A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO OFFSHORE ENERGY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature recognizes the potential 2 benefits of clean energy projects, including stabilizing and 3 lowering consumer bills over the long run, contributing to the 4 reduction of greenhouse gases and climate change which are 5 already having a costly impact on Hawaii, as well as replacing 6 fossil fuel plants which many communities currently host near 7 residential and commercial areas, the emissions of which can 8 have a measurable impact on human health. 9 The legislature further finds that offshore wind projects **10** have provided significant benefits to other nations. Several 11 European countries have nearly replaced their dependence on coal 12 with electricity generated from offshore wind, creating 13 thousands of permanent jobs and stabilizing energy prices for 14 the future. Replacing a significant portion of Hawaii's costly

dependence on fossil fuels will require switching to cheaper,

cleaner renewable energy sources.

1	The legislature further finds that key areas around Hawai:
2	are rich in community, cultural significance, and irreplaceable
3	environments that should be protected in perpetuity from the
4	potential for future development and passed on as part of
5	Hawaii's legacy to future generations.
6	The purpose of this Act is to:
7	(1) Permanently protect Hawaii's coastal communities,
8	cultural assets, and environment from the impacts of
9	future energy projects; and
10	(2) Establish a task force to encourage and explore the
11	potential for offshore renewable energy projects that
12	will stabilize and lower long-term energy costs,
13	create permanent local jobs, reduce carbon emissions
14	and be placed appropriately in the State and coastal
15	communities around the State.
16	SECTION 2. Chapter 196, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
18	and to read as follows:
19	"§196- Energy generation project; restrictions. No
20	agency shall issue a permit for an energy generation project
21	that:

1	(1)	Generates electricity within twelve miles seaward of a
2		state shoreline;
3	(2)	Rests above the surface of the water; and
4	(3)	Interconnects with an electric grid."
5	SECT	ION 3. (a) There is established an offshore renewable
6	energy ta	sk force, to be placed within the department of
7	business,	economic development, and tourism for administrative
8	purposes	only.
9	(b)	The task force shall:
10	(1)	Explore the potential for offshore renewable energy
11		projects to:
12		(A) Stabilize and lower long-term energy costs;
13		(B) Create permanent local jobs; and
14		(C) Reduce carbon emissions;
15	(2)	Consider any impact potential offshore renewable
16		energy projects may have on nearby coastal communities
17		and the environment and find ways to ensure any
18		adjacent communities benefit above other ratepayers;
19		and

1	(3)	Consider ways to encourage and implement appropriate
2		offshore renewable energy projects and remove barriers
3		to more efficiently achieve their completion.
4	(c)	The task force shall be chaired by the administrator
5	of the Hav	waii state energy office, or the administrator's
6	designee.	The task force members shall also include:
7	(1)	The chairs of the house of representatives standing
8		committees with jurisdiction over energy and
9		environmental protection, or the respective
10		chairpersons' designee;
11	(2)	The chairs of the senate standing committees with
12		jurisdiction over energy and environmental protection,
13		or the respective chairpersons' designee;
14	(3)	The executive director of the consumer advocacy
15		division of the department of commerce and consumer
16		affairs, or the executive director's designee;
17	(4)	The mayors of each county, or their respective
18		designees;
19	(5)	Two members from organizations with experience in the
20		field of environmental protection, with one member

1		appointed each by the president of the senate and the
2		speaker of the house of representatives;
3	(6)	Two members from organizations with experience in the
4		field of renewable energy, with one member appointed
5		each by the president of the senate and the speaker of
6		the house of representatives;
7	(7)	Two members from organizations with experience
8		representing the interests of consumers, with one
9		member appointed each by the president of the senate
10		and the speaker of the house of representatives;
11	(8)	Two members from organizations with experience
12		representing native Hawaiian cultural issues, with one
13		member appointed each by the president of the senate
14		and the speaker of the house of representatives; and
15	(9)	Any other members, as recommended by the chair of the
16		task force, to represent communities in areas which
17		may host an offshore renewable energy project or as
18	·	otherwise determined to be appropriate.
19	(d)	Members of the task force shall serve without
20	compensat	ion but shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses,

including travel expenses, necessary for the performance of

- 1 their duties. No member shall be made subject to section 84-17,
- 2 Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of the member's
- 3 participation on the task force.
- 4 (e) The task force shall submit a report of its findings
- 5 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
- 6 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 7 the regular session of 2019.
- 8 (f) The task force shall be dissolved upon adjournment
- 9 sine die of the regular session of 2019.
- 10 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
