#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF PHARMACY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that there is a need for SECTION 1. more access to healthcare professionals, particularly registered 2 pharmacists, who can safely provide certain health care services 3 4 to achieve positive health outcomes for patients. Pharmacists 5 provide the most direct access for patients to resolve public health issues with minimum impact to the overall health system. 6 Technology has changed the delivery of healthcare over the last 7 . 8 thirty years, leaving the description of the practice of 9 pharmacy inaccurate. Pharmacy education has changed over the 10 years from an apprentice program to a six-year doctorate program 11 that includes education assessment training and a year of internship working as a pharmacist intern team member. Pharmacy 12 education now includes immunization and smoking cessation 13 training, along with other specialty training so that 14 pharmacists are well prepared to take some of the public health 15 burden to give all patients the access they deserve to improve 16 their quality of life. A good example of how the pharmacists' 17

- 1 role can impact public health and cost is shown with
- 2 immunization since pharmacists were given limited providership
- 3 about fifteen years ago. Pharmacists now immunize more patients
- 4 than any other healthcare professionals and immunization rates
- 5 have grown, reducing disease and morbidity in the overall
- 6 population.
- Registered pharmacists who receive proper training, working
- 8 under written protocols, will be able to:
- 9 (1) Provide healthcare services such as furnishing
- Naloxone and Epi-pens;
- 11 (2) Administer immunizations and vaccines for bacterial
- and viral infections such as influenza, pneumonia, and
- hepatitis A;
- 14 (3) Furnish and counsel patients on self-administered
- 15 hormonal conception and smoking cessation replacement
- 16 therapy; and
- 17 (4) Order and perform laboratory tests to determine
- appropriate medication use and outcomes.
- 19 The legislature further finds that the disciplines of
- 20 medicine, nursing, and naturopathy are complemented by
- 21 registered pharmacists and that pharmacists are essential as



- 1 part of the primary healthcare team to serve the interests of
- 2 the patient and the public health in general.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to modernize the scope of the
- 4 practice of pharmacy to allow pharmacists to furnish specific
- 5 medications and services that directly impact public health and
- 6 the cost of healthcare.
- 7 SECTION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended as follows:
- 9 1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
- 10 and to read:
- ""Furnish" or "furnishing" means to supply by any means, by
- 12 sale or otherwise."
- 13 2. By amending the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to
- 14 read:
- ""Practice of pharmacy" means:
- 16 (1) (A) The interpretation and evaluation of prescription
- orders; the compounding, dispensing, and labeling
- 18 of drugs and devices (except labeling by a
- manufacturer, packer, or distributor of
- 20 nonprescription drugs and commercially legend
- 21 drugs and devices); the participation in drug

1	selection and drug utilization reviews; the
2	proper and safe storage of drugs and devices and
3	the maintenance of proper records therefor; the
4	responsibility for advising when necessary or
5	where regulated, of therapeutic values, content,
6	hazards, and use of drugs and devices;
7 <u>(B)</u>	Ordering drug therapy related laboratory tests;
8 <u>(C)</u>	Administering:
9	(i) Immunizations orally, by injection, or by
10	intranasal delivery, to persons eighteen
11	years of age or older by a pharmacist having
12	appropriate training that includes programs
13	approved by the Accreditation Council for
14	Pharmacy Education (ACPE), curriculum-based
15	programs from an ACPE-accredited college of
16	pharmacy, or programs recognized by the
17	board; provided that after the vaccination
18	is administered, the pharmacist shall
19	provide within five business days to the
20	department of health immunization registry a
21	vaccination record including the patient's

1		name and date of birth, the type of vaccine
2		administered, and the date and location that
3		the vaccine was administered, the name of
4		the vaccine product that was administered,
5		including the manufacturer, lot number, and
6		expiration date, the method of
7		administration, and the anatomical site of
8		administration;
9	<u>(ii)</u>	Immunizations orally, by injection, or by
10		intranasal delivery to persons between
11		fourteen and seventeen years of age pursuant
12		to section 461-11.4 by a pharmacist having
13		appropriate training that includes programs
14		approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based
15		programs from an ACPE-accredited college of
16		pharmacy, or programs recognized by the
17		board; and
18	(iii)	Human papillomavirus, Tdap (tetanus,
19		diphtheria, pertussis), meningococcal, and
20		influenza vaccines to persons between eleven
21		and seventeen years of age pursuant to



1		section 461-11.4 by a pharmacist having
2		appropriate training that includes programs
3		approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based
4		programs from an ACPE-accredited college of
5		pharmacy, or programs recognized by the
6		board;
7	(D)	Transmitting a valid prescription to another
8		pharmacist for the purpose of filling or
9		dispensing;
10	<u>(E)</u>	Providing consultation, information, or education
11		to patients and health care professionals based
12		on the pharmacist's training and for which no
13		other licensure is required; and
14	<u>(F)</u>	Furnishing an opioid antagonist, epinephrine auto
15		injector, hormonal contraception, travel
16		medications, and tobacco cessation nicotine
17		replacement therapy by a pharmacist who has
18		received appropriate training, including programs
19		approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based programs
20		from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, or
21		programs recognized by the board;

1	(4)	refronking the following procedures of functions as
2		part of the care provided by and in concurrence with a
3		"health care facility" and "health care service" as
4		defined in section 323D-2, or a "pharmacy" or a
5		licensed physician or a licensed advanced practice
6		registered nurse with prescriptive authority, or a
7		"managed care plan" as defined in section 432E-1, in
8		accordance with written policies, procedures, [or]
9		protocols, or standing orders issued to an individual
10		pharmacist or a pharmacy and developed collaboratively
11		by health professionals, including physicians and
12		surgeons, pharmacists, and registered nurses, and for
13		which a pharmacist has received appropriate training
14		required by these policies, procedures, or protocols:
15		(A) Ordering or performing routine drug therapy
16		related patient assessment procedures;
17		[(B) Ordering drug therapy related laboratory tests;
18		(C) [B] Initiating emergency contraception oral drug
19		therapy in accordance with a written
20		collaborative agreement approved by the board,
21		between a licensed physician or advanced practice

1		registered nurse with prescriptive authority and
2		a pharmacist who has received appropriate
3		training that includes programs approved by the
4		[American Council of Pharmaceutical Education
5		<pre>(]ACPE[+], curriculum-based programs from an</pre>
6		ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, state or
7		local health department programs, or programs
8		recognized by the board of pharmacy;
9	[ <del>(D)</del> ]	(C) Administering drugs orally, topically, by
10		intranasal delivery, or by injection, pursuant to
11		the order of the patient's licensed physician or
12		advanced practice registered nurse with
13		prescriptive authority, by a pharmacist having
14		appropriate training that includes programs
15		approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based programs
16		from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy,
17		[state or local health department programs,] or
18		programs recognized by the board of pharmacy;
19	[ <del>(E)</del>	Administering:
20		(i) Immunizations orally, by injection, or by
21		intranasal delivery, to persons eighteen

1		years of age or older by a pharmacist having
2		appropriate training that includes programs
3		approved by the ACPE, curriculum based
4		programs from an ACPE accredited college of
5		pharmacy, state or local health department
6		programs, or programs recognized by the
7		board of pharmacy;
8	<del>(ii)</del>	Vaccines to persons between fourteen and
9		seventeen years of age pursuant to section
10		<del>461-11.4; and</del>
11	<del>(iii)</del>	Human papillomavirus, Tdap (tetanus,
12		diphtheria, pertussis), meningococcal, and
13		influenza vaccines to persons between eleven
14		and seventeen years of age pursuant to
15		section 461-11.4;
16	<del>(F)</del> ] <u>(D)</u>	As authorized by the written instructions of
17	a li	censed physician or advanced practice
18	regi	stered nurse with prescriptive authority,
19	init	iating or adjusting the drug regimen of a
20	pati	ent pursuant to an order or authorization
21	made	by the patient's licensed physician or

	advanced practice registered nurse with
	prescriptive authority and related to the
	condition for which the patient has been seen by
	the licensed physician or advanced practice
	registered nurse with prescriptive authority;
	provided that the pharmacist shall issue written
	notification to the patient's licensed physician
	or advanced practice registered nurse with
	prescriptive authority or enter the appropriate
	information in an electronic patient record
	system shared by the licensed physician or
	advanced practice registered nurse with
	prescriptive authority, within twenty-four hours;
<del>G)</del> -	Transmitting a valid prescription to another
	pharmacist for the purpose of filling or
	dispensing;
<del>H)</del>	Providing consultation, information, or education
	to patients and health care professionals based
	on the pharmacist's training and for which no
	other licensure is required; or



1	(I) Dispensing an opioid antagonist in accordance
2	with a written collaborative agreement approved
3	by the board, between a licensed physician and a
4	pharmacist who has received appropriate training
5	that includes programs approved by the ACPE,
6	curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited
7	college of pharmacy, state or local health
8	department programs, or programs recognized by
9	the board;
10	(3) The offering or performing of those acts, services,
11	operations, or transactions necessary in the conduct,
12	operation, management, and control of pharmacy; and
13	(4) Prescribing and dispensing contraceptive supplies
14	pursuant to section 461-11.6."
15	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
16	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
17	begun before its effective date.
18	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
19	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
