The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) expresses its strong support for Governor's Message 699 on the confirmation of Dr. Kawika Winter as a gubernatorial appointed member of the Endangered Species Recovery Committee (ESRC).

Pursuant to Chapter 195D, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS), the ESRC advises the Board of Land and Natural Resources and the Department on matters relating to endangered, threatened, proposed, and candidate species. The seven-member ESRC makes recommendations based on a full review of the best available scientific and other reliable data with consideration of the cumulative impacts of the proposed action on the recovery potential of impacted species. One new ESRC member seat was established under Section 195D-25, HRS, to be filled by a person possessing a background in native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices.

The Department supports the nomination of Dr. Kawika Winter as the person possessing a background in native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices.

Dr. Winter is the Director of the Limahuli Garden and Preserve, part of the National Tropical Botanical Garden on Kaua'i, where he has worked since 2005. Dr. Winter has served on the Hawaiian Conservation Alliance Steering Committee, is the Kaua'i advisory council representative for the E Ale Pū Network, and was awarded the MVP Award by the Hawai'i Invasive Species Council for his efforts to protect priority watershed areas on Kaua'i. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment Committee will recommend that the Board of Trustees **SUPPORT** GM699, which would confirm Kawika Winter as a member of the Endangered Species Recovery Committee.

OHA believes that Mr. Winter will provide the Endangered Species Recovery Committee with much-needed, culturally-informed expertise on native ecosystems and species that will greatly enhance its work. OHA particularly appreciates Mr. Winter's strong background in biocultural resource management, as evident in his numerous publications and extensive work experience; OHA believes that Mr. Winter's knowledge of traditional Hawaiian understandings of and relationships to native ecosystems will provide the Committee with invaluable insight as to how it may better and more comprehensively prevent the extinction of our many rare, threatened, and endangered species. OHA also appreciates Mr. Winter's dedication to the protection and perpetuation of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices, including through his training as a practitioner of hula, 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, and lā'au lapa'au, as well as his years of work to protect traditional subsistence fishing practices in Hā'ena, Kaua'i through the establishment of the first permanent community-based subsistence fishing area. OHA believes that Mr. Winter's demonstrable dedication to the perpetuation of cultural practices and the natural and cultural resources underlying them will significantly help the Committee to ensure that endangered species recovery actions do not unnecessarily restrict constitutionallyprotected practices and cultural connections to the 'āina, while recognizing the importance of rare, threatened, and endangered species to Native Hawaiian culture;

# Re: Statement of Interest for my appointment to the Endangered Species Recovery Committee

Welina mai me ke aloha e Senator Gabbard and members of the Agriculture and Environment Committee.

I am honored to be appointed by Governer Ige for the Hawaiian cultural practitioner position on the Endangered Species Recovery Committee (ESRC). It has been a life-long goal of mine to not only protect, but to facilitate the recovery of Hawai'i's endangered species. As a member of ESRC I would be able to apply my cultural background, my resource management background, as well as my research background towards fulfilling the purpose of the Committee by ensuring that development proposals result in a cumulative net benefit to Hawai'i's rarest native species, pursuant to HRS 195D.

For the past 13 years I have been the Director of Limahuli Garden and Preserve, which is a part of the National Tropical Botanical Garden (NTBG). In this capacity I have direct purview over a privately-owned, 1,000-acre botanical garden and nature preserve situated in the most biodiverse ecoregion of the entire State. In order to protect and restore endangered species in our valley I have created and currently lead the implementation of the Limahuli Comprehensive Conservation Strategy, which aligns our conservation efforts with state, national, and international priorities. I have also lead the coordination of the multidisciplinary research needed to inform our adaptive management of the valley's biocultural resources—inculding listed species. This experience would serve me well as a member of ESRC.

One of the unique aspects of our conservation work at Limahuli is that it is managed in this context is the Hā'ena Ahupua'a Project, which aims to have Hā'ena stand as a model of a 21st century *ahupua'a*. We have had many successes on this front, and the *ahupua'a* of Hā'ena has been held up, in many cases, as a model by both state and federal entities. My perspectives on *ahupua'a* management have been shaped — both philosophically and practically — by the teachings of my late *Kumu Hula*, John Ka'imikaua, and my late *tūtū ho'okama*, Eddie Kaanaana. Both of these *hulu kupuna* were well-respected in this realm, and I have strived to honor their legacy through my work. My cultural training, institutional education, and professional experience has provided me with the knowledge and perspectives needed to understand how the overall system operates, to see where limited energy should to be applied to yield the greatest benefit, and an ability to work with people to get attention focused in the areas that need it most. Through various collaborations in Hā'ena we have been able to synergistically maintain biodiversity, support the health and function of the forest, protect the integrity of the stream, and garner more community-

based support for research and conservation efforts. These are the core experiences that I would bring to the ESRC.

During the term of my service I hope to substantively contribute towards assessing and refining mitigation approaches such that they actually result in a cumulative net benefit for endangered species. My career in resource management, which has had a strong focus on habitat restoration for endangered species, situates me in a good position to do so. That said, I do see one potential area for a conflict of interest. One of the programs I manage is partially funded by endangered species mitigation money via a short-term HCP belonging to Kaua'i Island Utility Cooperative (KIUC). As a means to address this potential conflict of interest I would consult both the Attorney General's office about any potential legal issues, and the Ethics Commission about potential ethical issues. If either or both were to advise my recusal from being involved in any decision-making process regarding that HCP, then I would most certainly do so without hesitation.

I look forward to contributing my time, energy, and experience on another level towards the recovery of Hawai'i's endangered species. *Mahalo* for your consideration.
