A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that former inmates who

2 are gainfully employed are less likely to re-offend and have a

greater chance of becoming upstanding citizens.

4 The legislature further finds that ninety-five percent of

5 inmates will eventually be released from prison and that it is

6 in the best interest of the State to facilitate the reentry of

7 former inmates into society by providing opportunities for

8 gainful employment.

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9 Hawaii correctional industries employs several hundred

inmates every year in print, furniture, canteen, and sewing

11 shops that are located inside correctional facilities and

12 through outside work-lines that clean and maintain highways and

13 byways. In this vocational rehabilitation program, former

14 inmates who excelled within the program have great potential to

serve as peer mentors and role models to the current inmates

16 participating in Hawaii correctional industries' work programs.

15	equivalent employment with Hawaii correctional industries for up
16	to five former inmates who meet eligibility criteria developed

15		the pilot project received fair and adequate wages,
16		showed lower recidivism rates, and had reduced contact
17		with the criminal justice system;
18	(2)	Findings as to whether the pilot project helped
19		achieve the purposes of the correctional industries
20		program pursuant to section 354D-1, Hawaii Revised
21		Statutes; and

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1	(3) Any other data and analysis the department of public		
2	safety deems necessary.		
3	(d) Data on the conduct and efficacy of the pilot project		
4	shall be collected by service providers that work directly with		
5	former inmates and shall be submitted to the department of		
6	public safety every six months for evaluation purposes for the		
7	duration of the pilot project and twelve months after it ends.		
8	(e) The department of public safety shall submit an annual		
9	report of its findings and recommendations, including any		
10	proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty		
11	days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2019,		
12	2020, and 2021.		
13	(f) The pilot project shall cease on July 1, 2021.		
14	SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.
