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HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING VARIOUS GOVERNMENT ENTITIES TO DEVELOP, UPDATE, AND INTRODUCE POLICIES RELATED TO HELICOPTER AIR TOURS AT THE STATE AND NATIONAL LEVEL.

WHEREAS, the most popular helicopter tour destination on 1 the island of Hawai'i is Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, which 2 recently celebrated its one hundredth anniversary; and 3 4 WHEREAS, Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park is managed by the 5 Director of the National Park Service, which is a bureau of the 6 United States Department of the Interior, and has more non-7 essential tour helicopter overflights than any other individual 8 park in the nation; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in 2015, 14,630 flights within Hawai'i Volcanoes 11 National Park were reported by the helicopter industry; and 12 13 WHEREAS, as one of only three national parks that collects 14 air tour fees, Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park collected \$356,850 15 in air tour fees in 2014; and 16 17 WHEREAS, as of September 2016, up to fourteen helicopter 18 tour companies operated within Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park 19 under interim operating authority; and 20 21 WHEREAS, helicopter noise as a result of commercial air 22 tour flights over residential areas in the east Hawai'i region of 23 the island of Hawai'i has reached an unprecedented level in 24 25 recent years; and 26 WHEREAS, residents in Hāmākua, Hilo, Mountain View, Puna, 27 Volcano, and Ka'ū have continued to raise issues of overflights, 28 noise complaints, and safety with the state Department of 29 Transportation, Honolulu Flight Standards District Office of the 30 Federal Aviation Administration, and air tour helicopter 31 operators; and 32



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WHEREAS, the National Parks Overflight Act of 1987 requires 1 a minimum altitude of five thousand feet above ground level over 2 any national park; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, due to the absence of a congressionally mandated Air Tour Management Plan, some tour operators operating within 6 Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park are allowed to descend to five 7 hundred feet above ground level and as low as two hundred feet 8 above ground level over razorback ridges; and 9 10 WHEREAS, these operations pose not just a noise issue but a 11 flight-safety issue, as well; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the Federal Aviation Administration has jurisdiction over all airspace in the country and has the power 15 to regulate all aspects of civil aviation; and 16 17 WHEREAS, in 2000, the National Environmental Policy Act, in 18 19 conjunction with the National Parks Air Tour Management Act of 2000, required an Air Tour Management Plan to be implemented at 20 various national parks throughout the country; and 21 22 WHEREAS, the objective of an Air Tour Management Plan is 23 "to develop acceptable and effective measures to mitigate or 24 prevent the significant adverse impacts, if any, of commercial 25 air tour operations upon the natural and cultural resources, 26 visitor experiences and tribal lands"; and 27 28 WHEREAS, in 2004, the Federal Aviation Administration and 29 National Park Service requested public comment on an Air Tour 30 Management Plan Environmental Assessment relating to managing 31 commercial air tour overflights at Hawai'i Volcanoes National 32 33 Park; and 34 WHEREAS, in 2005, the project was upgraded to an 35 Environmental Impact Statement, and the Federal Aviation 36 Administration published a notice of opportunity for commercial 37 air tour operators granted interim operating authority to review 38 and self-correct annual authorizations; and 39 40 WHEREAS, in 2007, a planning team composed of staff from 41 the Federal Aviation Administration, National Park Service, and 42 Volpe National Transportation Systems Center began work on 43



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preliminary alternatives for air tour operations over Hawai'i 1 2 Volcanoes National Park; and 3 WHEREAS, in 2008, Federal Aviation Administration and 4 National Park Service staff met with Hawai'i air tour operators, 5 and acoustic monitoring of three sites at Hawai'i Volcanoes 6 National Park was conducted; and 7 8 WHEREAS, in 2011, a preliminary draft Air Tour Management 9 Plan for Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park was published, 10 identifying five alternatives for public comment, and three 11 open-house public meetings on the draft plan were held in April 12 2011, in Volcano, Pahoa, and Na'alehu; and 13 14 WHEREAS, seven years later, in 2018, there is still no 15 final Air Tour Management Plan for Hawai'i Volcanoes National 16 17 Park; and 18 WHEREAS, in addition, after more than sixteen years, no Air 19 Tour Management Plan for any national park in the nation has 20 been completed; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, consequently, the only rules that govern helicopter and fixed-wing air tours over the airspace of the 24 Hawaiian Islands is the Hawai'i Air Tour Common Procedures 25 Manual, a Federal Aviation Administration document that was 26 issued in 2008; and 27 28 WHEREAS, the Hawai'i Air Tour Common Procedures Manual 29 covers rules over all islands and air tour operators that have 30 been granted interim operating authority; and 31 32 WHEREAS, this manual is nearly ten years old, and its rules 33 and prescribed altitudes for overflights over land are unclear; 34 35 and 36 WHEREAS, in 2010, the United States Census Bureau reported 37 that the island of Hawai'i, particularly east Hawai'i, was the 38 fastest-growing region in the State; and 39 40 WHEREAS, the population of Puna has reached forty-five 41 thousand residents, and the majority of air tour overflights 42



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transit over these residential areas on their way to Hawai'i 1 2 Volcanoes National Park on a daily basis; and 3 WHEREAS, furthermore, when air tours depart Hawai'i 4 Volcanoes National Park, they typically fly a route toward the 5 waterfall attractions in North Hilo, traveling over Volcano, 6 Mountain View, Waiākea-Uka, Kaumana, North Hilo, Hāmākua, and 7 8 Honoka'a; and 9 WHEREAS, it is essential to achieve a balance between 10 residents and the tour industry that respects the peace and 11 12 serenity that all residents in east Hawaii should be able to enjoy; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the visitors who travel from around the world to 15 Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park should also be able to enjoy that 16 same peace and tranquility as well as the precious ecosystems 17 and wildlife that exist in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park; now, 18 therefore, 19 20 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 21 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 22 of 2018, that the respective government entities at the state 23 and national level are urged to develop, update, and introduce 24 policies related to helicopter air tours; and 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Federal Aviation 27 Administration is urged to complete the Air Tour Management Plan 28 for Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, Haleakala, and other 29 designated national parks throughout the nation; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of 32 Transportation, Federal Aviation Administration, and Honolulu 33 Flight Standards District Office of the Federal Aviation 34 Administration are urged to update the nearly decade-old Hawai'i 35 Air Tour Common Procedures Manual; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor, Director of 38 Transportation, General Aviation Officer of the Department of 39 Transportation, and Honolulu Flight Standards District Office of 40 the Federal Aviation Administration are urged to work with 41 community stakeholders and the local helicopter tour industry to 42 update air tour flight paths to include a variety of recommended 43



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1 routes, including off-shore routes; altitudes; reporting procedures; and noise mitigation operations that can alleviate 2 helicopter noise pollution, while also providing the highest 3 level of safety for helicopter tour operators; and 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawai'i Congressional 6 delegation is urged to introduce legislation addressing 7 helicopter tour operations and noise pollution surrounding 8 America's highly populated cities, towns, and communities; and 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hawai'i air tour operators are 11 urged to meet with community stakeholders once a quarter to work 12 together to address concerns related to noise complaints and 13 safety issues; and 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hawai'i air tour operators are 16 urged to operate helicopter air tours no earlier than sunrise 17 and no later than sunset on normal business days and no earlier 18 than one hour after sunrise and one hour before sunset on 19 weekends and holidays, as published by the United States Naval 20 Observatory on its website for Honolulu; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 23 Resolution be transmitted to the United States Secretary of 24 Transportation, each member of Hawai'i's Congressional 25 delegation, Administrator of the Federal Aviation 26 Administration, Deputy Director of the National Park Service, 27 Manager of the Honolulu Flight Standards District Office of the 28 Federal Aviation Administration, Governor, Director of 29 Transportation, General Aviation Officer of the Department of 30 Transportation, and Hawaii Helicopter Association. 31
