## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT PARTICIPANTS IN PUBLIC DEMONSTRATIONS OTHER THAN PERMITTED EVENTS SUCH AS MARATHONS AND PARADES FOLLOW TRAFFIC LAWS.

WHEREAS, the First Amendment to the Constitution of the 1 2 United States of America grants the right of free expression, including the right to peaceably assemble; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, public demonstrations have a long history in the United States as a means by which the public may express support 6 for policies, voice outrage for injustices, and call for action 7 on the part of elected officials and other public figures; and 8 9 WHEREAS, although the right to peaceably assemble is a 10 11 valuable and vital component of public engagement in the United 12 States, it is not absolute; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of the United States of America 15 has consistently held in numerous cases, including Ward v. Rock Against Racism, 491 U.S. 781, 109 S.Ct. 2746 (1989), that the 16 government may impose restrictions on the time, place, and 17 18 manner of peaceable assembly, provided that constitutional 19 safequards are met; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the right of demonstrators to assemble and express their position must be fairly and justly balanced against the 22 qovernment's interest in providing for the safety and security 23 of the public; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, many counties, municipalities, and other local 27 governments require the organizers of public demonstrations and other public events to apply for and be granted a permit; and 28 29

WHEREAS, even if a public demonstration or other event does 1 2 not require a permit, local governments may still require 3 participants to follow traffic and public safety ordinances; and 4 5 WHEREAS, law enforcement, including sheriffs with the 6 Department of Public Safety, direct traffic during public demonstrations, which sometimes impede traffic unnecessarily, 7 8 causing unsafe conditions for pedestrians and motorists; now, 9 therefore, 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-ninth 11 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, the 12 House of Representatives concurring, that organizers and 13 participants in marches, rallies, and public demonstrations are 14 requested to follow traffic laws and public safety ordinances; 15 16 and 17 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that law enforcement, including the 19 sheriffs of the Department of Public Safety, are urged to consider the safety and convenience not just of demonstrators 20 but of motorists as well; and 21 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this request does not apply to permitted events such as marathons and parades; and 24 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Public 27 28 Safety, Office of the Mayor of each county, and Chief of Police of each county. 29
