A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ABANDONED VEHICLES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that abandoned vehicles
- 2 on public roads are a widespread environmental disaster that can
- 3 adversely impact human health and safety.
- 4 The purpose of this Act is to require the counties to
- 5 remove and dispose of abandoned vehicles on public roads within
- 6 ten business days of abandonment.
- 7 SECTION 2. Chapter 290, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 9 and to read as follows:
- 10 "\$290- Rules. The department of transportation shall
- 11 adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 necessary to carry out the
- 12 purposes of this chapter."
- 13 SECTION 3. Section 290-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- "(a) The counties [may] shall cause vehicles that have
- 16 been abandoned to be taken into custody [and disposed of.]
- 17 within ten business days of abandonment. For the purposes of



- 1 this subsection, a vehicle is "abandoned" if it is defined to be
- 2 abandoned by an ordinance of the county in which the vehicle is
- 3 located. In the absence of such an ordinance, a vehicle is
- 4 "abandoned" if it is left unattended for a continuous period of
- 5 more than twenty-four hours and it is unlawfully parked on any
- 6 public highway or other public property or private lands defined
- 7 as a setback, shoulder, easement, or right of way that is
- 8 adjacent to or part of a public highway. The mayors of the
- 9 several counties may designate an agency within their counties
- 10 to carry out the functions and requirements of this section.
- 11 [The term] For the purposes of this subsection, "agency" means
- 12 any office, department, or other governmental unit of the
- 13 county."
- 14 SECTION 4. Section 290-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended to read as follows:
- 16 "§290-2 Notice to owner. (a) Upon taking custody of any
- 17 abandoned vehicle $[\tau]$ that has been reported stolen, a written
- 18 notice shall immediately be sent by registered or certified mail
- 19 to the legal and registered owner of the vehicle at the address
- 20 on record at the vehicle licensing division. The notice shall
- 21 contain a brief description of the vehicle, the location of

- 1 custody, and intended disposition of the vehicle if not
- 2 repossessed within ten days after the mailing of the notice, or
- 3 in the case where the address of the registered owner on record
- 4 at the vehicle licensing division is an out-of-state address,
- 5 within twenty business days after the mailing of the notice. A
- 6 notice need not be sent to a legal or registered owner or any
- 7 person with an unrecorded interest in the vehicle whose name or
- 8 address cannot be determined. Absent evidence to the contrary,
- 9 a notice shall be deemed received by the legal or registered
- 10 owner five days after the mailing.
- 11 (b) The county agency designated by the mayor to carry out
- 12 the functions and requirements of section 290-1 shall adopt
- 13 rules pursuant to chapter 91 regarding notification of vehicle
- owners.
- 15 [\(\(\frac{(b)}{c}\)] (c) For purposes of this section, "business days"
- 16 shall exclude Saturdays, Sundays, and state holidays. A notice
- 17 need not be sent to a legal or registered owner or any person
- 18 with an unrecorded interest in the vehicle whose name or address
- 19 cannot be determined. Absent evidence to the contrary, a notice
- 20 shall be deemed received by the legal or registered owner five
- 21 days after the mailing."

4		have been removed so as to nullify efforts to locate
5		or identify the current registered and legal owners;

9	(5)	The vehicle registration records of the county
10		director of finance contain no record that the vehicle
11		has ever been registered in the county.
12	Prior to	authorizing the removal of a derelict vehicle, the
13	administrative head of the county agency designated to carry ou	
14	section 2	90-1 or the executive director or a representative of
15	the executive director of the Hawaii public housing authority is	
16	the case of vehicles that have been abandoned on property owned	
17	managed,	or operated by the authority, shall notify the county
18	chief of	police only if the vehicle is reported stolen or

20	SECT	ION 6. Section 290-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	repealed.	

["\$290-3 Public auction. If the vehicle is not 1 2 repossessed within the time limits provided in section 290-2, 3 the vehicle shall be disposed of by public auction, through oral tenders, or by sealed bids, after public advertisement has been 4 5 made once in a newspaper of general circulation; provided that 6 the public auction shall not be held less than five days after 7 the publication has been made. Where no bid is received, the 8 vehicle may be either sold by negotiation, disposed of or sold 9 as junk, or donated to any governmental agency."] 10 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 11 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 12

Report Title:

Abandoned Vehicles; Removal and Disposal; Counties; Public Roads

Description:

Requires the counties to take into custody any abandoned vehicle on a public road within ten business days. Specifies that the requirement to provide written notice to the registered owner of an abandoned vehicle under section 290-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, applies only to abandoned vehicles that have been reported stolen. Amends the conditions that constitute a derelict vehicle. Repeals the requirement that abandoned vehicles be disposed of by public auction. (SD2)

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
