A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII LEGAL AID INTERAGENCY ROUNDTABLE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 2 by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read
- 3 as follows:
- 4 "PART . HAWAII LEGAL AID INTERAGENCY ROUNDTABLE
- 5 §28- Establishment; definitions. There is established
- 6 the Hawaii legal aid interagency roundtable. For the purposes
- 7 of this chapter:
- 8 "Government agency" means any department, commission,
- 9 authority, office, or other agency of the State or any county.
- 10 "Roundtable" means the Hawaii legal aid interagency
- 11 roundtable.
- 12 §28- Membership. (a) The attorney general and the
- 13 director of human services, or their designees, shall serve as
- 14 co-chairs of the roundtable, which shall also be composed of
- 15 representatives from the following government agencies:
- 16 (1) The department of health;
- 17 (2) The executive office on aging;



1	(3)	The department of commerce and consumer affairs;
2	(4)	The department of labor and industrial relations;
3	(5)	The office of community services;
4	(6)	The Hawaii public housing authority;
5	(7)	The civil rights commission;
6	(8)	The office of Hawaiian affairs;
7	(9)	The department of Hawaiian home lands;
8	(10)	The department of public safety; and
9	(11)	Any other government agency the co-chairs may, from
10		time to time, designate.
11	(b)	The co-chairs may invite the participation of the
12	judiciary	, access to justice commission, and Hawaii consortium
13	of legal	service providers to the extent consistent with law and
14	legal obl	igations.
15	§28-	Mission and function. (a) The roundtable shall
16	work acro	ss government agencies to:
17	(1)	Improve coordination among state programs that help
18		low-income, indigent, vulnerable, and at-risk
19		populations, and include, where appropriate, legal
20		services among the range of supportive services

1		provided by the state programs, so that those programs
2		are more efficient and produce better outcomes;
3	(2)	Increase the availability of meaningful access to
4		justice for individuals and families, regardless of
5		wealth or status;
6	(3)	Develop policy recommendations that improve access to
7		justice in state and local jurisdictions;
8	(4)	Implement goal sixteen of the United Nation's 2030
9		Agenda for Sustainable Development to promote just,
10		peaceful, and inclusive societies that provide access
11		to justice for all and build effective and accountable
12		institutions at all levels;
13	(5)	Advance relevant evidence-based research, data
14		collection, and analysis of civil legal aid and
15		indigent defense, and promulgate best practices to
16		support the activities detailed in paragraphs (1) to
17		(4); and
18	(6)	On an ongoing basis, evaluate:
19		(A) How providing low-income, indigent, vulnerable,
20		and at-risk populations with access to civil
21		legal services may serve or further the missions,

1		responsibilities, and goals of government
2		agencies; and
3		(B) The use or potential use of federal grant money
4		received by government agencies for the purposes
5		described in subparagraph (A).
6	(b)	The roundtable shall submit an annual report to the
7	governor	and the legislature no later than twenty days prior to
8	the conve	ning of each regular session on its success in
9	achieving	its mission, and shall include:
10	(1)	Data from participating members on the deployment of
11		state and other governmental resources that foster th
12		roundtable's mission;
13	(2)	A summary of the evaluation required under paragraph
14		(6), including the amount of money spent, if any, by
15		government agencies to facilitate access to civil
16		legal services; and
17	(3)	Policy recommendations to facilitate access to civil
18		legal services.
19	(c)	The roundtable shall submit a report to the governor
20	and the 1	egislature on the economic impact of funding access to
21	civil lea	al services no later than January 1 2020

- 1 §28- Administration. (a) The roundtable shall hold
- 2 meetings at least three times a year and engage with federal,
- 3 state, and local officials, technical advisors, and
- 4 nongovernmental organizations, among others, as necessary to
- 5 carry out its mission.
- **6** (b) The attorney general and director of human services,
- 7 or their designees, shall convene regular meetings of the
- 8 roundtable and supervise its work. The department of the
- 9 attorney general's staff shall serve as the staff of the
- 10 roundtable.
- 11 (c) The department of the attorney general shall, to the
- 12 extent permitted by law and subject to the availability of
- 13 appropriations, provide administrative services, funds,
- 14 facilities, staff, equipment, and other support services as may
- 15 be necessary for the roundtable to carry out its mission."
- 16 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the
- 19 Hawaii legal aid interagency roundtable.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 21 the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.

1 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
