A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENERGY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 196, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding two new sections to part I to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§196- Hawaii clean economy initiative advisory board.
5	(a) There is established within the department of business,
6	economic development, and tourism, a Hawaii clean economy
7	initiative advisory board to advise the State on the transition
8	to a clean energy economy and to support the State in meeting
9	its goal of building an economy that, by 2045, sequesters more
10	atmospheric carbon than it produces.
11	The primary goal of the Hawaii clean economy initiative
12	advisory board shall be to accelerate the realization of
13	Hawaii's climate and clean energy goals and ensure the equitable
14	implementation of these goals by:
15	(1) Aligning private sector, education, county, and
16	nonprofit organizations through projects,
17	partnerships, and innovation; and

1	(2)	Advising state policymakers, officials, and regulators
2		on effective policy and regulatory structures,
3		strategies, and implementation supported by analyses
4		and evaluations.
5	(b)	The governor shall appoint an executive director of
6	the Hawai	i clean economy initiative advisory board without
7	regard to	chapter 76, who:
8	(1)	Shall be subject to section 26-34;
9	(2)	Shall serve as the chair of the Hawaii clean economy
10		initiative advisory board; and
11	(3)	May hire temporary or permanent employees who shall be
12		exempt from chapter 76.
13	(c)	The governor shall appoint four additional members of
14	the Hawai	i clean economy initiative advisory board to represent
15	the priva	te sector, the nonprofit sector, education
16	organizat	ions, and county governments. The members shall be
17	subject t	o section 26-34. The chair shall appoint a vice-chair
18	from amon	ng the members.
19	(d)	The executive director may invite the participation of
20	nonvotino	observers from the department of business, economic,

- 1 development, and tourism, as well as other state agencies, state
- 2 regulators, and the federal government.
- 3 (e) The executive director shall submit a report of the
- 4 activities of the Hawaii clean economy initiative advisory board
- 5 to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
- 6 convening of each regular session. The report shall include a:
- 7 (1) Summary of outcomes and key results for the previous
- 8 year;
- 9 (2) Plan for the upcoming year; and
- 10 (3) Summary of expenditures."
- 11 SECTION 2. Section 196-10.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended as follows:
- 1. By amending its title and subsection (a) to read:
- "[+] §196-10.5[+] Hawaii clean [energy] economy initiative
- 15 program. (a) There is established within the department of
- 16 business, economic development, and tourism, a Hawaii clean
- 17 [energy] economy initiative program to manage the State's
- 18 transition to a clean energy and clean transportation economy [-]
- 19 that, by 2045, sequesters more atmospheric carbon than it
- 20 produces. The clean [energy] economy program shall design,
- 21 implement, and administer activities that include:

1	(1)	Strategic partnerships for the research, development,
2		testing, deployment, and permitting of clean and
3		renewable technologies;
4	(2)	Engineering and economic evaluations of Hawaii's
5		potential for near-term and long-term project
6		opportunities for the State's renewable energy and
7		carbon sequestration resources;
8	(3)	Electric grid reliability and security projects that
9		will enable the integration of a substantial increase
10		of electricity from [renewable energy] renewable
11		energy resources;
12	(4)	A statewide clean [energy] economy public education
13		and outreach plan to be developed in coordination with
14		Hawaii's institutions of public education;
15	(5)	Promotion of Hawaii's clean and renewable resources
16		and opportunities for carbon sequestration to
17		potential partners and investors;
18	(6)	A plan, to be implemented from 2011 to [2030,] 2045,
19		to transition the State to a clean energy and clean
20		transportation economy; and

1	(7) A plan, to be implemented from 2011 to [2030,] <u>2045,</u>
2	to assist each county in transitioning to a clean
3	energy and clean transportation economy."
4	2. By amending subsection (c) to read:
5	"(c) The department of business, economic development, and
6	tourism shall submit a report to the legislature no later than
7	twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session on
8	the status and progress of new and existing clean [energy]
9	economy initiatives. The report shall also include:
10	(1) The spending plan of the Hawaii clean [energy] economy
11	initiative program;
12	(2) All expenditures of energy security special fund
13	moneys; and
14	(3) The targeted markets of the expenditures, including
15	reasons for selecting those markets, the persons to be
16	served, specific objectives of the program, and
17	program expenditures, including measurable outcomes."
18	SECTION 3. Section 201-12.8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
20	"(b) Subject to legislative appropriation, moneys from the
21	fund may be expended by the department of business, economic

1	developme	nt, and tourism for the following purposes and used for
2	no other	ourposes, except for those set forth in this section:
3	(1)	To support the Hawaii clean [energy] economy
4		initiative program, including its energy division,
5		including funding staff positions within the division,
6		and projects that ensure dependable, efficient, and
7		economical energy, promote energy self-sufficiency,
8		and provide greater energy security for the State;
9	(2)	To fund the renewable energy facilitator pursuant to
10		section 201-12.5 and any other positions necessary for
11		the purposes of paragraph (1) as determined by the
12		legislature; and
13	(3)	To fund, to the extent possible, the greenhouse gas
14		emissions reduction task force, climate change task
15		force, grants-in-aid to the economic development
16		boards of each county, and grants-in-aid to economic
17		development agencies of each county to meet the stated
18		objectives of the Hawaii clean [energy] economy
19		initiative program."
20	SECT	ION 4. Section 201-12.8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

1	"(b)	Subject to legislative appropriation, moneys from the
2	fund may l	be expended by the department of business, economic
3	developme	nt, and tourism for the following purposes and used for
4	no other p	purposes, except for those set forth in this section:
5	(1)	To support the Hawaii clean [energy] economy
6		initiative program, including its energy division,
7		including funding the executive director of the Hawaii
8		clean economy initiative advisory board position, the
9		activities of the Hawaii clean economy initiative
10		advisory board, other staff positions within the
11		division, and projects that ensure dependable,
12		efficient, and economical energy, promote energy self-
13		sufficiency, and provide greater energy security for
14		the State;
15	(2)	To fund the renewable energy facilitator pursuant to
16		section 201-12.5 and any other positions necessary for
17		the purposes of paragraph (1) as determined by the
18		legislature; and
19	(3)	To fund, to the extent possible, the greenhouse gas
20		emissions reduction task force, climate change task
21		force, grants-in-aid to the economic development

1	boards of each county, and grants-in-aid to economic
2	development agencies of each county to meet the stated
3	objectives of the Hawaii clean [energy] economy
4	initiative program."
5	SECTION 5. Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
7	"(b) The office of planning shall gather, analyze, and
8	provide information to the governor to assist in the overall
9	analysis and formulation of state policies and strategies to
10	provide central direction and cohesion in the allocation of
11	resources and effectuation of state activities and programs and
12	effectively address current or emerging issues and
13	opportunities. More specifically, the office shall engage in
14	the following activities:
15	(1) State comprehensive planning and program coordination.
16	Formulating and articulating comprehensive statewide
17	goals, objectives, policies, and priorities, and
18	coordinating their implementation through the
19	statewide planning system established in part II of
20	chapter 226;

1	(2)	Stia	tegic planning. Identifying and analyzing

lanning, coordinating, and maintaining a comprehensive, shared statewide planning and geographic information system and associated geospatial database. The office shall be the lead agency responsible for coordinating the maintenance of the multi-agency, statewide planning and geographic information system and coordinating, collecting, integrating, and disseminating geospatial data sets that are used to support a variety of state agency applications and other spatial data analyses to enhance decision-making. The office shall promote and encourage free and open data sharing among [and between] all government agencies. To ensure the maintenance of a comprehensive, accurate, up-todate geospatial data resource that can be drawn upon for decision-making related to essential

1		public policy issues such as land use planning,
2		resource management, homeland security, and the
3		overall health, safety, and well-being of
4		Hawaii's citizens, and to avoid redundant data
5		development efforts, state agencies shall provide
6		to the shared system either their respective
7		geospatial databases or, at a minimum, especially
8		in cases of secure or confidential data sets that
9		cannot be shared or must be restricted, metadata
10		describing existing geospatial data. In cases
11		where agencies provide restricted data, the
12		office of planning shall ensure the security of
13		that data; and
14		(C) Maintaining a centralized depository of state and
15		national planning references;
16	(5)	Land use planning. Developing and presenting the
17		position of the State in all boundary change petitions
18		and proceedings before the land use commission,
19		assisting state agencies in the development and

submittal of petitions for land use district boundary

amendments, and conducting periodic reviews of the

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1		classification and districting of all lands in the
2		State, as specified in chapter 205;
3	(6)	Coastal and ocean policy management. Carrying out the
4		lead agency responsibilities for the Hawaii coastal
5		zone management program, as specified in chapter 205A.
6		Also[, developing]:
7		(A) Developing and maintaining an ocean and coastal
8		resources information, planning, and management
9		system [further];
10		(B) Further developing and coordinating
11		implementation of the ocean resources management
12		plan[-]; and [formulating]
13		(C) Formulating ocean policies with respect to the
14		exclusive economic zone, coral reefs, and
15		national marine sanctuaries;
16	(7)	Regional planning and studies. Conducting plans and
17		studies to determine:
18		(A) The capability of various regions within the
19		State to support projected increases in both
20		resident populations and visitors;

1		(B) The potential physical, social, economic, and
2		environmental impact on these regions resulting
3		from increases in both resident populations and
4		visitors;
5		(C) The maximum annual visitor carrying capacity for
6		the State by region, county, and island; and
7		(D) The appropriate guidance and management of
8		selected regions and areas of statewide critical
9		concern.
10		The studies in subparagraphs (A) to (C) shall be
11		conducted at appropriate intervals, but not less than
12		once every five years;
13	(8)	Regional, national, and international planning.
14		Participating in and ensuring that state plans,
15		policies, and objectives are consistent, to the extent
16		practicable, with regional, national, and
17		international planning efforts;
18	(9)	Climate adaptation planning. Conducting plans and
19		studies and preparing reports as follows:
20		(A) Develop, monitor, and evaluate strategic climate
21		adaptation plans and actionable policy

1			recommendations for the State and counties
2			addressing expected statewide climate change
3			impacts identified under Act 286, Session Laws of
4			Hawaii 2012, through the year 2050;
5		(B)	Provide planning and policy guidance and
6			assistance to state and county agencies regarding
7			climate change; and
8		(C)	Publish its findings, recommendations, and
9			progress reports on actions taken no later than
10			December 31, 2017, and its annual report to the
11			governor and the legislature thereafter; and
12	(10)	Smar	t growth and transit-oriented development. Acting
13		as t	he lead agency to coordinate and advance smart
14		grow	th and transit-oriented development planning
15		with	in the State as follows:
16		(A)	Identify transit-oriented development
17			opportunities shared between state and county
18			agencies, including relevant initiatives such as
19			the department of health's healthy Hawaii
20			initiative and the Hawaii clean [energy] economy
21			initiative;

1	(D)	Reline the delimition of "transit-offenced
2		development" in the context of Hawaii, while
3		recognizing the potential for smart growth
4		development patterns in all locations;
5	(C)	Clarify state goals for transit-oriented
6		development and smart growth that support the
7		principles of the Hawaii State Planning Act by
8		preserving non-urbanized land, improving worker
9		access to jobs, and reducing fuel consumption;
10	(D)	Target transit-oriented development areas for
11		significant increase in affordable housing and
12		rental units;
13	(E)	Conduct outreach to state agencies to help
14		educate state employees about the ways they can
15		support and benefit from transit-oriented
16		development and the State's smart growth goals;
17	(F)	Publicize coordinated state efforts that support
18		smart growth, walkable neighborhoods, and
19		transit-oriented development;
20	(G)	Review state land use decision-making processes
21		to identify ways to make transit-oriented

1		development a higher priority and facilitate				
2		better and more proactive leadership in creating				
3		walkable communities and employment districts,				
4		even if transit will only be provided at a later				
5		date; and				
6	(H)	Approve all state agencies' development plans for				
7		parcels along the rail transit corridor. For the				
8		purposes of this subparagraph, "development				
9		plans" means conceptual land use plans that				
10		identify the location and planned uses within a				
11		defined area."				
12	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the energy					
13	security special fund established pursuant to section 201-12.8,					
14	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$ or so much thereof					
15	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for one full-time					
16	equivalent (1.0 FTE) executive director position and for the					
17	activities of the Hawaii clean economy initiative advisory					
18	board.					
19	The sum a	appropriated shall be expended by the department of				
20	business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of					
21	this Act.

- 2 1 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 3 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 4 the new sections in this Act.

- 7 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.
