<u>SB 2174, SD1</u> ( <u>SSCR2111</u> ) <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO MATERIAL WITNESS ORDERS. Authorizes the circuit court or family court to issue a material witness order in cases initiated through felony complaint, indictment, or information. (SD1)	JUD
SB 2180, SD1 (SSCR2161) Status	RELATING TO LESSER INCLUDED OFFENSES. Clarifies the definition of an included offense to expressly include offenses charged via felony complaint. Effective 7/1/2035. (SD1)	JUD
SB 2582, SD1 (SSCR2157) Status	RELATING TO EXTENDED TERMS OF IMPRISONMENT. Adds certain cases of negligent homicide to the felonies that may be subject to an extended term of imprisonment. Effective 7/1/2035. (SD1)	JUD
SB 2742, SD1 (SSCR2589) Status	RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD INFORMATION. Resolves inconsistencies in the processing of expungements and public dissemination of criminal history record information relating to cases in which the defendant is acquitted or charges are dismissed by reason of physical or mental disease, disorder, or defect under chapter 704, Hawaii Revised Statutes, or is involuntarily hospitalized under section 706-607, Hawaii Revised Statutes. SB 2745, SD1 (SSCR2163) Status	RELATING TO CONFIDENTIAL PERSONAL INFORMATION. Amends the definition of "confidential personal information," in section 708-800, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to eliminate unconstitutionally vague provisions in the law as determined by the Hawaii Supreme Court, in its decision of State v. Pacquing, 139 Haw. 302, 389 P.3d 897 (2016). (SD1)	JUD

<u>SB 2146</u> (SSCR2108) <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO PUBLICATION OF ELECTION NOTICES. Provides that whenever an election officer is required to issue a public notice in a statewide or county publication, the publication requirement is satisfied upon the submission of the notice to the publication, provided that the notice is also posted on the website associated with the election officer.	JUD
SB 2154 (SSCR2545) Status	RELATING TO ORGANIZATIONAL REPORTS OF NONCANDIDATE COMMITTEES. Repeals reporting requirement regarding contributions in organizational reports of noncandidate committees and noncandidate committees making only independent expenditures.	JUD
SB 2992, SD1 (SSCR2590) Status	RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FINANCE.  Exempts signs and banners from the requirement that campaign advertisements contain the name and address of the candidate, candidate committee, noncandidate committee, or other person paying for the advertisement and notice of whether that the sign or banner has the approval of the candidate; provided that signs and banners advocating passage or defeat of an issue or question on the ballot are required to contain the name and address of the candidate, candidate committee, or noncandidate committee paying for the sign or banner. SB 2740, SD1 (SSCR2922) Status	MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE, ITS OFFICERS, OR ITS EMPLOYEES.  Makes appropriations for claims against the State, its officers, and its employees. (SD1)	JUD, FIN
SB 2744, SD2 (SSCR2739) Status	RELATING TO FALSE CLAIMS TO THE STATE.  Amends false claims to the State statute by increasing penalties to maintain consistency with the federal False Claims Act and in order to comply with the Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act of 1990. (SD2)	JUD, FIN
SB 2851, SD1 (SSCR2643) Status	RELATING TO STATUTORY REVISION: AMENDING OR REPEALING VARIOUS PROVISIONS OF THE HAWAII REVISED STATUTES AND THE SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII FOR THE PURPOSES OF CORRECTING ERRORS AND REFERENCES, CLARIFYING LANGUAGE, AND DELETING OBSOLETE OR UNNECESSARY PROVISIONS.  Amends or repeals various provisions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and the Session Laws of Hawaii for the purposes of correcting errors and references, clarifying language, and deleting obsolete or	JUD
