## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS, TEACHERS, PARENTS, AND STUDENTS TO BE EDUCATED ABOUT THE POTENTIAL HEALTH IMPACTS OF HEAVY BACKPACKS AND TO TAKE PROACTIVE MEASURES TO AVOID INJURY.

1 WHEREAS, overloaded school backpacks are increasingly causing back pain and spinal strain to students across the 2 3 nation; and 4 WHEREAS, because spinal ligaments and muscles are not fully 5 developed until after the age of sixteen, overweight backpacks 6 are a source of repeated low-level stress that may result in 7 chronic neck, shoulder, or back pain in children; and 8 9 WHEREAS, according to the United States Consumer Product 10 Safety Commission, more than seven thousand emergency room 11 visits each year are due to backpack-related injuries; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, studies show that heavy loads carried on the back have the potential to damage the soft tissues of the shoulder, 15 causing microstructural damage to the nerves and damage to 16 internal organs; and 17 18 WHEREAS, studies show an increase in curvatures of the 19 spine and compressed intervertebral height when backpacks exceed 20 ten percent of a child's body weight; and 21 22 WHEREAS, the 2010 Global Burden of Disease Study shows back 23 pain and musculoskeletal disorders as the leading causes of 24 disability worldwide; and 25 26 WHEREAS, children's textbooks are much heavier now than 27 they were in the past, and students also often carry computers, 28 cell phones, water bottles, athletic shoes, band instruments, 29



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and other equipment considered essential to have readily 1 available; and 2 3 WHEREAS, studies show that more than ninety percent of 4 5 students carry backpacks that weigh as much as twenty-five percent of the child's body weight; and 6 7 WHEREAS, backpacks often are not worn correctly but are 8 9 frequently slung over one shoulder or allowed to hang significantly below the waistline, increasing the weight on the 10 shoulders and making the child lean forward when walking or 11 stoop forward when standing to compensate for the weight; now, 12 13 therefore, 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 15 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 16 of 2018, the Senate concurring, that all school administrators, 17 teachers, parents, and students are strongly urged to be 18 educated about the potential health impacts of heavy backpacks 19 and to take proactive measures to avoid injury; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education is urged 22 to develop policies and procedures to allow licensed 23 chiropractors to conduct interval scoliosis examinations on 24 25 children in schools; and 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that schools are urged to work with 27 their parent-teacher associations to assess the extent to which 28 29 students use overweight backpacks and to promote innovative strategies to lessen the need to take all school materials and 30 books back and forth each day; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that schools are urged to consider 33 the following when developing their backpack education talking 34 points: 35 36 Encourage children to use backpacks that weigh no more 37 (1) than a maximum of ten percent of the child's body 38 weight; 39 40



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1 2 3 4	(2)	Encourage the use of ergonomic backpacks with individualized compartments to efficiently hold books and equipment;
5 6 7	(3)	Encourage children to wear both shoulder straps and not sling their backpacks over one shoulder;
8 9	(4)	Encourage the use of backpacks with wide, padded adjustable straps that fit a child's body;
10 11 12	(5)	Encourage leaving the heaviest books at school and using handouts or workbooks for homework assignments;
13 14 15	(6)	Consider increased use of electronic textbooks as federal and state funding becomes available; and
16 17 18 19 20 21 22	(7)	Consider integrated in-class education about backpack weight, for example, by using a hanging scale in the classroom to enable students to weigh backpacks and track the related data to determine ways to lighten loads; and
