A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INDUSTRIAL HEMP.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that agriculture has
 always been an especially important industry to Hawaii. Having
 a strong and vibrant agricultural industry has a number of well recognized benefits for the State, including:
 (1) Diversified job opportunities;
 (2) Less reliance on imported foods and beverages;

- 7 (3) Fresh, locally sourced food products for residents and
- 8 visitors to enjoy;
- 9 (4) Additional benefits from the by-products of
- 10 agricultural crops, including biomass energy and
- 11 manufactured goods; and
- 12 (5) Preservation of the State's green spaces.

13 The legislature further finds that industrial hemp in 14 particular has a very significant potential to be a successful 15 agricultural crop for the State. The report submitted by the 16 University of Hawaii pursuant to Act 56, Session Laws of Hawaii 17 2014, found that Hawaii's climate made it a particularly



promising place to grow subtropical varieties of industrial
 hemp. Evidence suggested that three crops could be grown each
 year in the State, potentially giving Hawaii a strong
 competitive advantage for the growth of the hemp crop.

Act 228, Session Laws of Hawaii 2016, established an 5 industrial hemp pilot program to allow cultivation of industrial 6 hemp for agricultural or academic research purposes. Act 228 7 provides for a three-month window for applicants to apply for a 8 9 license from the board of agriculture. The legislature finds that this short application window has the effect of preventing 10 new license applicants from taking full advantage of the State's 11 climatic advantages. Specifically, by prohibiting application 12 13 submissions between April 2 and December 31 of each year, applicants are potentially forced to miss out on two full 14 industrial hemp crop cycles. 15

16 The purpose of this Act is to allow potential applicants to 17 the industrial hemp pilot program to apply for a license at any 18 time during the year in which the applicant plans to grow 19 industrial hemp.

20 SECTION 2. Section 141-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21 amended by amending subsections (a) to (c) to read as follows:

9	(2)	If the applicant is an individual or partnership, the
10		date of birth of the individual or partners;
11	(3)	If the applicant is any business entity other than an
12		individual, partnership, or institution of higher
13		education, documentation that the entity is authorized
14		to do business in Hawaii;
15	(4)	The cultivated variety that will be sown;
16	(5)	The source and amount of certified seed to be used;
17	(6)	The number of acres to be cultivated for seed, viable
18		grain, industrial products, or any combination
19		thereof;
20	(7)	The global positioning system coordinates in decimal
21		degrees from the central most point of the growing



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area to be cultivated and a map showing the location 1 of the growing area in terms of its address or legal 2 3 description; 4 (8) A statement that the applicant is the owner of the 5 growing area to be used for the cultivation or a 6 statement, signed by the owner of the growing area, indicating that the owner has consented to that use; 7 The address of the place in Hawaii where the applicant 8 (9) will keep the records, books, electronic data, or 9 other documents that are required by this part; 10 The name and address of each place where the 11 (10)industrial hemp is to be stored, sold, or provided, 12 indicating for each place the form of the industrial 13 hemp; and 14 15 (11)The applicant's acknowledgment and agreement to the following terms and conditions: 16 Any information obtained by the board may be 17 (A) publicly disclosed and provided to law 18 enforcement agencies without further notice to 19 20 the applicant or licensee;



1	(B)	The applicant agrees to allow any inspection and	
2		sampling that the board deems necessary;	
3	(C)	The applicant agrees to pay for any sampling and	
4		analysis costs that the board deems necessary;	
5	(D)	The applicant agrees to submit all required	
6		reports by the applicable due dates specified by	
7		the board; and	
8	(E)	The applicant and any partner, directors, or	
9		members have not been convicted of any felony	
10		related to the possession, production, sale, or	
11		distribution of a controlled substance in any	
12		form in this or any other country.	
13	(b) An a	pplication may be [received beginning on January 1	
14	of_each_year]	submitted to the board at any time during the year	
15	in which the applicant plans to grow industrial hemp and shall		
16	be signed by t	the applicant or, in the case of a business entity,	
17	one of its officers, directors, or partners, as the case may be,		
18	and indicate that all information and documents submitted in		
19	support of the application are correct and complete to the best		
20	of the applicant's knowledge.		



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(c) Any incomplete application for a license[, or an
 application received after April 1 of any year,] shall be
 denied."
 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
