A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PRESERVING CORAL REEFS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that coral decline poses 2 a significant threat worldwide. While scientists from around 3 the world agree that the primary causes of coral decline are related to global warming, agricultural runoff, sewage, and 4 5 overfishing, recent studies have shown that oxybenzone, a common 6 sunscreen ingredient, may also have detrimental effects on coral 7 The threat is particularly acute in Hawaiian ocean reefs. waters where coral bleaching is occurring at a historic rate 8 9 never previously recorded.

10 The legislature further finds that skin cancer poses a 11 significant threat to the health of Americans and that 12 3,5000,000 skin cancer cases, including seventy-five thousand 13 new cases of invasive melanoma, are diagnosed in the United 14 States annually. Sunscreens play a vital role in protecting Hawaii residents and visitors from dangerous ultraviolet rays 15 and in preventing skin cancers. The State must balance its need 16 to protect Hawaiian ocean waters and coral reefs with the need 17



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1 to protect the public's health and safety. Therefore, any 2 action taken to ban sunscreen ingredients approved by the United 3 States Food and Drug Administration must be done in a manner 4 that does not jeopardize the health of Hawaii's residents and 5 visitors while providing access to a wide range of safe and 6 reliable sun protection products for all skin types.

7 The legislature further finds that although reasonable 8 alternatives to oxybenzone currently exist for lower sun 9 protection factor sunscreens, and a new generation of 10 photostable, broad spectrum sunscreens offering both ultraviolet 11 A and ultraviolet B protection is available outside the United 12 States, the development of oxybenzone-free alternatives for 13 higher sun protection factor products has been substantially 14 delayed in the United States due to the United States Food and 15 Drug Administration delay in approving new sunscreen 16 ingredients. In fact, the United States Food and Drug 17 Administration has not approved a new sunscreen ingredient since 18 the 1990s.

19 The legislature believes that given a reasonable timeframe 20 for reformulation and United States Food and Drug Administration 21 approval of new ingredients, it is possible for sunscreen



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1	manufacturers to provide a full range of oxybenzone-free
2	sunscreen products that will allow beach users to enjoy the
3	outdoors without compromising sun protection.
4	The purpose of this Act is to protect Hawaii's coral reefs
5	by prohibiting the sale of sunscreens containing oxybenzone
6	without compromising Hawaii residents' and visitors' ability to
7	protect themselves from sunburns and the damage caused by
8	harmful ultraviolet A and ultraviolet B rays.
9	SECTION 2. Chapter 328, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately
11	designated and to read as follows:
12	" <u>§328-</u> Oxybenzone; sunscreen restrictions. (a)
13	Beginning January 1, 2023, no person shall sell a sunscreen
14	containing oxybenzone in Hawaii, unless the sunscreen is a
15	prescription drug as defined in section 328-112.
16	(b) No county shall enact any ordinance or regulatory
17	restriction to ban or otherwise regulate in any manner the sale,
18	use, labeling, packaging, handling, distribution, or
19	advertisement of products containing oxybenzone or other
20	ingredients approved by the United States Food and Drug
21	Administration pursuant to the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetics

8	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
9	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
10	begun before its effective date.

12	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2023.
