A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that chronic,
- 2 unsheltered, nomadic homelessness is a humanitarian disaster
- 3 that endangers public health and safety. The legislature
- 4 recognizes that multiple national studies show that Housing
- 5 First programs are enormously effective, mostly because the
- 6 stability of a permanent home, combined with supportive services
- 7 and treatment, fosters recovery from addiction, mental illness,
- 8 and other afflictions.
- 9 The legislature also finds that for many years, the State
- 10 used homeless shelters and transitional group homes as an
- 11 interim measure, while attempting to place as many homeless
- 12 persons as possible into subsidized rentals and traditionally-
- 13 constructed apartments under a Housing First paradigm.
- 14 Unfortunately, economic constraints, construction delays, and
- 15 landlords' resistance to homeless tenants have made the supply
- 16 of subsidized rentals and traditionally-constructed housing
- 17 inadequate. Moreover, many persons who are mentally ill or who



- 1 struggle with substance abuse cannot live in close quarters with
- 2 others in a shelter or group home, and thus continue to live
- 3 unsheltered.
- 4 The legislature notes that technical innovations now make
- 5 it possible to build enough dwellings for every homeless person
- $\mathbf{6}$ in Hawaii at a lower cost than what the State spends on the
- 7 ancillary costs of unsheltered, nomadic homelessness. The
- 8 legislature believes that the best way to achieve this on a
- 9 scale large enough to end homelessness is to incorporate
- 10 alternatively constructed homes into villages using Housing
- 11 First practices. The legislature further finds that there is
- 12 sufficient unutilized or under-utilized state land suitable for
- 13 the construction of homeless villages.
- 14 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act, which shall be known
- 15 as the "Puuhonua Villages Act", is to establish a puuhonua
- 16 homeless villages pilot program under a Housing First paradigm.
- 17 SECTION 2. The department of human services shall identify
- 18 the state lands to be used for the puuhonua homeless villages
- 19 pilot program. The department may collaborate with the state
- 20 office of planning and the University of Hawaii to identify
- 21 state lands that may be used for the pilot program.

1 (C) A kitchen; 2 Lockers for residents' valuables; and (D) 3 A mailing address; and (E) 4 A village shall have systems to dispose of trash and 5 other waste. 6 The department shall establish rules for residents of (b) 7 the pilot program that are reasonably consistent with what are 8 commonly known as Housing First practices. To the extent 9 possible, the rules shall allow residents to participate in 10 self-government. The department may designate a village to exclusively 11 12 or non-exclusively accommodate certain sub-populations of the 13 homeless community, including but not limited to: 14 (1)Unaccompanied minors; 15 (2)Severely mentally ill persons; Persons addicted to drugs or alcohol; or 16 (3) 17 (4)Persons who are prone to violence. 18 The department shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter (d) 19 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as well as policies and procedures, for the purpose of qualifying applicants for residency under the 20

puuhonua homeless villages pilot program. Qualification rules,

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- 1 policies, and procedures shall be consistent with the rules,
- 2 policies, and procedures of the United States Department of
- 3 Housing and Urban Development's Coordinated Entry System. To
- 4 the extent practicable, the department shall ensure that
- 5 qualification procedures for residency under the pilot program
- 6 provide for rapid admission and use the least restrictive
- 7 standards practicable.
- 8 (e) The department may collaborate with security and law
- 9 enforcement agencies to provide security for the puuhonua
- 10 homeless villages pilot program.
- 11 (f) The department may work with appropriate agencies to
- 12 ensure that residents have reasonable access to public
- 13 transportation and access to services and assistance during
- 14 their temporary stay.
- 15 SECTION 4. All state, county, or other local permitting or
- 16 construction fees shall be waived with respect to the approvals
- 17 of dwellings contemplated under section 3 of this Act.
- 18 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to
- 21 establish the puuhonua homeless villages pilot program and



- 1 construct homes and physical infrastructure as required by
- 2 section 3 of this Act.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 7 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for
- 8 the management, maintenance, and day-to-day operations of
- 9 puuhonua homeless villages established under section 3 of this
- 10 Act.
- 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 12 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 7. Chapter 662, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 15 and to read as follows:
- 16 "§662- Immunity from liability for provision of housing
- 17 or services to homeless persons. An employee of the State who
- 18 provides housing or services to a homeless person shall be
- 19 immune from civil liability in any action based upon the acts or
- 20 omissions of the employee; provided that the employee was acting

Report Title:

Housing; DHS; Puuhonua Homeless Villages Pilot Program

Description:

Establishes within the Department of Human Services a Puuhonua Homeless Villages Pilot Program and requires DHS to identify lands for the pilot program. Waives applicable state and county permitting and approval fees. Exempts the State from claims arising out of the provision of housing or services to homeless persons. Provides immunity from civil liability to volunteers and state employees who provide housing or services to homeless persons. Appropriates funds.
