# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. For many years, the State has used homeless 2 shelters and transitional group homes as an interim measure
- 3 while attempting to place as many persons experiencing
- 4 homelessness as possible into subsidized rentals and
- 5 traditionally-constructed apartments. Economic constraints,
- 6 construction delays, and landlords' resistance to homeless
- 7 tenants have made the supply of subsidized rentals and
- 8 traditionally-constructed housing inadequate to meet the demand
- 9 by persons experiencing homelessness. In addition, many persons
- 10 who struggle with mental illness or substance abuse are forced
- 11 to live unsheltered because they cannot reside in close quarters
- with others in a shelter or group home.
- 13 However, recent technical innovations have made it possible
- 14 to build enough dwellings for every homeless person in Hawaii at
- 15 a lower cost than what the State spends on the ancillary costs
- 16 for unsheltered and nomadic homeless persons. These innovations
- 17 will allow the State to place more individuals experiencing

- 1 homelessness into housing more expeditiously and in accordance
- 2 with housing first principles.
- 3 Multiple national studies show that housing first programs
- 4 are enormously effective, mostly because the programs combine
- 5 the stability of a permanent home with supportive services and
- 6 treatment. As a result, housing first programs also foster
- 7 recovery from addiction, mental illness, and other afflictions
- 8 of homeless persons.
- 9 The legislature finds that chronic, unsheltered, nomadic
- 10 homelessness is a humanitarian disaster endangering public
- 11 health and safety. The legislature also finds that there is
- 12 sufficient under- or unutilized state land suitable for the
- 13 construction of homeless villages. The legislature further
- 14 finds that the use of current technology to build homeless
- 15 villages on state land will allow the State to create housing
- 16 and implement housing first principles on a scale large enough
- 17 to greatly reduce if not end homelessness in Hawaii.
- 18 The purpose of this Act is to increase efforts to reduce
- 19 homelessness by identifying certain parcels of state land for
- 20 the purpose of establishing homeless villages that will provide
- 21 approximately eight thousand units for individuals experiencing

- 1 homelessness; providing assessments, services, and referral
- 2 services for individuals within the homeless villages under a
- 3 housing first paradigm; and providing government employees and
- 4 volunteers with immunity for injuries and damages resulting from
- 5 the provision of services to individuals experiencing
- 6 homelessness.
- 7 SECTION 2. This Act shall be known as the Puuhonua
- 8 homeless villages act.
- 9 SECTION 3. (a) The governor shall take all steps and
- 10 engage in all actions necessary to identify parcels of land for
- 11 the purpose of providing housing and supportive services to
- 12 homeless persons.
- 13 (b) The governor shall submit a report to the legislature
- 14 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of every
- 15 regular session on the progress made in acquiring the parcels of
- 16 state land specified in subsection (a) until all required
- 17 parcels of land have been acquired for the purposes of this Act.
- 18 SECTION 4. (a) There is established within the department
- 19 of human services a Puuhonua homeless villages program. The
- 20 program shall provide housing and supportive services to
- 21 individuals experiencing homelessness under a housing first

1	paradigm.	A minimum of eight thousand homes shall be completed			
2	within tw	o years after the effective date of this Act or two			
3	years aft	er the date the governor makes the land available for			
4	the Puuhonua homeless villages program, whichever occurs later.				
5	(b)	Each homeless village shall:			
6	(1)	Be a minimum of two acres in size and contain no more			
7		than one hundred homes;			
8	(2)	Have a community center, which the department shall			
9		make reasonable efforts to complete at a cost of			
10		\$100,000 for each community center, that includes:			
11		(A) Communal showers;			
12		(B) Bathrooms;			
13		(C) A kitchen;			
14		(D) Lockers for residents' valuables;			
15		(E) Mailboxes for incoming mail; and			
16		(F) A multipurpose room for residential meetings and			
17		supportive services; and			
18	(3)	Have systems to dispose of trash and other waste.			
19	(c)	Each home within the homeless village shall adhere to			
20	the follo	wing requirements:			

1	(1)	The construction cost for each home shall not exceed
2		\$15,000;
3	(2)	Each home shall have at least three hundred square
4		feet of living space, electricity with lighting, and a
5		minimum of eight standard electrical outlets; and
6	(3)	Each home shall be a private dwelling for an
7		individual or family experiencing homelessness;
8		provided that individuals who are unrelated shall not
9		be required to share a home.
10	(d)	Individuals or families experiencing homelessness
11	shall be	charged the cost of rent, utilities, and supportive
12	services	as follows:
13	(1)	Individuals and families experiencing homelessness
14		that have no income shall not be charged;
15	(2)	Individuals who have income but are experiencing
16		homelessness shall not be charged more than twenty per
17		cent of the individual's gross monthly income; and
18	(3)	Families that have income but are experiencing
19		homelessness shall not be charged more than twenty per
20		cent of the family's aggregate monthly income less

1		\$100	per month for each dependent ramily member that
2		resid	des in the home;
3	provided	that 1	the department may adjust these amounts for
4	inflation		
5	(e)	The o	department of human services shall:
6	(1)	Adop	t rules pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised
7		Stati	utes, as well as policies and procedures, for the
8		purp	ose of qualifying applicants for residency under
9		the :	Puuhonua homeless villages program; provided that:
10		(A)	Qualification rules, policies, and procedures
11			shall be consistent with the rules, policies, and
12			procedures of the United States Department of
13			Housing and Urban Development's Coordinated Entry
14			System;
15		(B)	Qualification procedures provide for rapid
16			admission, to the extent possible; and
17		(C)	Qualification procedures use the least
18			restrictive standards practicable;
19	(2)	Esta	blish rules for residents of the homeless villages
20		that	shall be reasonably consistent with housing first

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1		principles and shall make reasonable efforts to allow			
2		residents to participate in self-government;			
3	(3)	Collaborate with appropriate departmental personnel			
4		and state and county law enforcement agencies to			
5		provide security for the Puuhonua homeless villages			
6		program; and			
7	(4)	Work with appropriate agencies to ensure that			
8		residents have reasonable access to public			
9		transportation.			
10	(f)	All state and county permitting and construction fees			
11	shall be	waived for the homes and homeless village structures			
12	constructed pursuant to this Act.				
13	SECTION 5. Chapter 662, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
14	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated				
15	and to read as follows:				
16	" <u>866</u>	2- Limited liability for providing services to			
17	individua	ls experiencing homelessness. No public entity or			
18	public em	ployee shall be liable to any person for injury or			
19	damage caused by a public employee providing services to				
20	individuals experiencing homelessness; provided that the				

employee was acting in good faith and within the scope of the 1 2 employee's functions and duties as an employee of the State." 3 SECTION 6. Chapter 662D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 5 and to read as follows: 6 "§662D- Limited liability for volunteers for the 7 government entity providing services to individuals experiencing homelessness. (a) No volunteer for a governmental entity shall 8 9 be liable to any person for injury or damage caused by a 10 volunteer providing services to individuals experiencing 11 homelessness; provided that the volunteer was acting in good faith and within the scope of the volunteer's functions and 12 13 duties. 14 (b) No nonprofit organization or nonprofit corporation that provides volunteers to a governmental entity providing 15 services to individuals experiencing homelessness shall be **16** 17 liable to any person for injury or damage caused by the volunteer; provided that the volunteer was acting in good faith 18 and within the scope of the volunteer's functions and duties." 19 20 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$190,000,000 or so

- 1 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to
- 2 establish the Puuhonua homeless villages program and construct
- 3 homes and infrastructure as required by this Act.
- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 5 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$208,000,000 or so
- 8 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for
- 9 the management, maintenance, and day-to-day operations of
- 10 Puuhonua homeless villages as required by this Act.
- 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 12 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

#### Report Title:

Puuhonua Homeless Villages Program; Appropriation; Homelessness; Department of Human Services; Government Liability; Immunity

#### Description:

Requires the Governor to identify available state land for the establishment of a homelessness village and establishes the Puuhonua Homeless Villages program. Provides limitation on liability for government entity and volunteers providing services. Makes an appropriation. (HB2014 HD1)

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
