A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOBACCO.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the density of tobacco retailers around schools has a significant impact on the prevalence of youth tobacco use. A 2008 study by L. Henriksen, et al., found that the incidence of smoking was significantly higher among students in schools with the highest density of surrounding tobacco retailers compared with students in schools without any tobacco retailers nearby.

8 The legislature further finds that electronic smoking 9 devices are especially popular among youth, surpassing 10 cigarettes as the most commonly used tobacco product. The 2015 11 Hawaii Youth Risk Behaviors Survey reports that twenty-five per 12 cent of high school students and fifteen per cent of middle 13 school students have used electronic vapor products in the past 14 thirty days. The popularity of these devices is concerning, as 15 electronic smoking devices are not safe alternatives to other 16 tobacco products, as exposure to nicotine increases the risk of 17 addiction and may disrupt critical brain development.

1 The legislature recognizes that tobacco advertising and 2 retailers suggest smoking is acceptable, and youth and children 3 are particularly susceptible to these cues. Tobacco and 4 electronic smoking device manufacturers employ tactics that appeal to youth, such as child-friendly flavors, celebrity 5 6 endorsements, and high-tech design. The tobacco industry spends 7 \$24,300,000 on marketing per year in Hawaii. In addition, the 8 electronic smoking device industry spent an estimated 9 \$115,000,000 in 2014, a nearly 1,700 per cent increase from 10 2011. Youth who walk or take public transportation to school may be exposed to advertising of tobacco products and electronic 11 12 smoking devices at locations such as convenience stores, grocery 13 stores, and gas stations.

14 The legislature further finds that several cities in 15 California and New York have implemented tobacco retail buffer 16 zones, ranging from three to fifteen hundred feet, where sales 17 of tobacco products and permits for tobacco retailers are 18 prohibited within a certain proximity to schools, parks, 19 libraries, and other youth-oriented areas. Tobacco retail 20 buffer zones encourage responsible tobacco retailing, reduces 21 tobacco-related health disparities, and most importantly,

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reduces youth tobacco use, especially electronic smoking device
 use.

The purpose of this Act is to reduce the use, access, and exposure of tobacco products to youth by prohibiting the issuance and renewal of retail tobacco permits for, and the sale of a tobacco product or an electronic smoking device at, a place of business within five hundred feet of preschools, schools, and public playgrounds.

9 SECTION 2. Chapter 328J, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
11 and to read as follows:

12 "§328J- Tobacco products and electronic smoking devices; prohibited locations. (a) It shall be unlawful to sell a 13 tobacco product or an electronic smoking device at a place of 14 business located within five hundred feet of a public or private 15 preschool; a public or private elementary, intermediate, or high 16 17 school; or public playground utilized extensively by minors. 18 The distance of five hundred feet shall be measured from the 19 boundary of the preschool, school, or public playground to the 20 boundary of the place of business's premises. Public or private 21 beaches, and public or private day care centers located in or

| 16 | SECTION 3. Section 245-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is |
| 17 | amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: |
| 18 | "(c) The retail tobacco permit shall be issued by the |
| 19 | department upon application by the retailer in the form and |
| 20 | manner prescribed by the department, and the payment of a fee of |
| 21 | 20[-]; provided that the place of business for which the permit |

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| 1 | is sought shall not be within five hundred of a public or |
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| 2 | private preschool; a public or private elementary, intermediate, |
| 3 | or high school; or public playground utilized extensively by |
| 4 | minors. Permits shall be valid for one year, from December 1 to |
| 5 | November 30, and renewable annually $[-,]$; provided that the |
| 6 | department shall not renew a permit for a place of business that |
| 7 | is located within five hundred feet of a public or private |
| 8 | preschool; a public or private elementary, intermediate, or high |
| 9 | school; or public playground utilized extensively by minors, |
| 10 | such that the permit shall be valid beyond November 30, 2019. |
| 11 | Whenever a retail tobacco permit is defaced, destroyed, or lost, |
| 12 | or the permittee relocates the permittee's business, the |
| 13 | department may issue a duplicate retail tobacco permit to the |
| 14 | permittee for a fee of \$5 per copy. The distance of five |
| 15 | hundred feet shall be measured from the boundary of the |
| 16 | preschool, school, or public playground to the boundary of the |
| 17 | place of business's premises. Public or private beaches, and |
| 18 | public or private day care centers located in or adjacent to |
| 19 | commercial areas shall not be deemed schools or public |
| 20 | playgrounds for purposes of this subsection. Vocational or |
| 21 | licensing schools, or other schools attended primarily by |



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1 adults, shall not be considered schools for the purposes of this 2 subsection." 3 SECTION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that 4 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were 5 begun before its effective date. 6 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 8 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018; 9 provided that section 2 shall take effect on December 1, 2019. 10



Report Title:

Tobacco; Electronic Smoking Devices; Tobacco Retailer Buffer Zones; Keiki Caucus

Description:

Prohibits the issuance and renewal beyond November 30, 2019, of retail tobacco permits for businesses that are located within five hundred feet of a preschool, school, or certain public playgrounds. Beginning on December 1, 2019, prohibits the sale of tobacco products and electronic smoking devices by businesses that are located within five hundred feet of a preschool, school, or certain public playgrounds.
