HB 1638 HD2 – RELATING TO APPRENTICESHIPS

Chairs Kahele and Tokuda, Vice Chairs Kim and English, and members of the committees:

The University of Hawaii is in concurrence with the intent of HB 1638 HD2. This measure would provide funding to continue and expand health care apprenticeship programs at the University of Hawaii community colleges.

In February 2017, Kapi'olani Community College (KapCC) entered into a contract with the State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations for \$1,167,291 for the purpose of establishing apprenticeship programs for culinary and healthcare. Of this amount, \$510,609 was for the area of healthcare for Community Health Workers, Pharmacy Technicians, and Optometry Assistants. This contract runs through the end of April 2018, and given the projected balances, the College will be requesting a no-cost extension to continue these programs.

In terms of our progress on partnering with the industry, since September 2017, KapCC has fostered eleven instructional apprenticeship partnerships with nine employers including Queen's Medical Center, Hawai'i Pacific Health, Hawai'i Primary Care Association, Hawai'i Optometric Association, Retina Institute of Hawai'i, Partners in Care Hawai'i, ALEA, and Hawai'i Independent Physicians Association.

The College is also looking to expand apprenticeship programs to Nursing Assistants and Medical Laboratory Technicians, Phlebotomists, and Sonographers; funding for these additional fields was not included as part of the original contract.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of the intent of this bill.

My name is Carl Hinson and I am the Director of Workforce Development at Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system with over 70 locations statewide including medical centers, clinics, physicians and other caregivers serving Hawai'i and the Pacific Region with high quality, compassionate care. Its four medical centers — Kapi'olani, Pali Momi, Straub and Wilcox — specialize in innovative programs in women's health, pediatric care, cardiovascular services, cancer care, bone and joint services and more. Hawai'i Pacific Health is recognized nationally for its excellence in patient care and the use of electronic health records to improve quality and patient safety.

I write in support of HB 1638, HD 2 which provides funding to continue and expand health care apprenticeship programs at the University of Hawai'i community colleges.

With the increasing shortage of Medical Assistants (M.A.s), we have had to explore alternative staffing strategies to meet the operational needs of our clinics and hospitals. Hawai'i Pacific Health (HPH) and Kapi'olani Community College (KCC) are currently partnered in the coordination of apprenticeships for Community Health Workers. These individuals work as "Care Coordinators" through Hawai'i Health Partners (HHP) to visit our patients in their home setting and to provide assistance with medication, treatment compliance, and other essential primary health care services.

While the Apprenticeship Program trains workers to provide primary health care services, it also equips them with skills required to play important leadership roles in our health care systems, which previously required formal M.A. training. For example, one such apprentice is currently working in HPH Human Resources and upon graduation will assume the role of our New Hire Health Clearance Coordinator.

The Apprenticeship Program helps to fill our industry's need for qualified medical professionals. We are hopeful that you will consider continuing and expanding the Apprenticeship program which provides great value to our industry and health care workforce.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on **HB1638 HD2**, relating to UH; Community Colleges; Apprenticeships; Health Care; and an appropriation.

A variety of learning strategies should be used, including group projects, cooperative learning, discussion, games and technological innovations." (Platform of the DPH, P. 6, Lines 310-314 (2016)).

"Access to health care is a basic human need. Our citizens and visitors have an inherent right to high quality, high standard health care. The state legislature and the federal government should take all appropriate steps to create and support a health care system of public, for-profit, and nonprofit hospitals and other medical facilities that follow best practices to enhance and protect and preserve life." (Platform of the DPH, P. 7, Lines 361-364 (2016)).

Given that **HB1638 HD2** appropriates funds to continue and expand health care apprenticeship programs at UH community colleges, it is the position of the OCC Legislative Priorities Committee to support this measure.
