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# SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO  
EXAMINE HOW A STATEWIDE USE OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE  
ASSESSMENTS AND RESPONSE PROTOCOL BY EMERGENCY MEDICAL  
SERVICES PERSONNEL CAN HELP TO STRENGTHEN THE STATE'S  
OVERALL RESPONSE TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE.

1           WHEREAS, domestic violence is a complex societal issue for  
2 which effective solutions require the combined efforts of key  
3 stakeholders, including emergency medical services personnel and  
4 other "first responders" who are often the first to respond to  
5 calls for help from victims of domestic violence; and  
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7           WHEREAS, through their close interactions with known or  
8 suspected victims of domestic violence, emergency medical  
9 services personnel and other first responders are uniquely  
10 positioned to assess significant threats to a victim's life or  
11 personal safety; and  
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13           WHEREAS, the data collected by emergency medical services  
14 personnel and other first responders during scene assessments is  
15 valuable not only in helping to keep victims of domestic  
16 violence safe, but also in more effectively preparing emergency  
17 medical services personnel and other first responders for the  
18 potential dangers associated with responding to domestic  
19 violence incidents; and  
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21           WHEREAS, according to a 2017 report by the Centers for  
22 Disease Control and Prevention, in killings of women nationally  
23 when the circumstances were known, more than fifty percent of  
24 cases involved intimate partner violence, and one in ten victims  
25 of intimate partner violence-related homicide had reportedly  
26 experienced violence in the month preceding death; and  
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28           WHEREAS, locally, the average annual number of cases in the  
29 Department of Health's Emergency Medical Services and Injury



1 Prevention System Branch Pre-Hospital Medical Record System from  
2 2013 through 2015 that involved intimate partner violence  
3 against females aged twelve to fifty years was seven hundred  
4 eighteen in the City and County of Honolulu, one hundred sixteen  
5 in Hawaii County, one hundred five in Maui County, and twenty-  
6 six in Kauai County; and  
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8 WHEREAS, it is not the Legislature's intent to interfere  
9 with the critical and time-sensitive work of first responders,  
10 but the inherent opportunity to provide urgent interventions  
11 during the initial response to domestic violence incidents  
12 should not be ignored; now, therefore,  
13

14 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-ninth  
15 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, the  
16 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of  
17 Health is requested to convene a task force to examine how a  
18 statewide use of domestic violence assessments and response  
19 protocol by emergency medical services personnel can help to  
20 strengthen the State's overall response to domestic violence;  
21 and

23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to  
24 include the following members:  
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- 26 (1) The Director of Health, or the Director's designee,  
27 who is requested to serve as the chair of the task  
28 force;  
29
- 30 (2) The respective Emergency Medical Services chiefs of  
31 the City and County of Honolulu and the Counties of  
32 Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui, or their designees;  
33
- 34 (3) A member of each house of the Legislature, to be  
35 designated by the President of the Senate and the  
36 Speaker of the House of Representatives, respectively;  
37 provided that at least one of the designated members  
38 is requested to be a member of the Women's Legislative  
39 Caucus;

- 41 (4) A representative from the Hawaii State Coalition  
42 Against Domestic Violence or other similar victim



1 advocacy organization invited by the chair of the task  
2 force;

4 (5) A representative from a domestic violence advocacy  
5 organization from each county invited by the chair of  
6 the task force; and

7  
8 (6) One or more survivors and parents of survivors of  
9 domestic violence from each county invited by the  
10 chair of the task force; and

11  
12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the chair of the task force is  
13 requested to invite other individuals with relevant knowledge or  
14 experience to be members of the task force, including the  
15 respective police chiefs of the four counties or their  
16 designees, and representatives of government or community-based  
17 entities that share or compare data with emergency medical  
18 services personnel or other first responders to incidents of  
19 domestic violence; and

20  
21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall  
22 incorporate the use of teleconferencing at all meetings to allow  
23 greater participation by neighbor island members; and

24  
25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no member of the task force  
26 shall be made subject to chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes,  
27 solely because of that member's participation on the task force;  
28 and

30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to  
31 examine:

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33 (1) Whether the development of domestic violence  
34 assessments and response protocol may better protect  
35 victims of domestic violence and first responders; and

36  
37 (2) Issues relevant to the implementation of domestic  
38 violence assessments and response protocol; and

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40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is  
41 requested to provide administrative support for the task force;

2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to  
3 submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including  
4 any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than  
5 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of  
6 2019; and  
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8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this  
9 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health;  
10 the respective Emergency Medical Services chiefs of the City and  
11 County of Honolulu and the Counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui;  
12 the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of  
13 Representatives; and the Executive Director of the Hawaii State  
14 Coalition Against Domestic Violence.
