A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ASSAULT OF A UTILITY WORKER.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. With increased frequency, utility workers

2 across the nation are the victims of assault and aggression. In

3 particular, the personal safety of field representatives who

4 read and repair meters, line crew workers who respond to power

5 outages, and billing representatives who accept payments or

6 disconnect and reconnect meters are threatened. Nationwide, it

7 has been reported that utility workers have been shot, stabbed,

8 and, in some cases, killed while performing their official job

9 duties.

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10 As part of their normal job duties, utility workers are

often put in situations where customers are irate for reasons

beyond the workers' control, such as power outages and service

disconnects, resulting in a potential for confrontation between

the worker and customer. In addition, as utility workers are

often working on or with systems that are inherently dangerous,

any distraction has the potential to lead to serious injury or

Chair Johanson and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General ("the Department") appreciates the intent of this bill and submits comments.

The purpose of this bill is to create the new class C felony offense of assault against a utility worker.

But this new offense appears to be unnecessary, as it is already covered by existing law.

The proposed offense prohibits a person from intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causing serious or substantial bodily injury to a utility worker. But assault in the first degree, in violation of section 707-710, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), a class B felony offense, already prohibits a person from intentionally or knowingly causing serious bodily injury to another. Assault in the second degree, in violation of section 707-711, HRS, a class C felony offense, already prohibits a person from recklessly causing serious bodily injury to another. And assault in the second degree also prohibits a person from intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causing substantial bodily injury to another person.

The proposed offense also prohibits a person from intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causing bodily injury with a dangerous instrument to a utility worker. But assault in the second degree already prohibits a person from intentionally or knowingly

causing bodily injury to another with a dangerous instrument. And assault in the third degree, in violation of section 707-712, HRS, a misdemeanor offense, already prohibits a person from recklessly or negligently causing bodily injury to another with a dangerous instrument.

Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Holt and Members of the Committee,

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local Union 1260, AFL-CIO (IBEW1260), represents more than 3500 members working in the utility, outside construction, cable, telecom and maintenance industries throughout the State of Hawaii and respectfully offers the following testimony in **STRONG SUPPORT** of House Bill 2023 (HB2023).

Our members, employed by the Hawaiian Electric Companies (HECO, MECO, HELCO) and Kauai Island Utility Cooperative (KIUC) are often put in situations, as part of their jobs, that could and sometimes do lead to confrontation between an employee and customer. This includes line workers working to restore/repair power lines, meter readers in the field ensuring customers are properly charged for electrical service, field service representatives and trouble-crews performing service connects/disconnects, customer billing representatives who accept payments and others working directly with or around customers.

Passage of HB2023 helps to ensure these workers who often work in dangerous conditions, on dangerous systems, can perform their duties without the outside distraction of potential violence, ultimately allowing the best possible service to all customers of Hawaii's utility companies.

Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Holt and Members of the Committee:

My name is Clayton Kau and I represent Hawaiian Electric Company and its subsidiary utilities Maui Electric Company and Hawaii Electric Light Company, collectively "Hawaiian Electric."

Hawaiian Electric supports H.B. 2023. We suggest that the threshold for determining the felonious assault of a utility worker while in the lawful performance of his or her duties be "bodily injury."

A utility worker should never be the victim of an assault whether it results in serious or substantial bodily injury or bodily injury. A utility worker provides a critical service to the general public. He or she should be afforded the same protection as a correctional worker, educational worker, emergency medical services personnel and a person employed at a state-operated or –contracted mental health facility.
