HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNOR AND THE DIRECTOR OF HUMAN SERVICES TO REINSTATE RESTORATIVE AND PREVENTATIVE DENTAL MEDICAID COVERAGE FOR ADULT BENEFICIARIES IN THE STATE OF HAWAII.

WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that a more concerted 1 2 effort needs to be made to address oral health in Hawaii, 3 especially in underserved communities in response to the State's 4 receipt of a failing grade of "F" in a series of recent oral health report cards released by The Pew Center on the States; 5 6 and 7 8 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health in its "Hawaii Oral Health: Key Findings" report of September 25, 2015: 9 10 Eighty-two percent of high-income adults in Hawaii see 11 (1)12 a dentist each year, as compared to only fifty-two percent of low-income adults; 13 14 15 (2)Fifty-one percent of low-income adults lost teeth due to dental disease, compared to only thirty-two percent 16 of high-income adults; 17 18 Only forty-one percent of preqnant women in Hawaii 19 (3) 20 reported seeing a dentist during their pregnancy from 2009 to 2011, with low-income women and women in the 21 22 medicaid program among the lowest estimated groups of 23 receiving care; 24 (4)In 2012, there were more than three thousand emergency 25 26 room visits due to preventable dental problems, representing a sixty-seven percent increase from 2006, 27 significantly higher than the national average, and 28 29 these visits accounted for \$8,500,000 in total expenditures by the State, more than double the 30 \$4,000,000 spent in 2006; and 31 32



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Only eleven percent of Hawaii's residents receive 1 (5) fluoridated drinking water, as compared to seventy-2 3 five percent for the United States as a whole; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Legislature asserts that these figures represent that oral health in the State is a pervasive and 6 7 expensive public health crisis that needs to be addressed, 8 especially in low-income and underserved populations; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in response to these glaring disparities and inadequacies, the Department of Health posited eight key 11 strategies for rebuilding the State's dental public health 12 infrastructure, including: 13 14 (1)Continuing to support and expand affordable and 15 accessible preventive dental care services to Hawaii's 16 17 low-income populations; 18 (2) Expanding medicaid dental services for adults beyond 19 the current coverage for "emergencies only" to include 20 preventive and treatment services; 21 22 (3) Considering increasing reimbursements to dental 23 providers for key preventive or restorative procedures 24 25 to increase participation in medicaid; and 26 (4) Developing strategies to reduce barriers to finding 27 and receiving preventive dental care services for 28 children enrolled in the medicaid program; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that it is in the best 31 32 interest of the State to expand access to coverage by restoring 33 basic adult dental benefits to medicaid enrollees; and 34 WHEREAS, the Legislature further finds that the State's 35 36 Federally matched medicaid program forms an essential support for underserved individuals by offering insurance options for 37 low-income citizens, in addition to other social service 38 39 programs; and 40 WHEREAS, restoring basic adult dental benefits would be in 41 line with the intent of the Department of Health, allowing for 42



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individuals to eat properly, work productively, improve mental 1 health well-being, and increase attendance and participation in 2 3 school; and 4 5 WHEREAS, funding for Hawaii's medicaid program is under the 6 auspices of the Department of Human Services, not the Department 7 of Health; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the entire medicaid program is funded in a single 10 line item in the Executive Budget, General Appropriations Act of 11 2017, Session Laws of Hawaii (SLH) 2017; and 12 WHEREAS, the objective of this line item is to "ensure that 13 14 qualified low-income and disabled individuals and families are provided health care services, including medical, dental, 15 hospital, nursing home, home and community-based, and other 16 17 professional services, either through a fee-for-service or QUEST-managed care program."; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, in addition to general funds, special funds, federal funds, other federal funds, and interdepartmental 21 22 transfers were appropriated into the General Appropriations Act of 2017; and 23 24 WHEREAS, in 2018, the Department of Human Services 25 requested \$4,704,480 in general funds, and \$7,066,720 in federal 26 funds for fiscal year 2019, to restore adult dental medicaid 27 28 benefits, including preventative and restorative oral health services; and 29 30 WHEREAS, \$4,704,480 in general funds requested is less than 31 one-half of one percent of the \$944,108,598 in general funds 32 33 that had already been appropriated into General Appropriations 34 Act of 2017; and 35 36 WHEREAS, accordingly, the Legislature asserts that adult dental medicaid benefits can be restored without the 37 appropriation of additional funds if the Department of Human 38 Services can achieve cost savings of less than one-half of one 39 percent of the current appropriation for the General 40 Appropriations Act of 2017; and 41 42



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WHEREAS, the Legislature also acknowledges that the 1 2 governor has significant discretionary authority to shift funds 3 for budgeting purposes; and 4 WHEREAS, among other things, the governor could transfer 5 6 surplus general funds to the General Appropriations Act of 2017 to supplement the operational funds for medicaid; and 7 8 WHEREAS, according to the governor's six-year financial 9 plan, it is estimated that the State will experience a general 10 fund surplus of between \$654,900,000 and \$829,100,000 for fiscal 11 year 2019; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the total funding requested to reinstate adult 14 dental medicaid benefits of \$11,771,200 amounts to between 1.4 15 and 1.7 percent of the estimated general fund carry-over 16 17 balance; now, therefore, 18 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 19 20 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, that the Governor and the Director of Human Services 21 are urged to reinstate restorative and preventative dental 22 coverage for adult medicaid beneficiaries within its current 23 24 budget appropriation found in the General Appropriations Act of 25 2017; and 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of Human Services 27 is requested to submit a report to the Legislature at least 28 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 29 30 2019 that includes, but is not limited to: 31 The number of adult medicaid recipients receiving 32 (1)restorative and preventative dental benefits; and 33 34 (2) A projection of the number of eligible adult medicaid 35 beneficiaries who would be eligible to receive 36 restorative and preventative dental benefits during 37 fiscal biennium 2019-2020; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 40 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Directors of 41



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Human Services, Health, and Finance, and the Chief Executive
Officer of the Hawaii Primary Care Association.
