A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that improvement and
- 2 modernization of University of Hawaii facilities is key to
- 3 meeting twenty-first century needs for learning, teaching, and
- 4 research. Optimizing and modernizing university infrastructure
- 5 will require a long term campus master plan and significant
- 6 funding. During a time when resources have been shrinking,
- 7 budgets have inflated to the point where the State can no longer
- 8 fully fund the university's current needs and future development
- 9 plans.
- 10 Deferred maintenance backlog at the university has exceeded
- 11 \$500,000,000, and that amount will grow exponentially if it is
- 12 not addressed in an aggressive manner. Rather than increasing
- 13 student tuition and fees to finance projects that are not funded
- 14 by the legislature, a creative option is needed to generate
- 15 revenue from university lands that will be exclusively used for
- 16 new construction of twenty-first century university facilities
- 17 and the repair and maintenance of existing university



- 1 facilities. The department of education was granted such
- 2 authority to generate revenue through optimizing underused lands
- 3 by Act 155, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013.
- 4 The legislature further finds that the Honolulu rail
- 5 transit project provides a unique opportunity to generate
- 6 additional revenue for the University of Hawaii. The university
- 7 owns a considerable amount of property along the Honolulu rail
- 8 transit project, and the proposed rail extension to Manoa
- 9 remains a game changing opportunity for the university system
- 10 and its students.
- 11 The purpose of this Act is to optimize the use of
- 12 University of Hawaii lands to generate opportunities to improve
- 13 the current facilities and infrastructure to meet the challenges
- 14 of the twenty-first century, and to improve the overall quality
- 15 of education at the University of Hawaii. In particular, this
- 16 Act establishes a pilot program to generate revenue from uses
- 17 for public purposes, such as workforce housing, to build and
- 18 retrofit twenty-first century campuses and create more campus-
- 19 centered communities. The pilot program will lay important
- 20 groundwork for a statewide approach and plan to optimize public
- 21 lands and modernize public facilities. This Act also

1	establishes that revenue derived from the program shall be
2.	deposited into the University of Hawaii real property and
3	facilities use revolving fund, and authorizes moneys in the
4	revolving fund to be used to build or upgrade university
5	facilities.
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
8	and to read as follows:
9	"§304A- Pilot program for lease of university land. (a)
10	There shall be established within the university a pilot project
11	for the lease of university land, including facilities. The
12	university shall serve as the facilitator of the pilot program.
13	(b) The university may lease university land on terms it
14	deems appropriate; provided that:
15	(1) The board of regents may select any university land
16	sites that are located:
17	(A) Within county-designated transit-oriented
18	development zones;
19	(B) Within a one-half-mile radius of public transit
20	stations; or

1	(C) Within a one-half-mile radius of any rail transit
2	extension beyond the rail transit route approved
,3	by the Federal Transportation Administration as
4	of January 1, 2017;
5	provided further that during the identification and
6	selection process, the board of regents shall hold at least
7	one public meeting pursuant to chapter 92 in each affected
8	community, and shall foster university and community
9	participation;
10	(2) The university shall work with the university's school
11	of architecture to help develop the university land
12	sites;
13	(3) Title of the university land sites selected by the
14	board of regents for the pilot project that are public
15	lands as defined in section 171-2 shall be transferred
16	through a deed to the university if the university
17	does not already own the land parcels; and
18	(4) Each lease shall stipulate that the lessee may retain
19	any revenue generated from the facilities; provided
20	that:

1	(A)	The lessee shall be obligated to pay to the
2		county all applicable property tax on the value
3		of any improvements;
4	<u>(B)</u>	Upon the expiration of the lease, the facilities
5		shall revert to the university; and
6	<u>(C)</u>	All revenues and proceeds derived by the State
7		under this section shall be deposited in the
8		University of Hawaii real property and facilities
9		use revolving fund pursuant to section 304A-2274.
10	(c) Noth	ing in this section shall preclude the university
11	from working w	ith and receiving assistance from any other state
12	department or	agency in carrying out the purposes of this
13	section.	
14	(d) The	board of regents shall adopt rules, to be known as
15	development ru	les, pursuant to chapter 91 for development of
16	university lan	ds under the pilot project. Upon final adoption
17	of a developme	nt for the pilot project, the development rules
18	shall supersed	e all transit oriented development or county
19	plans, ordinan	ces, or zoning development codes.
20	(e) For	the purposes of this section, "university land"
21	means land own	ed, leased, or otherwise used by the university."

1	SECTION 3. Section 304A-2274, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
2	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:	
3	"(a) There is established the University of Hawaii real	
4	property and facilities use revolving fund into which shall be	
5	deposited all revenues collected by the university for the use	
6	of university real property and facilities, except as otherwise	
7	provided by law. The board of regents may establish prices,	
8	fees, and charges, including those for the sale, lease, or use	
9	of university real property and facilities, which include land,	
10	buildings, grounds, furnishings, and equipment; provided that	
11	the university shall comply with all statutory and common law	
12	requirements in the disposition of ceded lands. The board of	
13	regents shall be exempt from the public notice and public	
14	hearing requirements of chapter 91 in establishing and amending	
15	the fees and charges. The university may establish separate	
16	accounts within the revolving fund for major program activities.	
17	Funds deposited into the revolving fund accounts shall be	
18	expended to pay the costs of [operating]:	
19	(1) Operating university facilities, including repair and	
20	maintenance, administrative expenses, salaries, wages,	

and benefits of employees, contractor services,

1	supplies, security, furnishings, equipment, janitorial
2	services, insurance, utilities, and other operational
3	expenses[-]; and
4	(2) New construction and upgrade of university facilities.
5	Revenues not expended as provided in this section may be
6	transferred to other university funds to be invested or expended
7	for the administrative or overhead costs of the university. All
8	expenditures from this revolving fund shall be subject to
9	legislative appropriation."
10	SECTION 4. The university shall submit a report to the
11	legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
12	the regular session of 2018 and each regular session thereafter
13	until completion of the project authorized pursuant to this Act.
14	The report shall provide the following:
15	(1) A timeline for the pilot program pursuant to this Act,
16	including but not limited to:
17	(A) A timeline for the redevelopment of each selected
18	site;
19	(B) An estimate start and completion date for each
20	selected site; and

1		(C) Estimates for the time required to obtain any
2		necessary county or state approvals required to
3		complete the redevelopment of each site;
4	(2)	A summary of the university's activities, results, and
5		recommendations to optimize the use of university
6		lands as a means to build or renovate twenty-first
7		century universities and campus-centered communities;
8	(3)	A summary of all university and community engagement
9		efforts undertaken or that will be undertaken by the
10		university in carrying out the pilot program pursuant
11		to this Act;
12	(4)	A summary of the university's current and projected
13		budgeted expenses, including the identification of any
14		contracts with third parties and the creation of
15		temporary positions within the university in carrying
16		out the pilot program pursuant to this Act;
17	(5)	A summary of any capacity and funding issues or
18		challenges the university has encountered in carrying
19		out the pilot project pursuant to this Act; and
20	(6)	Any proposed legislation.

- 1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and
- 4 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 5 year 2018-2019 for the university lands pilot program
- 6 established pursuant to section 2 of this Act.
- 7 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University
- 8 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 9 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

Report Title:

University of Hawaii; Land Lease; University Facilities; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes a pilot program to generate revenue through the lease of University of Hawaii land for public purposes. Requires that the parcels of land be located within a county-designated transit-oriented zone, a one-half-mile radius of public transit stations, or a one-half-mile radius of any rail transit extension beyond the rail transit route approved as of January 1, 2017. Authorizes moneys in the University of Hawaii real property and facilities use revolving fund to be used for new construction and upgrade of university facilities. Requires the university to report to the legislature. Makes an appropriation for the pilot program.
