A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. According to The Pew Center on the States, one 2 in thirty-two adults in Hawaii is under correctional control. 3 The legislature recognized that the financial, social, and 4 economic costs of incarceration without adequate rehabilitation 5 are staggering, and thus enacted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2007 (Act 8), also known as the Community Safety Act of 6 7 2007 and codified as chapter 353H, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 8 Act 8 established a comprehensive offender reentry system under 9 the purview of the department of public safety. One key 10 component of Act 8 required the department of public safety to 11 submit annual reports relating to the implementation, progress, 12 and effectiveness of the various program components specified in 13 Act 8.

14 While the department's annual report listed program
15 activities and statistics, it did not include information on
16 program outcomes. The legislature finds that use of performance
17 indicators is an effective way to monitor and evaluate the



progress of the comprehensive reentry system and to reflect the 1 2 philosophical change to the department's approach to rehabilitation and reentry mandated by Act 8. Additionally, the 3 legislature requires specific data to accurately assess programs 4 and to continue to improve public policy. 5 6 The purpose of this Act is to: 7 (1) Direct the department of public safety to establish 8 key performance indicators or measures to be incorporated in reports that evaluate the outcomes of 9 10 program components as required in Act 8; and 11 (2) Require the department of public safety to submit 12 specific program participation data quarterly to the 13 legislature. 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 353H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: 16 17 **Performance indicator reporting.** (a) The "§353H-18 department of public safety shall develop performance measures 19 that accurately reflect progress toward specific goals, 20 including: 21 (1) Improving recidivism rates;



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1	(2)	Decreasing prisoner assaults on correctional staff;
2	(3)	Reducing correctional staff turnover; and
3	(4)	Improving departmental efficiencies in staffing,
4		budgeting, and data management and analysis.
5	(b)	The department shall develop key performance
6	indicator	s, which shall include:
7	(1)	The number of individuals enrolled in and who have
8		completed a general education diploma or competency-
9		based diploma;
10	(2)	The number of individuals for whom a reentry plan is
11		filed and the number of individuals who exit jail or
12		prison with a reentry plan;
13	(3)	Drug test failure rates of inmates while incarcerated
14		and while on parole;
15	(4)	The number of inmates currently enrolled in and who
16		have completed drug treatment programs provided by the
17		department of public safety;
18	(5)	The number of inmates currently enrolled in and who
19		have completed restorative circles;
20	(6)	The number of parolees who have applied for a
21		reduction of their minimum sentence, the number of



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1		applications approved and denied, and, when
2		applicable, the reasons for the denial of a parolee's
3		application;
4	(7)	The number of parole revocation hearings and the
5		results of parole revocation hearings that, when
6		applicable, explain why the parolees' revocation was
7		denied;
8	(8)	The cost of incarceration per inmate, per day, per
9		facility;
10	(9)	Offender demographics, including gender, race, age,
11		and type of offense;
12	(10)	The number of individuals who received vocational
13		training or rehabilitation services and type of
14		vocational training or rehabilitation services
15		received;
16	(11)	The total number of inmate intakes, by month,
17		including the number of intakes each month within the
18		past year and past five years;
19	(12)	The total number of inmates released, by month;
20	(13)	The number of inmates with substance abuse problems,
21		including the type of dependence or addiction, and the



1		number of inmates with no reported substance abuse
2		<pre>problems;</pre>
3	(14)	The median length of incarceration, excluding inmates
4		who have received life sentences or been paroled; and
5	(15)	The prison population forecast for the next decade.
6	<u>§353</u>	H- Quarterly reporting requirements. (a) For each
7	program e	stablished pursuant to this chapter, the department
8	shall sub	mit a report to the legislature within thirty days of
9	the last	working day of the months of March, June, September,
10	and December, beginning with the period ending on September 30,	
11	2018. Each report shall reference key performance indicators	
12	that track rehabilitation and reentry efforts for individuals	
13	being prepared to exit the correctional system. The report	
14	shall als	o include:
15	(1)	A complete list of programs offered;
16	(2)	The length of each program;
17	(3)	Each program's success rate, including the percentage
18		of participant completion in the previous two years;
19	(4)	A description of participant criteria assessed by the
20		program for admittance;
21	(5)	The number of available positions with each program;



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1	(6)	The number of potential participants on waiting lists;
2	(7)	The number of participants who do not complete the
3		program;
4	(8)	A summary of reasons why participants do not complete
5		a program; and
6	(9)	A complete list of programs that are no longer offered
7		and explanations for termination of the programs.
8	<u>(b)</u>	The department shall also post the reports
9	electroni	cally on the department's internet website in a timely
10	manner."	
11	SECTION 3. Section 353G-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
12	amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:	
13	"(c) The department of public safety, in conjunction with	
14	the department of health, shall report on $[an annual] a$	
15	quarterly basis to the legislature and to the governor, its	
16	findings concerning the need for and implementation of the	
17	various provisions of this chapter. The report shall include	
18	information collected under subsection (a) and a synopsis of	
19	information or data necessary to determine the impact, utility,	
20	and cost-benefits of the provisions of this chapter. The report	
21	shall also include:	



1	(1)	A complete list of programs offered;
2	(2)	The length of each program;
3	(3)	Each program's success rate, including the percentage
4		of participant completion in the previous two years;
5	(4)	A description of participant criteria assessed by the
6		program for admittance;
7	(5)	The number of available positions with each program;
8	(6)	The number of potential participants on waiting lists;
9	(7)	The number of participants who do not complete the
10		program;
11	(8)	A summary of common reasons why participants do not
12		complete a program; and
13	(9)	A complete list of programs no longer offered with
14		explanations for termination of the programs."

17	SECT	ION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
