of "naturopathic formulary"		
12	to read:		
13	""Naturopathic formulary" means vitamins, minerals, dietary		
14	supplements, botanical medicines, homeopathic medicines,		
15	hormones, and those legend drugs and testosterone consistent		
16	with naturopathic medical practice[-]; provided that the		
17	naturopathic formulary shall not include any narcotic drugs, as		
18	defined in section 329-1."		
19	SECTION 5. Section 455-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
20	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

habitual user of a narcotic, barbiturate, amphetamine, 1 2 hallucinogen, or other drug having similar effects; 3 (9) Practicing naturopathic medicine while the ability to practice is impaired by alcohol, drug, physical 4 disability, or mental instability; 5 Procuring a license through fraud, misrepresentation, 6 (10)or deceit or knowingly permitting an unlicensed person 7 to perform activities requiring a license; 8 Professional misconduct or gross carelessness or 9 (11)manifest incapacity in the practice of naturopathic 10 11 medicine: Conduct or practice contrary to recognized standard of 12 (12)ethics of the naturopathic profession; 13 Using medical service or treatment [which] that is 14 (13) inappropriate or unnecessary; 15 Submitting to or filing with the board any notice, 16 (14) 17 statement, or other document required under this chapter [which] that is false or untrue or contains 18 any material misstatement of fact, including any false 19 certification of compliance with the continuing 20 education requirement specified under section 455-8; 21
