HB 1970 Status	RELATING TO HUNTING. Establishes the Hawaii apprentice hunting license program. Allows a license holder to participate in hunting under certain conditions.	WAL, JUD, FIN
HB 1919 Status	RELATING TO HOUSING. Requires that construction and renovation of publicly funded residential housing incorporate housing visitability standards.	WAL, CPC, FIN
HB 2027 Status	RELATING TO WATER QUALITY CERTIFICATION. Requires the Auditor to review the water quality certification process of the Department of Health Clean Water Branch.	WAL, FIN

HB 1977 Status	RELATING TO FLOOD MITIGATION. Requires the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency to develop a strategic regional flood plan.	WAL, PBS/VMI, FIN

RELATING TO THE LAND USE COMMISSION.

WAL, JUD, FIN

Authorizes the Land Use Commission to compel any public agency to comply with its duties, responsibilities, and statutory requirements regarding conservation districts.

DECISION MAKING TO FOLLOW

If during the course of the hearing it appears that there will not be sufficient time to allow everyone to be heard, the chairperson reserves the right to limit the remaining testifiers to three-minutes. This three-minute policy will be enforced to ensure fairness and adequate consideration to all bills.
