## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAI'I.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the cost of
- 2 attending college continues to rise. According to the College
- 3 Board, the cost of tuition and fees for attending an in-state
- 4 public college for the 2017-2018 academic year averaged \$9,970,
- 5 while the average cost for books and supplies for the same
- 6 academic year at public colleges averaged \$1,250. Additionally,
- 7 in the last twenty years, the cost of college textbooks has
- 8 risen much more rapidly than the consumer price index.
- 9 In April 2016, the Institute for Research on Higher
- 10 Education at the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of
- 11 Education issued a study that analyzed college costs in relation
- 12 to family income level. The study revealed how higher education
- 13 has gone from expensive to unaffordable for most low- and
- 14 middle-income families. According to this same study, Hawai'i
- 15 ranked third in the nation for overall college affordability and
- 16 noted that the University of Hawai'i community colleges are the
- 17 most affordable public two-year institutions in the nation.

1 The report further acknowledged that despite Hawaii's 2 overall high affordability ranking, attending college was a big 3 expense for families earning less than \$30,000 annually; that 4 Hawaii's financial aid policies did little to alleviate costs 5 for these families; and that the State provided minimal need-6 based aid to students attending public institutions. Therefore, 7 new and innovative solutions need to be implemented to lower 8 other costs associated with attending school within the 9 University of Hawai'i system. 10 The legislature further finds that since 2015, open 11 educational resources at the University of Hawai'i has offered 12 free instructional materials to potentially lower the cost of 13 higher education, provide faculty more control over their instructional materials, and enable new ways of learning for 14 15 students. Specifically, open educational resources offers 16 learning, teaching, and research resources that are either in 17 the public domain or have been released with an intellectual 18 property license that permits free reuse and repurposing. 19 Through faculty use of open educational resources since its 20 adoption, this technology-driven instructional content has saved students hundreds of thousands of dollars in textbook costs. 21

- 2 librarians, instructional designers, information technology
- 3 professionals, and the Western Interstate Commission for Higher
- 4 Education to review national best practices.
- 5 (d) The University of Hawai'i open educational resources
- 6 task force shall submit a report of its findings and
- 7 recommendation initiatives for supporting and expanding the use
- 8 of open educational resources at the University of Hawai'i,
- 9 including the costs for allowing faculty and students from all
- 10 campuses to access the library reference resources at the
- 11 University of Hawai'i at Manoa, to the legislature no later than
- 12 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of
- **13** 2019.
- (e) The University of Hawai'i open educational resources
- 15 task force shall be dissolved on July 1, 2019.
- 16 SECTION 3. (a) There is established a one-year open
- 17 educational resources pilot project grant program to incentivize
- 18 faculty at the University of Hawai'i to adopt, develop, and
- 19 implement open educational resources for their courses.
- 20 (b) The open educational resources pilot project grant
- 21 program shall award grants of up to \$5,000, but no less than

- 1 \$500, to faculty who want to begin to use open educational
- 2 resources or who are currently using open educational resources.
- 3 (c) Grants shall be awarded by the University of Hawai'i,
- 4 in conjunction with the University of Hawaii open educational
- 5 resources task force.
- 6 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$50,000 or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the
- 9 open educational resources pilot project grant program.
- 10 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 11 Hawai'i for the purposes of this Act.
- 12 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.

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### Report Title:

University of Hawai'i Open Educational Resources Task Force; Open Educational Resources Pilot Project Grant Program; Appropriation

### Description:

Establishes the University of Hawai'i open educational resources task force to conduct a comprehensive analysis and evaluation on all general education courses and high attendance courses taught at the University of Hawai'i system to identify open educational resources for those courses. Establishes and appropriates funds for an open educational resources pilot project grant program to incentivize faculty that adopt, develop, and implement open educational resources. (SD1)

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
