

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EVIDENCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that criminals frequently
- 2 target tourists for property crimes, as tourists are less likely
- 3 to testify in a criminal case because they live elsewhere.
- 4 Thieves target vacation rental homes and rental cars, and
- 5 reports of crimes committed against tourists significantly
- 6 damage Hawaii's visitor industry.
- 7 The legislature further finds that the fundamental
- 8 constitutional right of criminal defendants is the opportunity
- 9 to confront and cross-examine witnesses against them. The
- 10 legislature finds that this right may be satisfied absent a
- 11 physical, face-to-face confrontation at trial where denial of
- 12 such confrontation is necessary to further an important public
- 13 policy of ensuring public safety for visitors and residents and
- 14 where the reliability of the testimony is otherwise assured as
- 15 held in Maryland v. Craig, 497 U.S. 836 (1990) by the United
- 16 States Supreme Court.

1	The purpose of this Act is to authorize a court to allow	
2	live vide	testimony of a victim of property crime if:
3	(1)	The alleged crime is a felony;
4	(2)	The victim was a nonresident of this State at the time
5		the crime was committed and remains a nonresident at
6		the time of providing testimony;
7	(3)	The testimony is limited to identification and
8		ownership of the property taken, the value of the
9		property, lack of consent to take the property, and
10		identification of the person or persons who took the
11		property;
12	(4)	The victim testifies under oath;
13	(5)	The requisite video connection is two-way, so that the
14		victim can see the defendant and the trier of fact can
15		see the victim; and
16	(6)	The defendant and the State have the right to have
17		legal counsel physically present with the victim
18		during the provision of testimony.
19	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 626, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended b	y adding a new rule to article VI of the Hawaii Rules

1	of Evidence to be appropriately designated and to read as
2	follows:
3	"Rule Video testimony of nonresident in a felony
4	property offense. In any prosecution of a felony property
5	offense alleged to have been committed in this State against a
6	person who is a nonresident of this State, the court may order
7	that the testimony of the nonresident be taken under oath
8	through a live two-way video connection to be viewed by the
9	court, the accused, and the trier of fact; provided that:
10	(1) The witness remains a nonresident at the time the
11	testimony is to be given; and
12	(2) The testimony is given only for the purpose of
13	establishing:
14	(A) Identification and ownership of the property
15	taken;
16	(B) The value of the property;
17	(C) Lack of consent to take the property; and
18	(D) Identification of the person or persons who took
19	the property.
20	During the entire course of the procedure, the attorneys for the
21	defendant and for the State shall have the right to be

- 1 physically present with the nonresident and full direct cross-
- 2 examination shall be available as a matter of right."
- 3 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 4 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 5 begun before its effective date.
- 6 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
