A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that supporting local
2	food production is a high priority for Hawaii and much of that
3	food production comes from small farmers. Land and water costs
4	are high in Hawaii and enabling farmers to live on the land at
5	minimal expense is essential.
6	On Hawaii island, most farms are not supplied with county
7	water, so the efficient use of water is of paramount importance,
8	as the water for the farm comes from rainfall. Water for
9	household use is provided by collecting the rain off the roofs
10	of the farm buildings and storing that water in tanks in the
11	case of potable water, or ponds for irrigation and stock water.
12	Allowing farmers to use gray water systems that recycle
13	uncontaminated water will enable them to waste less water.
14	According to the "Guidelines for the Reuse of Gray Water"
15	prepared by the department of health, "gray water from sinks,
16	tub/shower drains, and clothes washers are estimated to be 50-80
17	percent of the total residential wastewater generated. This

- 1 wastewater stream may be reused to meet part of the fresh water
- 2 demand for landscaping . . . Although this wastewater stream
- 3 contains detergents, soaps, and solvents, some of the
- 4 constituents of these cleaning agents are considered fertilizer
- 5 for plants. Phosphorous, nitrogen, and potassium are some of
- 6 the compounds found in gray water that many plants need to
- 7 survive. Generally, most of the gray water and the nutrients in
- 8 it will be used by plants, and the dynamics of the soil will
- 9 break down the other contaminants." This guide continues by
- 10 listing several ornamental plants such as heliconia and ti, crop
- 11 plants such as banana and coconut, and native Hawaiian plants
- 12 that would benefit from the use of gray water.
- 13 Therefore, the legislature finds that allowing gray water
- 14 systems on agricultural land on Hawaii island will provide
- 15 farmers with an inexpensive and efficient source of water and
- 16 nutrients.
- 17 SECTION 2. Section 205-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 18 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
- "(d) Agricultural districts shall include:

1	(1)	Activities or uses as characterized by the cultivation
2		of crops, crops for bioenergy, orchards, forage, and
3		forestry;
4	(2)	Farming activities or uses related to animal husbandry
5		and game and fish propagation;
6	(3)	Aquaculture, which means the production of aquatic
7		plant and animal life within ponds and other bodies of
8	,	water;
9	(4)	Wind generated energy production for public, private,
10		and commercial use;
11	(5)	Biofuel production, as described in section
12		205-4.5(a)(16), for public, private, and commercial
13		use;
14	(6)	Solar energy facilities; provided that:
15		(A) This paragraph shall apply only to land with soil
16		classified by the land study bureau's detailed
17		land classification as overall (master)
18		productivity rating class B, C, D, or E; and
19		(B) Solar energy facilities placed within land with
20		soil classified as overall productivity rating
21		class B or C shall not occupy more than ten per

1		cent of the acreage of the parcel, or twenty
2		acres of land, whichever is lesser, unless a
3		special use permit is granted pursuant to section
4		205-6;
5	(7)	Bona fide agricultural services and uses that support
6		the agricultural activities of the fee or leasehold
7		owner of the property and accessory to any of the
8		above activities, regardless of whether conducted on
9		the same premises as the agricultural activities to
10		which they are accessory, including farm dwellings as
11		defined in section 205-4.5(a)(4), employee housing,
12		farm buildings, mills, storage facilities, processing
13		facilities, photovoltaic, biogas, and other small-
14		scale renewable energy systems producing energy solely
15		for use in the agricultural activities of the fee or
16		leasehold owner of the property, agricultural-energy
17		facilities as defined in section 205-4.5(a)(17),
18	·	vehicle and equipment storage areas, and plantation
19		community subdivisions as defined in section
20		205-4.5(a)(12);

(8) Wind machines and wind farms;

1	(9)	Small-scale meteorological, air quality, noise, and
2		other scientific and environmental data collection and
3		monitoring facilities occupying less than one-half
4		acre of land; provided that these facilities shall not
5		be used as or equipped for use as living quarters or
6		dwellings;

- 7 (10) Agricultural parks;
- 8 Agricultural tourism conducted on a working farm, or a (11)9 farming operation as defined in section 165-2, for the **10** enjoyment, education, or involvement of visitors; 11 provided that the agricultural tourism activity is **12** accessory and secondary to the principal agricultural **13** use and does not interfere with surrounding farm 14 operations; and provided further that this paragraph 15 shall apply only to a county that has adopted 16 ordinances regulating agricultural tourism under 17 section 205-5;
- 18 (12) Agricultural tourism activities, including overnight
 19 accommodations of twenty-one days or less, for any one
 20 stay within a county; provided that this paragraph
 21 shall apply only to a county that includes at least

1		three islands and has adopted ordinances regulating
2		agricultural tourism activities pursuant to section
3		205-5; provided further that the agricultural tourism
4		activities coexist with a bona fide agricultural
5		activity. For the purposes of this paragraph, "bona
6		fide agricultural activity" means a farming operation
7		as defined in section 165-2;
8	(13)	Open area recreational facilities;
9	(14)	Geothermal resources exploration and geothermal
10		resources development, as defined under section 182-1
11	(15)	Agricultural-based commercial operations, including:
12		(A) A roadside stand that is not an enclosed
13		structure, owned and operated by a producer for
14		the display and sale of agricultural products
15		grown in Hawaii and value-added products that
16		were produced using agricultural products grown
17		in Hawaii;
18		(B) Retail activities in an enclosed structure owned
19		and operated by a producer for the display and
20		sale of agricultural products grown in Hawaii,
21		value-added products that were produced using

1		agricultural products grown in Hawaii, logo items	
2		related to the producer's agricultural	
3		operations, and other food items; and	
4		(C) A retail food establishment owned and operated by	
5	,	a producer and permitted under title 11, chapter	
6		12 of the rules of the department of health that	
7		prepares and serves food at retail using products	
8		grown in Hawaii and value-added products that	
9		were produced using agricultural products grown	
10		in Hawaii.	
11		The owner of an agricultural-based commercial	
12		operation shall certify, upon request of an officer or	
13		agent charged with enforcement of this chapter under	
14		section 205-12, that the agricultural products	
15		displayed or sold by the operation meet the	
16		requirements of this paragraph; [and]	
17	(16)	Hydroelectric facilities as described in section	
18		205-4.5(a)(23)[-]; and	
19	(17)	Gray water facilities; provided that:	
20		(A) This paragraph shall apply only to an island	
21		greater than four thousand square miles in size	

1		and on land with soil classified by the land
2		study bureau's detailed land classification as
3		overall (master) productivity rating class C, D,
4		or E; and
5	(B)	As used in this paragraph, "gray water" means any
6		untreated wastewater that has not come into
7		contact with toilet waste. "Gray water" includes
8		used water from bathtubs, showers, and bathroom
9		wash basins and water from clothes washers and
10		laundry tubs. "Gray water" excludes water that
11		is contaminated with any household hazardous
12		waste as defined in section 342G-1 or hazardous
13		waste as defined in section 342J-2. "Gray water"
14		also excludes wastewater from food preparation
15		sinks or dishwashers.
16	Agricultural d	istricts shall not include golf courses and golf
17	driving ranges	, except as provided in section 205-4.5(d).
18	Agricultural d	istricts include areas that are not used for, or
19	that are not s	uited to, agricultural and ancillary activities by
20	reason of topo	graphy, soils, and other related characteristics."
