### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF PHARMACY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that there is a need for SECTION 1. 2 more access to healthcare professionals, particularly registered pharmacists, who can safely provide certain health care services 3 4 to achieve positive health outcomes for patients. Pharmacists 5 provide the most direct access for patients to resolve public 6 health issues with minimum impact to the overall health system. Technology has changed the delivery of healthcare over the last 7 8 thirty years, leaving the description of the practice of 9 pharmacy inaccurate. Pharmacy education has changed over the 10 years from an apprentice program to a six-year doctorate program 11 that includes education assessment training and a year of 12 internship working as a pharmacist intern team member. Pharmacy 13 education now includes immunization and smoking cessation 14 training, along with other specialty training so that 15 pharmacists are well prepared to take some of the public health 16 burden to give all patients the access they deserve to improve 17 their quality of life.
