### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds an educated labor force 2 and engaged citizenry are essential in today's global, 3 knowledge-based economy. Across the nation, states have set 4 ambitious goals to boost college completion rates. The 5 University of Hawaii's graduation initiative is a systemwide strategic initiative endorsed by the University of Hawaii board 6 of regents with a goal to increase the educational capital of 7 8 the State by increasing participation in, and completion of, 9 college by students, particularly native Hawaiians, low-income 10 students, and those from underserved regions and populations, 11 and preparing them for success in the workforce and their 12 communities.

Furthermore, Hawaii's own 55 by '25 campaign goal focuses on increasing the percentage of working-age adults with two- or four-year degrees to fifty-five per cent by 2025. According to the most recent data available, forty-four per cent of Hawaii's working-age adults have a postsecondary degree. As the State's



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sole public higher education system, the University of Hawaii is
 committed to doing its part to close the State's projected
 educational attainment gap.

4 In April 2016, the Institute for Research on Higher 5 Education at the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of 6 Education issued a study that analyzed college costs in relation to family income level. The study revealed how higher education 7 8 has gone from expensive to unaffordable for most low- and 9 middle-income families. According to this same study, Hawaii 10 ranked third in the nation for overall college affordability and noted that the University of Hawaii community colleges are the 11 12 most affordable public two-year institutions in the nation.

13 The report further acknowledged that despite Hawaii's 14 overall high affordability ranking, attending college was a big 15 expense for families earning less than \$30,000 annually; that 16 Hawaii's financial aid policies did little to alleviate costs 17 for these families; and that the State provided minimal need-18 based aid to students attending public institutions.

Although the State does not budget for scholarships,
University of Hawaii policy requires that a minimum percentage
of tuition revenue be set aside for need-based scholarships,



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1 including 8.8 per cent at the community colleges. Even though 2 financial aid through Pell grants, University of Hawaii and 3 private scholarships, the GI Bill for service members and 4 veterans, and employers cover much of the cost for need-based 5 students, cost is still a barrier for certain need-based 6 students.

The legislature further finds that in response to the 7 growing need for additional sources of financial aid, Hawaii has 8 9 recently implemented a financial aid program called the Hawaii promise program. The Hawaii promise program is a need-based 10 award providing free in-state tuitions that are intended to be 11 applied toward the unmet need of qualified students enrolled at 12 any community college campus of the University of Hawaii. 13 Recipients are selected based on certain criteria combined with 14 the use of a selecting algorithm. The awards are contingent 15 upon funding and amounts received by gualified recipients are 16 determined by the individual students' Free Application for 17 18 Federal Student Aid information.

19 The legislature notes that H.B. No. 1594, Regular Session 20 of 2017, as amended, proposed to establish the Hawaii Promise 21 program under law, but this measure did not pass the



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1	legislature. Instead, funding totaling \$1,800,000 for each year
2	of the fiscal biennium 2018 and 2019 for Hawaii promise was
3	included in the state budget under the Act 49, Session Laws of
4	Hawaii 2017. As a result of this legislative appropriation,
5	almost one thousand students from the University of Hawaii's
6	seven community colleges were awarded Hawaii Promise
7	scholarships for the 2017 fall semester. This represents about
8	four per cent of the twenty-three thousand students currently
9	enrolled at University of Hawaii community colleges.
10	The purpose of this Act is to:
11	(1) Codify the Hawaii promise program into law to provide
12	scholarships for the unmet direct cost needs of
13	qualified students;
14	(2) Expand the Hawaii promise program to qualified
15	students enrolled at any University of Hawaii campus
16	in addition to qualified students enrolled at any
17	University of Hawaii community college campus; and
18	(3) Establish a special fund and appropriate funds to
19	maintain the Hawaii promise program.

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1	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y adding a new section to part II, subpart B, to be

11	(2)	Completes and submits the Free Application for Federal

16		program with fifteen or more credits per semester;

5	Social, economic, and other factors, or other extenuating
6	circumstances as determined by the University of Hawaii shall be
7	considered in determining probation. If the student
8	demonstrates during the probation period satisfactory progress
9	toward meeting degree completion and satisfying the requirements
10	of the scholarship, the student shall be returned to good
11	standing. Failure to meet the probationary period requirements
12	of this subsection shall result in revocation of the student's
13	scholarship, and the student shall be responsible for
14	reimbursing the University of Hawaii for up to two semesters of
15	scholarship amounts received under the program. A student may
16	be placed on scholarship probation only once during any eight-
17	semester period at a University of Hawaii campus. If a student
18	is returned to good standing after a period of probation, but
19	subsequently fails to comply with the requirements of subsection
20	(e) at any time within an eight-semester period, after the



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1	return to good standing, the student's scholarship shall be
2	revoked.
3	(g) As used in this section, "direct cost" means any cost
4	directly related to a student's education. "Direct costs"
5	include tuition, educational fees, and the costs of books,
6	supplies, and transportation between the student's dwelling and
7	the student's campus."
8	SECTION 3. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended by adding a new section to part V, subpart C, to be
10	appropriately designated and to read as follows:

9	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
10	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
11	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to be
12	deposited into the Hawaii promise program special fund.
13	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii promise
14	program special fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof
15	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to establish,
16	implement, and maintain the Hawaii promise program, including
17	the provision of the program's scholarships, at the University
18	of Hawaii at Manoa, Hilo, and West Oahu campuses.
19	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
20	Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

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1	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii promise
2	program special fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof
3	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to maintain the
4	Hawaii promise program, including the provision of the program's
5	scholarships, at the community college campuses of the
6	University of Hawaii.
7	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
8	Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
9	SECTION 7. In codifying the new sections added by sections
10	2 and 3 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
11	appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
12	the new sections in this Act.
13	SECTION 8. New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.
