HOUSE BILL NO. 1757 RELATING TO COFFEE LABELING

Chairperson Creagan and Member of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 1757, relating to coffee labeling. This bill expands the coffee labeling requirements pertaining to Hawaii grown roasted coffee to include ready-to-drink coffee beverages. The Department has concerns with the bill and offers comments.

This bill expands the Department's enforcement responsibilities to include the labeling and adverting of ready-to-drink coffee beverages at coffee shops. In addition, many ready-to-drink coffee beverages sold at retail are manufactured and packaged outside of Hawaii, in which the Department has no enforcement jurisdiction.

The Department supports the Hawaii coffee industry and the use of unique geographic coffee growing regions to market, advertise and sell Hawaii-grown coffee. However, while the Department can enforce grading and labeling of green Hawaii-grown coffee, the Department cannot determine the content or origin of a coffee or its blend once it is roasted.

If HDOA representatives reassert the objections quoted in the November 6, 2017, Star-Advertiser article (http://www.staradvertiser.com/2017/11/06/business/kona-coffee-farmers-see-red-in-konared-coffee-drink-contents/?HSA=c8c43998c2dddeb099c1ac36a78f9e2e3c00ed05), please note:

- 1—Hawaii clearly has jurisdiction over misleading or fraudulent labeling of products sold in this state;
- 2—There would be no difficulty in determining whether or not the percentage of Hawaii origin coffee has been appropriately included on the labels of RTD coffees—exactly as

is now the case with roasted and instant coffee under current law. Most marketers obey the law and would accurately state the percentages of Hawaii origin coffee. The most significant benefit of HB1757 would be requiring that percentage to be clearly stated on the label; and

3—If there is reason to believe that a marketer of roasted, or instant, or RTD coffee is misrepresenting the percentage of Hawaiian-grown coffee in a package, there are scientific tests readily available to prove and prosecute violations of the law. See, for example, "Fourier Transform Infrared Spectroscopy for Kona Coffee Authentication", Journal of Food Science, Vol. 74; Nr. 5, at C385 (2009). H.C. Bittenbender of the UH Department of Tropical Plant and Soil Sciences is one of the authors of this article describing procedures for authentication.

Please pass this bill for the protection of consumers and coffee farmers.
