A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHRONIC HEALTH CONDITIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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PART I

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that healthcare costs are 3 skyrocketing. The legislature specifically finds that studies 4 indicate that a small percentage of patients consume a disproportionate amount of healthcare resources. Many of these 5 6 patients suffer from multiple chronic conditions, including substance use, mental illness, and homelessness. Chronic 7 8 conditions that go untreated worsen with age. Further, the more 9 chronic conditions an individual has, the greater the risks that 10 individual faces for mortality, poor functional status, 11 unnecessary hospitalizations, adverse drug events, duplicative 12 tests, and conflicting medical advice. Approximately sixty-six per cent of total health care spending is directed toward the 13 14 approximately twenty-seven per cent of Americans with multiple 15 chronic conditions.

16 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for the 17 treatment of people with multiple chronic conditions, including



but not limited to mental health disorders, substance use
disorders, and homelessness.

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PART II

4 SECTION 2. The legislature finds that current guidelines 5 on chronic conditions fail to account for complications posed by 6 additional chronic conditions. Specifically, guidelines for 7 people with mental illness and substance use problems rarely 8 address co-occurrence of other chronic conditions. Developing 9 targeted interventions designed for multiple chronic conditions 10 will help improve access to health care, public health, and other services. Effective treatment of patients with multiple 11 12 chronic conditions requires heightened coordination of complex medical and psychosocial care, development of accompanying 13 quality metrics, increased involvement of the public health 14 15 system, strengthening of public-private partnerships, and an 16 increase in qualified staff.

17 Therefore, the purpose of this part is to require the 18 department of health to establish a comprehensive and 19 coordinated continuum of treatment services for sufferers of 20 substance use disorders who have other chronic conditions.



1	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
3	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the
4	treatment of patients with multiple chronic conditions,
5	including substance use disorders, and the creation of a modern,
6	comprehensive, and coordinated continuum of treatment services
7	that includes defined goals and benefits.
8	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
9	health for the purposes of this part.
10	PART III
11	SECTION 4. The legislature finds that the department of
12	health has started a pilot program for training primary
13	caregivers to address mild to moderate substance use disorders,
14	by providing screening, brief intervention, and referral to
15	treatment. This primary care strategy provides for early
16	intervention with at-risk substance users before more serious
17	consequences occur.
18	The legislature also finds that ninety per cent of people
19	with substance use disorders do not receive treatment; of those
20	who do not receive treatment, ninety-five per cent are unaware
21	that they have a problem. Improving primary care can identify



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substance use disorders early, and reduce healthcare costs, the
severity of drug and alcohol use, and risk of trauma.

3 The legislature also finds that a centralized referral and 4 treatment process is a key component of substance use treatment. 5 The referral and treatment process includes assisting a patient 6 access specialized treatment, select facilities, and navigate 7 barriers such as cost and transportation, and following up with 8 a patient as needed.

9 Therefore, the purpose of this part is to appropriate funds 10 for the department of health to establish a pilot project for a 11 comprehensive and coordinated centralized referral system in 12 each county.

13 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 15 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the 16 department of health to establish a pilot project for a 17 permanent centralized referral center in the city and county of 18 Honolulu, then expand and develop the program to address the 19 needs of other counties.

20 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 21 health for the purposes of this part.

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1	PART IV
2	SECTION 6. The legislature finds people with mental health
3	disorders or substance use disorders can be particularly
4	vulnerable to becoming homeless or being precariously housed.
5	The legislature further finds that although the chronically
6	homeless represent approximately sixteen per cent of the overall
7	homeless population, they consume more than half of services.
8	Approximately two-thirds of the chronically homeless have a
9	substance use disorder or other chronic condition.
10	The legislature further finds that case managers with the
11	expertise to address substance use disorders and other chronic
12	conditions could better address the chronically homeless who
13	have difficulty accessing housing. These skills include
14	knowledge of theories of addiction, models of recovery, and
15	practices of continuing care; ability to recognize the
16	importance of family and social networks in the treatment
17	process; and understanding of interdisciplinary and
18	multicultural approaches to treatment, among others. Properly
19	trained case managers can deal with special needs, such as HIV
20	infection, poverty, childcare responsibilities, and physical or



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1 developmental disabilities. Case managers can also ensure 2 smooth transitions in care and avoid gaps in service. 3 The legislature also finds that, although case management 4 programs have been recently created, they lack vital funding and 5 resources. 6 The purpose of this part is to provide funding for case 7 management programs to help those with substance use disorders. 8 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 10 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the 11 funding of case management programs to help those with substance 12 use disorders throughout the State. 13 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 14 health for the purposes of this part. 15 PART V 16 SECTION 8. The legislature finds that peer mentors and 17 coaches assist their peers with setting recovery goals, finding 18 sober housing, making new friends, finding new uses of spare 19 time, and improving job skills. They also provide assistance 20 with other collateral issues. Peer mentors and coaches provide



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valuable experience to the peers they serve as they have
experienced similar recovery paths.

The legislature further finds that peer mentoring and coaching reduce health care costs, facilitate recovery, and promote a sense of community. Peer mentors and coaches model recovery behaviors and connect the person treated with valuable services and resources.

8 The legislature further finds that many peer mentors and 9 coaches serve as volunteers. As such, they tend to have shorter 10 tenures than paid staff, and require constant supervision, 11 recruitment, and training. Stipends and other compensation are 12 sometimes provided to peer mentors and coaches.

13 Therefore, the purpose of this part is to appropriate funds 14 to service providers to hire supervisors to supervise and train 15 volunteer peer mentors and coaches, and to develop incentive and 16 stipend programs for volunteer peer mentors and coaches.

SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 to fund service providers to hire supervisors to supervise and train volunteer peer mentors and coaches to help those with substance



use disorders, and to develop incentive or stipend programs for
volunteer peer mentors and coaches.
The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
health for the purposes of this part.
PART VI
SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
