Testimony COMMENTING on HB 1616RELATING TO HEALTH

REPRESENTATIVE JOHN M. MIZUNO, CHAIR COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** We appreciate the intent of HB 1616, and defer to the Governor's
- 2 Executive Budget request for the Department of Health's (DOH) appropriations and personnel
- priorities. HB 1616 requests \$1,260,135 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 4 2018-2019 be appropriated to the DOH for one advanced life support ambulance to be: (1) Based
- 5 in Puna on the island of Hawaii; and (2) Used during daily peak hours from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00
- 6 p.m., and to include the acquisition of a vehicle and equipment and funding personnel costs for
- 7 state-certified emergency medical service personnel.
- 8 **Department Testimony:** The Department recognizes the significant challenges to providing
- 9 health care and emergency medical services to the expanding county of Hawaii. This measure
- 10 seeks to augment the Hawaii County emergency medical services system for the residents and
- visitors of the county. DOH contracts with the Hawaii County Fire Department to operate 15
- 12 ground ambulances and one medical helicopter on the Island of Hawaii. According to the United
- 13 States Census figures, between 2010 and July 1, 2016, the population of Hawaii County
- increased 4.5% from 185,079 to 193,680. No additional ambulances have been authorized for
- 15 Hawaii County since 2005.
- 16 The DOH Emergency Medical Services and Injury Prevention Branch meets regularly with all of
- 17 Hawaii's emergency service providers to review Hawaii's 911 response capabilities and system
- 18 challenges. This Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Provider group discusses the current
- deployment of 911 ambulance resources statewide and assesses the need for any additional
- ambulance units to meet the growing health and safety needs of Hawaii's residents and visitors.

- 1 Based on these discussions, the group identified Puna and surrounding areas of Hawaii County
- 2 one of areas of highest need.
- 3 These priorities were confirmed by examining Hawaii County ambulance response time data
- 4 from the DOH pre-hospital EMS database. The mandated DOH contracted response times for
- 5 Puna surrounding areas located in Hawaii County is 20 minutes or less. A review of EMS data
- over a 7-year period (2010 2016) demonstrated that Puna area response times exceeded the
- 7 mandated 20 minute threshold between 16% 39% of the time. Adding an additional ambulance
- 8 unit and personnel resources to this district would improve Hawaii County response times.
- 9 Should the legislature decide to increase services to the Puna area the Department recommends
- the service hours be 24/7 to provide added flexibility to EMS personnel in emergency response.
- 11 The addition of 24/7 services would increase the funding needs to \$1.5 million per year.
- 12 The State's investment in 911 ambulance services statewide in contracts with the counties for
- EMS services totals approximately \$75 million with almost \$42 million from billing being
- returned to the State's General fund in FY 2017.

Dear Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Kobayashi, and Members:

The Honolulu Emergency Services Department, Emergency Medical Services Division, is in support of HB1616 with amendments.

The City and County of Honolulu Emergency Services Department is the contracted provider to the State of Hawaii Department of Health for Emergency Medical Services for the 992,605 residents and 5,461,880 (2016) visitors who live on and visit Oahu.

As one of the three contracted providers in the State we work cooperatively with the other providers to ensure the proper function and timely delivery of EMS services to all citizens and visitor in our State.

As a group we have determined that the current needs to ensure the timely and proper functioning of EMS services include new 24 hour ambulance units on Kauai, Hawaii, and Oahu. This determination of need is based primarily on the need to increase service to meet the increasing demands for service due to the following three populations:

- Continual annual increases in visitor arrivals and subsequent injuries sustained by this
 group while visiting our State requiring pre-hospital medical services (increased 10.45%
 since 2012 on Oahu),
- The annual increase in our senior population 65 years and older, our State policy of aging in place, and the significantly higher demand for pre-hospital emergency medical services as this population group ages (37.4% of total population on Oahu), and
- The high use demand placed on EMS services by our Homeless Population (4,940 on Oahu).

The current level of EMS service on Oahu has absorbed this increase in demand over the past 6 years but is experiencing annual declines in response time capability. Response time is critically important in survival outcomes for many pre-hospital medical emergencies including cardiac arrest, stroke, and major trauma.

As such the Honolulu Emergency Services Department is in support of HB1616, however, we would request that the Bill be amended to include one EMS unit for the Island of Oahu to meet the pressing need for increased pre-hospital emergency medical services as identified above.

Re: HB 1616 Relating to Health [Puna ambulance]

Hearing Date: January 24, 2018

I strongly support HB 1616. A new ambulance for the Puna District of the Big Island would be of tremendous value, and there is little I can add to the preamble of HB 1616 which does an excellent job of laying out the case.

The district of Puna is the fastest growing district in the State; and thus, has increasing calls for emergency medical services. Currently, the high demand for Puna emergency services means Hilo ambulances need to travel to Puna for emergency calls. Hilo ambulances sometimes need to travel over thirty miles with some of those miles on substandard unpaved roads. Every Hilo ambulance that responds to a Puna emergency means one less ambulance available for Hilo, the second largest city in the State; and thus, an ambulance based in Puna not only benefits Puna, but also benefits the rest of East Hawai'i Island.

It takes an average round-trip of almost two hours to respond to each Puna emergency call. Emergency calls from Puna have increased to over five thousand calls per year. It is common for paramedics to have over ten transports in each work shift, which equates to twenty or more hours for each twenty-four hour shift. Because of this increase in calls, Hilo paramedic units, which are the busiest on the island, are often dispatched into the Puna district to cover the area when the Puna paramedic units are responding to other calls. This results in fewer Hilo paramedic units being available to respond to Hilo emergency calls.

A new advanced life support ambulance will help reduce death and disability among residents and visitors alike. Please act favorably on HB 1616.

H. B. No. 1616 RELATING TO HEALTH

The Hawaii Fire Fighters Association (HFFA), Local 1463, IAFF, AFL-CIO represents approximately 2,100 active-duty professional fire fighters throughout the State with more than 345 HFFA members serving in the County of Hawaii Fire Department – the only fire-based emergency medical service (EMS) among the four County Fire Departments and State Airport Rescue Fire Fighters.

HFFA <u>supports H.B. No. 1616</u> as Hawai'i Island has experienced a number of factors that justifiably warrants the need for the additional EMS units, including the increase in EMS call volume; population growth; and the sheer land mass of the island.

Access to primary and acute medical care within the Makalei and Puna areas have been chronically challenging as services are currently as much as 30 miles away for many residents. The volume of EMS calls have slowly increased each year without a correlated increase in EMS services to the areas and with the projected population growth, this will no doubt continue to impact the ability to deliver high quality EMS services to our Hawai'i Island residents.

The request presented in H.B. No. 1616 would aid not only our first responders in meeting the ever-increasing demands and needs for emergency medical services on Hawai'i Island, but it would also better serve our communities.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify and HFFA respectfully requests favorable consideration of this measure.
