

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CRIMINAL TRESPASS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that it is necessary to
- 2 exempt selected areas from the offense of criminal trespass onto
- 3 state lands in order to protect the welfare of the people and
- 4 communities that may be established on state land, especially
- 5 when those people and communities offer valuable lessons or
- 6 models for how to address social challenges.
- 7 The legislature further finds that such a community has
- 8 been built by people experiencing homelessness in the encampment
- 9 adjacent to the Waianae boat harbor, which is known as puuhonua
- 10 o Waianae.
- 11 The purpose of this Act is to exempt the land where the
- 12 houseless community of puuhonua o Waianae currently exists from
- 13 the offense of criminal trespass onto state lands.
- 14 SECTION 2. Section 708-814.7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended by amending subsection (1) to read as follows:
- 16 "(1) Except for lands owned by the office of Hawaiian
- 17 affairs $[\tau]$; except for the land where the houseless community of

17	s	igns that are sufficient to give reasonable	
18	n	otice that read: "Government Property - No	
19	T	respassing"; provided that these signs shall	
20	C	contain letters no less than two inches in height	
21	a	and shall be placed at reasonable intervals no	

1		less than three signs to a mile along the
2		boundary line of the land and at all roads and
3		trails entering the land in a manner and position
4		as to be clearly noticeable from outside the
5		boundary; or
6	(b)	The person enters or remains unlawfully in or upon any
7		state land on or under any highway, and the state land
8		has a sign or signs displayed upon the land that are
9		sufficient to give reasonable notice that read:
10		"Government Property - No Trespassing"; provided that
11		the signs shall contain letters no less than two
12		inches in height and shall be placed at reasonable
13		intervals no less than three signs to a mile along the
14		boundary line of the land and at all roads and trails
15		entering the land in a manner and position as to be
16		clearly noticeable from outside the boundary."
17	SECT	ION 3. The department of the attorney general shall
18	submit a	written report to the legislature regarding the extent
19	to which	this Act has been utilized, and shall include

recommendations for any proposed legislation, no later than

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- 1 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of
- 2 2019 and 2020.
- 3 SECTION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 4 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 5 begun before its effective date.
- 6 SECTION 5. This Act shall not be construed to prohibit any
- 7 person from exercising native Hawaiian rights, customarily and
- 8 traditionally exercised for subsistence, cultural, and religious
- 9 purposes pursuant to article XII, section 7, of the Hawaii State
- 10 Constitution.
- 11 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
