A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds, as declared in the World SECTION 1. Conservation Congress Hawai'i Commitments of 2016, that "[w]e 2 3 must undertake profound transformations in how human societies 4 live on Earth, with particular attention to making our patterns 5 of production and consumption more sustainable. We must 6 recognize that human health and wellbeing depend on healthy ecosystems. We must recognize that every form of life has value 7 8 - regardless of its worth to humans." Hawai'i has been a leader 9 in conservation efforts for decades, through its commitment to environmental and sustainability policies. In the 1970s, the 10 11 State enacted the State Environmental Policy, chapter 344, 12 Hawaii Revised Statutes, as a mechanism to set environmental 13 qoals.

In May of 2014, Hōkūle'a began a three-year voyage across the world's oceans carrying the message of Mālama Honua - to care for the earth. Building on the legacy of the Polynesian way finders, the Hōkūle'a Worldwide Voyage inspired actions of

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conservation across the Hawaiian Islands and beyond, resulting 1 2 in the connection of a lei of aloha around the globe. 3 At the global level, the United Nations Sustainable 4 Development Goals, the World Conservation Congress Hawai'i 5 Commitments of 2016, and the Paris Climate Agreement have been 6 adopted to quide global efforts. The Sustainable Development 7 Goals (SDGs), otherwise known as the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable 8 Development, were born at the United Nations Conference on 9 Sustainable Development in Rio de Janeiro in 2012, came into 10 force in 2015, and are a universal call to action to end 11 poverty, protect the planet, and ensure that all people enjoy 12 peace and prosperity. The seventeen SDGs are interconnected and 13 work in the spirit of partnership and pragmatism to make the 14 right choices now to improve life, in a sustainable way, for 15 future generations. They provide a clear framework for action 16 to quide countries in accordance with their own priorities and 17 the environmental challenges of the world at large. They tackle 18 the root causes of poverty and unite us to make a positive 19 change for both people and planet.

20 Dealing with the threat of climate change impacts how we
21 manage our fragile natural resources, achieving gender equality

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1	and bette	r health helps eradicate poverty, and fostering peace	
2	and inclu	sive societies will reduce inequalities and help	
3	economies prosper. The SDGs are voluntary commitments to make		
4	the world	a better and more prosperous place.	
5	Duri	ng the September 2016 International Union for	
6	Conservation of Nature World Conservation Congress in Hawaiʻi,		
7	seven challenges and proposed solutions were identified, which		
8	are:		
9	(1)	Linking spirituality, religion, culture, and	
10		conservation;	
11	(2)	Engaging and empowering youth;	
12	(3)	The challenge of sustaining the global food supply and	
13		conserving nature;	
14	(4)	The challenge of preserving the health of the world	
15		ocean;	
16	(5)	The challenge of ending wildlife trafficking;	
17	(6)	The challenge of engaging with the private sector; and	
18	(7)	The challenge of climate change.	
19	The Hawai	'i Commitments build on the Paris Climate Agreement and	
20	the SDGs	to allow different global voices to come together and	

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find common ground in the spirit of partnership, collaboration,
 and sustainability.

In order for Hawai'i to continue to serve as a starlight for the rest of the world in setting policies on sustainability and to serve as a global leader on issues of conservation and sustainability, it is essential that the State demonstrate its full commitment to its own policies and goals as well as the goals set on the international stage at United Nations conferences and summits on sustainability.

10 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to codify the State's 11 commitment to conservation and sustainability by including goal 12 eleven, sustainable cities and communities, of the seventeen 13 United Nations SDGs and indicators, with references to existing 14 state sustainability programs, if applicable, in the Hawaii 15 Revised Statutes.

16 SECTION 2. Chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
18 and to read as follows:

19 "§226- Sustainable development goals; sustainable cities
 20 and communities. In pursuance of the State's sustainability
 21 goals, and notwithstanding any law to the contrary, all agencies



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1	shall, in	sofar as practicable, take action to assist the State
2	<u>in achiev</u>	ing the sustainable development goal of making cities
3	and commu	nities inclusive, safe, resilient, and sustainable by
4	2030 by:	
5	(1)	Ensuring access for all to adequate, safe, and
6		affordable housing and basic services;
7	(2)	Providing access to safe, affordable, accessible, and
8		sustainable transport systems for all, and improving
9		road safety, notably by expanding public transport,
10		with special attention to the needs of those in
11		vulnerable situations, women, children, persons with
12		disabilities, and older persons;
13	(3)	Increasing livability and resilience in the built
14		environment through planning and implementation at the
15		state and county levels;
16	(4)	Strengthening efforts to protect and safeguard the
17		cultural and natural heritage of Hawaiʻi by linking
18		spirituality, religion, culture, and conservation to
19		cultivate a culture of conservation, pursuant to the
20		World Conservation Congress Hawai'i Commitments of
21		2016;

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1	(5)	Significantly reducing the number of deaths and the
2		number of people affected and substantially decreasing
3		the direct economic losses caused by disasters with a
4		focus on protecting the poor and people in vulnerable
5		situations;
6	(6)	Reducing the adverse per capita environmental impact
7		of cities, including by paying special attention to
8		air quality and municipal and other waste management
9		in line with the goals of the World Conservation
10		Congress Hawai'i Commitments of 2016;
11	(7)	Providing universal access to safe, inclusive, and
12		accessible green and public spaces, in particular for
13		women and children, older persons, and persons with
14		disabilities;
15	(8)	Supporting positive economic, social, and
16		environmental links between urban and rural areas by
17		strengthening development planning in line with the
18		goals of the Sustainable Hawaiʻi Initiative and World
19		Conservation Congress Hawai'i Commitments of 2016; and
20	(9)	Substantially increasing the number of cities and
21		towns adopting and implementing integrated policies



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1	and plans toward inclusion, resource efficiency,
2	mitigation and adaptation to climate change,
3	resilience to disasters, and developing and
4	implementing holistic disaster risk management at all
5	levels."
6	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
7	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
