A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DENTAL HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that Hawaii's children SECTION 1. 2 have the highest prevalence of tooth decay in the nation, 3 particularly amongst low-income children who reside in Hawaii, 4 Maui, and Kauai counties. Despite ranking at the bottom of the 5 nation for children's oral health, the State has taken concrete 6 steps to change the oral health status of Hawaii's children and 7 has become a pioneer in teledentistry. The legislature notes 8 that the department of health and Pacific Center for Special 9 Care at the University of the Pacific's School of Dentistry were 10 awarded grants from the Hawaii Dental Service Foundation to fund 11 a teledentistry pilot project, known as the Hawaii virtual 12 dental home, in West Hawaii. The Hawaii Medical Service 13 Association and Hawaii Dental Service Foundations have also 14 committed funds to expand this successful pilot project to Maui. 15 The legislature further finds that the virtual dental home, 16 an oral health initiative with the potential to significantly 17. improve access to dental care for the underserved and



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1 vulnerable, is a community-based delivery of care system that
2 uses telehealth-connected dental teams to provide dental
3 services and dental education in communities where underserved
4 populations live, learn, and socialize. Untreated dental
5 disease is a significant problem in Hawaii, and the prevention
6 of this disease is possible with supportive, culturally relevant
7 education for children and their families.

8 The legislature notes that under existing law, the State's 9 medicaid managed care and fee-for-service programs are required 10 to cover services provided through telehealth. This allows for 11 health services provided through a telehealth consultation to be 12 covered, and be reimbursed to dentists, at the same rate as a face-to-face visit between a patient and a health care provider. 13 14 However, for the virtual dental home pilot projects to be self-15 sustaining, certain barriers in the State's medicaid dental 16 program must be addressed.

17 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to support the 18 sustainability of the Hawaii virtual dental home pilot projects 19 by:

8	be covered if the service were provided through in-person		
9	consultation between a patient and a health care provider. For		
10	billing and payment purposes, the State shall consider		
11	procedures performed using real-time or store-and-forward		
12	telehealth technologies as equivalent to those procedures		
13	performed in person."		
14	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed		
15	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.		
16	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
