A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii keiki: 2 healthy and ready to learn program is designed to improve access 3 to and increase the quality of school-based health services 4 available to Hawaii's public school students by coordinating and 5 expanding the existing efforts of community partners and 6 resources. This partnership program with the University of 7 Hawaii at Manoa school of nursing and dental hygiene supports 8 the department of education in achieving student, school, and 9 system success by providing school health nursing and primary 10 care services to public schools in five complex areas.

In 2015, the legislature appropriated general funds to improve access to and increase the quality of health services available to Hawaii's public school students. This appropriation led to the expansion of the Hawaii keiki program, with five advanced practice registered nurses and five registered nurses serving seven complex areas across three





islands. During this time, the Hawaii keiki program also
 established five school-based health centers.

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3 The department of education is working with other state 4 agencies, partnering organizations, and families to improve 5 attendance, behavior, and course marks by partnering to 6 coordinate wraparound services that address non-school factors 7 that impede student success. Furthermore, through the Hawaii 8 keiki program collaboration, the departments of health and human 9 services have identified the extent of services provided within 10 each department targeted to public school children and the need 11 to coordinate internal departmental activity and cross-12 departmental efforts to develop sustainable school-based health 13 services.

14 Chronic absenteeism, poor health, and delayed or limited 15 access to health care and preventive services continue to hinder 16 students' academic success and schools' ability to meet the 17 needs of the whole child. The legislature acknowledges that the 18 Hawaii keiki program is an effective means by which to continue 19 collaboration between health, human services, and education 20 policymakers and providers to achieve sustainable comprehensive 21 school-based health services in the State to improve the

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1	academic and health outcomes of Hawaii's public school students.
2	Working with each complex area superintendent and school
3	principals, the Hawaii keiki program builds and enhances school-
4	based health services that reflect the specific needs of the
5	individual complex area according to student demographics,
6	staffing, available support services, and access to health care
7	within the community, including:
8	(1) Comprehensive screening for physical and behavioral
9	health conditions;
10	(2) Referrals to primary and behavioral health care and
11	patient-centered medical home services;
12	(3) Prevention and control of communicable diseases and
13	other health problems; and
14	(4) Emergency care for illness or injury.
15	The expected cost to continue and expand the Hawaii keiki
16	program to all fifteen department of education complex areas
17	statewide; expand the program to allow the state public charter
18	school commission to launch the program in two public charter
19	schools serving disadvantaged keiki; provide access to
20	preventive oral health services and establish a pilot oral
21	health screening and preventative services program on a neighbor

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island; enhance data collection, sharing, analysis, and
 reporting; and engage in interdepartmental school health
 coordination, is \$4,000,000 annually. In addition, these funds
 will establish school health services coordinator positions in
 the department of health and the MedQUEST division of the
 department of human services.

7 The purpose of this Act is to formally establish the Hawaii 8 keiki: healthy and ready to learn program in statute. To ensure 9 the program's success, this Act provides funding to expand and 10 sustain the program and establishes school health service 11 positions in the departments of health and human services to 12 increase coordination and facilitate departmental and 13 interdepartmental activities related to comprehensive schoolbased health services. 14

15 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately 17 designated and to read as follows:

18 "<u>§302A-A</u> Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program.
19 (a) There is established within the department of education the
20 Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program to provide
21 school-based wellness and health services. The department shall



1	implement the program in collaboration with the department of
2	health; the department of human services; other health-care
3	educators, including the University of Hawaii at Manoa school of
4	nursing and dental hygiene; providers; and other health-care and
5	education stakeholders to increase access to and reimbursement
6	for school-based wellness and health services.
7	(b) The program shall be funded through appropriations to
8	the Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn special fund
9	established under section 302A-B. The department or the program
10	may also seek:
11	(1) Public and private funding sources, including federal
12	grants and assistance from private nonprofit and for-
13	profit organizations to support the continuation and
14	expansion of school-based health services in the
15	department; and
16	(2) Federal reimbursement for school-based wellness and
17	health services.
18	<u>§302A-B</u> Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn special
19	fund. (a) There is established within the state treasury the
20	Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn special fund, to be

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1	administered by the department of education and into which shall	
2	be deposit	ted:
3	(1)	Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund;
4	(2)	Federal or state grant funds;
5	(3)	Grants and other funds from private nonprofit and for-
6		profit organizations;
7	(4)	Federal reimbursements;

11	(b)	Moneys in the special fund shall be expended to

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1 shall deduct five per cent of all receipts of all other special 2 funds, which deduction shall be transferred to the general fund 3 of the State and become general realizations of the State. All 4 officers of the State and other persons having power to allocate 5 or disburse any special funds shall cooperate with the director 6 in effecting these transfers. To determine the proper revenue 7 base upon which the central service assessment is to be 8 calculated, the director shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 for the purpose of suspending or limiting the application of 9 10 the central service assessment of any fund. No later than 11 twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session of the legislature, the director shall report all central service 12 assessments made during the preceding fiscal year." 13

14 SECTION 4. Section 302A-853, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows:

16 "§302A-853 Administration of medication. School health 17 aides may assist students by administering oral and topical 18 medication, and in emergency situations, other premeasured 19 medication; provided that:



1	(1)	If the student receiving the medication is a minor, a
2		parent or guardian requests and authorizes the
3		administration of medication;
4	(2)	The medication has been prescribed by a licensed
5		physician[$_{\tau}$] as defined in section 334-1, <u>a licensed</u>
6		advanced practice registered nurse as defined in
7		section 457-2.7, or by a practitioner with
8		prescriptive authority;
9	(3)	The administration of the medication is with the
10		approval of the department of health[+] or the Hawaii
11		keiki: healthy and ready to learn program established
12		under section 302A-A; and
13	(4)	The administration of the medication is necessary for
14		the health of the student and for the student's
15		attendance at school."
16	SECT	ION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
17	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
18	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
19	same sum	or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
20	2018-2019	for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) school health
21	services	coordinator position within the department of health.



1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 2 of health for the purposes of this Act. 3 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 7 2018-2019 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) school health 8 services coordinator position within the department of human 9 services. 10 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 11 of human services for the purposes of this Act. 12 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general 13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 14 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 15 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to be deposited into the Hawaii keiki: healthy and 16 17 ready to learn special fund. 18 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii keiki: 19 healthy and ready to learn special fund the sum of \$ or

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1 fiscal year 2018-2019 to implement, expand, and sustain the 2 Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program. 3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 4 of education for the purposes of this Act. 5 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii keiki: 6 healthy and ready to learn special fund the sum of \$ or 7 so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 8 for a one-time allocation for an evidence-based vision screening 9 and eye assessment tool appropriate for children in kindergarten 10 through grade twelve. 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 12 education for the purposes of this Act. 13 SECTION 10. In codifying the new sections added by section 14 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute 15 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating 16 the new sections in this Act. 17 SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 18 19 SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2090.
